Cal Tjader Quintet Sets OTI Show On Halloween

Those far-out sounds coming from high on the OTI hill Tuesday night won't be goblins and ghosts in their once a year night to howl despite the fact it's Halloween Eve.

Cal Tjader and his quintet, presenting the futuristic beats of "Jazz '62," will appear in concert at Oregon Technical Institute starting at 8:30 p.m.

Tjader, who has dubbed his traveling show "Tjader by Tjader," is a product of the San Francisco Bay's many jazz houses and, incidentally, of San Jose and San Francisco State colleges.

He was the first winner of the Down Beat New Star Award in the vibraphone category. Though the vibraphone is his chief instrument, Tjader is also an accomplished tap dancer. He first came to national prominence as a member of the famous Dave Brubeck Trio and later toured with the George Shearing Quintet.

The quintet, besides Tjader, numbers pianist, Lonnie Hewitt; bassist, Al McKibbon; drummer, Willie Bobo and conga drummer Mongo Santamaria.

Pope Prays For Babies Every Day

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII, nearing his 80th birthday, prays daily for every newborn baby in the world.

The pontiff, elected to the papal throne just three years ago Saturday, disclosed this to newsmen this week in a special audience he described as a family affair.

His broad, good-natured face beamed—several times he smiled and chuckled—the Pope spoke casually.

"You know," he said, "at 80, sleep does not always come as it does to a baby."

It is then, while waiting for sleep he said, that he turns to newspapers, books, or prayer. He prays for the world in those moments, he added, with the comment that his daily prayers include the entire 15 mysteries of the Rosary. He said that while contemplating the third mystery—the Birth of Christ—he dedicates his prayers to newborn babes.

"Those prayers," he said, "I devote to all the babies born in the preceding 24 hours. This way, I pray for all of them."

Earlier, in a formal address in French to the newsmen, who had come to give their birthday greetings, the pontiff urged dedication to truth.

"By working for truth," he said, "you will also be working for human fraternity. Because it is error and the lie that divide men."

Next week, combined celebrations will be observed here to honor Pope John's birthday and the anniversary of his election as the supreme ruler of the Roman Catholic Church. Highlight of the observance will be a papa capella in St. Peter's Basilica next Saturday.

Pope John was born Nov. 25, 1881, at Sotto il Monte, a little town in northern Italy, whose names mean "Under the Mount." He was elected Pope Oct. 29, 1958 and crowned seven days later, on Nov. 4.

Saturday morning, recovering from a case of the sniffles, the Pope celebrated Mass in his private chapel. At noon, Vatican radio broadcast a two-minute anniversary address by the Pope in which he greeted bishops and members of the Roman Catholic Church throughout the world.

Rusk Takes 'No Surrender' Stand

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk Saturday ruled out "any surrender of the vital interests" of the Western powers or the West Berliners in an effort to come to terms with the Soviet Union on a peaceful Berlin settlement.

Rusk also rebuffed suggestions for creation of a buffer zone in central Europe, including Germany. He said the Communist bloc would seek to use any such neutralized area for its own "exploitation, exploration, penetration."

Rusk spoke in an interview recorded Tuesday by the Voice of America for broadcast Sunday and made public Saturday night by the State Department. Rusk made no mention of the current U.S.-Soviet dispute over the access of U.S. officials to Communist-ruled East Berlin.

But it was learned he is planning a new approach to Moscow early next week in an attempt to reach some agreement of this bitterly contested issue which had brought U.S. and Soviet military power into direct confrontation in the heart of Berlin.

U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson, who conferred with Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko in Moscow Friday, is expected to seek another appointment Monday or Tuesday. He will tell Gromyko the United States will never accept imposition of new border-crossing procedures which the Communists try to establish by force. But it is understood that he will indicate U.S. readiness to discuss the problem and try to work out a mutually satisfactory arrangement.

Officials here said the fact that U.S. and Soviet tanks faced each other across the East-West Berlin frontier without shooting is evidence that both sides want to avoid a conflict over Berlin and are capable of exercising restraint.

Nevertheless, even though the tanks were withdrawn from the Friedrichstrasse crossing point Friday night, the basic dispute over the right of U.S. civilian officials to cross into East Berlin without showing identification papers to East German police remains unresolved and could flare up again.

In the Voice interview, Rusk dealt with the Berlin problem in terms much broader than the immediate border-crossing controversy.

A questioner said the argument has been made that Soviet Premier Khrushchev "cannot permit an island of freedom to exist behind the Iron Curtain"; also, that Khrushchev's personal reputation and home front political problems were bound up in his demand for a change in the status of West Berlin.
