

Rose Bowl Host Contest Shapes Up

Southern California and UCLA, co-leaders of the Big Five Football Conference face tough assignments this week which could go a long way in deciding the Rose Bowl host.

Southern California, with a victory over California in the conference, travels to Seattle to meet

the University of Washington which lost to Cal. UCLA, at the same time, meets the California Bears in a game at Los Angeles. The Uclans beat Stanford 20-0 in their conference opener last Saturday in a game where most of the credit—and a pair of touchdowns—went to the defensive alignment.

Southern California beat Illinois 14-10 while California lost to Penn State 33-16 and Oregon edged Washington 7-6. San Jose State surprised Washington State with a 21-19 setback while Utah State humbled Idaho 49-0.

In this week's games, Oregon travels to Stanford, Washington

State plays at Oregon State, Idaho entertains University of the Pacific and Arizona State University invades San Jose for a night game. UCLA found its vaunted running game throttled through most of the first half at Stanford until sophomore Mike Haffner engineered an 82-yard scoring drive. Just 59 seconds later, Stanford tried a field goal that fell short and Kermit Alexander grabbed the ball to run 87 yards for a score. Linebacker John Walker wound up the scoring with a 36-yard touchdown return with an intercepted pass in the third period.

Illinois held a 10-6 halftime lead over USC until the sophomore passing combination of quarterback Pete Beathard and Hal Bedsole clicked on passes of 24 and 10 yards and fullback Ben Wilson scored from the two.

Oregon quarterback Ron Veres tossed an 11-yard scoring pass to end Paul Bauges in the second quarter and the Ducks made that stand up for the upset victory over Washington.

California led Penn State 10-3 until the Nittany Lions' superior strength in the line took its toll and the Easterners went on to win their inter-sectional victory.

San Jose trailed 13-0 against Washington State but came flying back on the air arm of quarterback Chon Gallegos who threw touchdown passes of 24 and 38 yards to end Oscar Donahue. Mack Burton scored the other San Jose tally on a 33-yard punt return.

Oregon State had an open date before hosting the Cougars of Washington State this week.

Ducks Ready For Indians; Not 'Cocky'

EUGENE (AP) — Oregon, after averaging one-point defeats by Washington the previous two years with a 7-6 victory over the Huskies in Portland Saturday, feels more confident as it begins preparation for its game with Stanford of the Big Five next weekend.

But coach Len Casanova said today there will be no cocky attitudes. "We haven't had time to go over the scouting report on Stanford 20-0 loss to UCLA," he said, "but the best the San Jose State coach would say about us after we beat him earlier is that we were on a par with Stanford. He was particularly impressed with their line after his team played them."

Casanova said it was not known whether Mel Renfro, ace sophomore back who was hurt early in the season against Utah, will be ready for Stanford. Renfro returned to practice last week but still was limping from a leg injury.

Doug Post, the No. 1 quarterback, also was injured, in the Washington game, and Casanova said he did not know whether he will play against Stanford. It was the injury to Post that gave reserve quarterback Norm Veres his chance, and Veres pitched an 11-yard pass to end Paul Bauges in the Washington end zone in the second period.

End Buck Corey's placekick conversion gave Oregon a 7-0 lead.

Oregon withstood furious Washington assaults in the second half and the best the Huskies could do was a touchdown on Jim Stiger's three-yard plunge in the fourth period, climaxing an 80-yard drive.

Pete Ohler's pass to Charlie Mitchell in a try for a two-point conversion was short.

Earlier Oregon had stalled a 57-yard Washington drive on its 11 when halfback Mike Gaechter halted quarterback Bill Siler just short of the Oregon goal line after a six-yard sweep on fourth down.

Just before the end a 53-yard pass play from Ohler to Nat Whitmeyer put Washington on the Oregon 33 and center Ray Mansfield tried a field goal from the 33 but the ball traveled low and short.

Many Oregon fans thought it a desperation attempt, but Casanova said he was plenty frightened. "He was kicking them from that far in pre-game practice," he said.

Casanova said his entire team turned in a standout game and that tackle Steve Barnett "was great both ways" — on offense and often. He said tackle Ron Snidow also made two fine goal line stops and praised Gaechter for his speed and alertness in making the fourth down goal line tackle of Siler.

Casanova was pleased, too, with the work of both of his quarterbacks, Post and Veres. On the Washington side he said Mansfield and guard Jim Skaggs played brilliantly and "are as good linemen as we've seen this year."

Bucks Widen Margin

The Portland Buckaroos have picked up this season where they left off at the end of the 1960-61 Western Hockey League campaign—at the top of the heap.

The Bucks have been mowing down everyone in the league this year with nonpartisan regularity. Sunday night they won their sixth in a row, downing Los Angeles 4-1.

There was no other action in the league Sunday. Saturday night's play saw Calgary bump Los Angeles, 6-2, Seattle jump up and down on San Francisco, 11-1, and Spokane defeat Vancouver, 5-2.

Portland's win put them five points ahead of Spokane in the Southern division. The Bucks have won seven out of their first eight. Edmonton, with five victories and no losses, heads the Northern division.

Bill Saunders, Arnie Schmutz, Dale Rolfe and Tom McVie netted Portland's four goals. The Bucks had a 2-1 lead going into the final period on scores by Saunders and Schmutz and added two insurance points in the last 20 minutes.

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'Shotgun' Loses Early Advantage

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — San Francisco's shotgun "revolution" is becoming less and less revolting to the opposition in the National Football League.

When the Forty Niners introduced their new spread offense, with its three triggermen quarterbacks, it looked like they might open a new phase of professional football. But now it appears that the shotgun will always be a short range weapon.

Looking back over the season, just what has it knocked over — Washington (0-7), Los Angeles (1-6), Minnesota (1-6), and Detroit (4-3). The powerful Green Bay Packers and the Chicago Bears spiked it with ease, and Pittsburgh (2-5) added the final touch Sunday by defeating San Francisco, 20-10.

San Francisco's 49-0 victory over Detroit was impressive, but the two teams are now tied for third place in the Western division—and that score wasn't indicative of the difference between them.

By the same token, Chicago blanked the Forty Niners, 31-0. The Bears aren't that much better, and the shotgun's not that bad.

Coach Red Hickey's main problem with the shotgun is that the ball tends to be slippery. The Forty Niners have suffered from fumbleitis ever since they went to work with the new offense, and two fumbles made the 10 points difference in Sunday's game.

The Steelers scored a touchdown after recovering one on the San Francisco 29 yard line, and

Humboldt State's superiority over the Oregon Tech Owls was evident in final statistics.

The Lumberjacks swamped the Owls 47-7 in Arcata Saturday night. Ranked No. 10 in the latest small college NAIA football poll, Humboldt dominated all phases of statistics. The powerful Staters racked up 374 yards total offense to the Owls' 74.

Stan Glass, the Owls' fullback, accounted for virtually all of the OTI ground yardage with 71 yards on 18 carries. The Lumberjacks shuttled 10 backs into the game and their attack was more balanced.

Slide into the delivery.

The lowest point in the down-swing occurs when the ball and the fourth step, or slide, starts. Here's where the slide brings the bowler to within from two to six inches of the foul line. The ball comes past the left foot, out over the foul line and is delivered toward the target.

Complete control of your movements is important. The slide should come naturally, without wavering or loss of balance.

Helmet Change Being Studied

NEW YORK (UPI) — The nation's football death toll had rocketed to 26 today and, in the wake of protests over the killing quality of unyielding plastic helmets, certain profit-minded manufacturers stepped hastily into the tragic act.

"Football equipment is in my opinion many times safer than ever before," writes one manufacturer as result of a recent protest in this corner.

This letter was written at about the same time the National Collegiate Athletic Association's equipment committee revealed it was planning legislative action against current headgear in January.

The NCAA committee would seem to be equally dilatory in coping with this fatal situation. It admitted it became "alarmed" last year over the sharp increase in head and neck injuries but "took another year to form a judgment."

Makes You Wonder
A year, it might be added, in which some of the 26 who died

might have had a better chance to live.

"Accidents seem to be to the wearer of the helmet, not to his opponent," said the quoted NCAA official.

It is a statement which makes you wonder if it makes a difference in whether the injury happens to the runner or the tackler. The current furor began when Maryland coach Tom Nugent was quoted here as asserting that the current headgear is "a weapon instead of a protective device."

He drew immediate support from John Bateman, the Rutgers coach and both admitted — "although the manufacturers probably won't like it" — it was vital that changes be made.

There is support for this contention in a report of an American Medical Association committee which holds that some of the deaths on the gridiron this season "might have been prevented" by improved helmets and, as the public health watchdog, demanded changes.

Nugent suggested a possible return to leather helmets because there is a certain amount of "give" not found in plastic.

Defends Plastic Helmet

Thus, it is rather surprising to receive a communique from a firm which identifies itself as "manufacturers of leather and athletic goods" and proceeds to blandly defend the plastic helmet.

"One fact you should know," this "leather" manufacturer asserts, "is that a leather helmet, far from being soft, has a lining of 100 gauge fibre, which made it at least as hard as a plastic shell. The leather strips across the crown were also hazards, as they could cut."

"The helmet today," this firm has the audacity to submit, "is a far safer product and if used and fitted properly will provide maximum protection."

This "leather" firm, in other words, sells plastic helmets. As for leather necessarily being as hard as iron, the feeling persists that it could be made softer. Boxing gloves, made to intentionally assault another, are soft. And where breathes the man who hasn't been slugged with a lady's leather pocketbook without fatal results?

Team Physician Hit By Stroke

PORTLAND (AP) — Dr. George Guldager, team physician for the Oregon football squad, collapsed after the exciting Oregon-Washington game Saturday and was rushed to a hospital.

The attack was described by hospital authorities Saturday night as a stroke. Guldager's condition was described as fair.

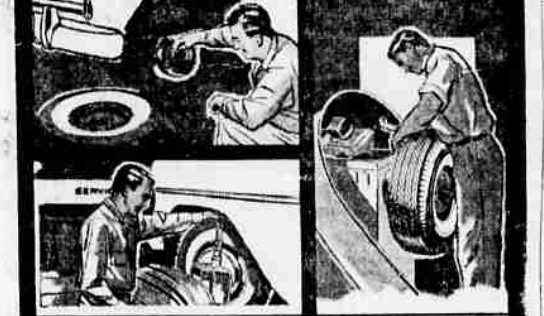
Guldager had to be carried to the dressing rooms by four Oregon players. A spectator at the 7-6 Oregon victory collapsed near the end of the game and died shortly after arrival at Good Samaritan, apparently of a heart attack.

The victim was identified as Wilson Henson, 45, Sweet Home. He was accompanied at the game by a daughter, whose name was not learned.
