

# Father-Son Drama Set For Second Act, Dodd-Steered 'Jacks, Gators Meet

ATLANTA (AP) — Chapter Two of the Bobby Dodd father and son story comes next Saturday when Florida and Georgia Tech meet here in a Southeastern Conference football game.

The younger Dodd went one up last year when he helped lead Florida to an 18-17 upset of his father's Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets. Bobby Dodd Jr., who shares the quarterback job with 138-pound Larry Leirto, completed a 32-yard pass in the closing minutes as Florida drove for the winning touchdown. Dodd drove the Gators to the Tech

three, and Leirto took them in for the score. The script is about the same for the second act of the father-son drama. Tech is favored as it was last year. But there is an important difference. Florida relished the underdog role in 1960 and knocked off both LSU and Tech en route to an 8-2 season and a Gator Bowl victory over Baylor.

This year, weakened by injuries to key personnel, Florida seems to have lost the upset touch. The Gators played well but lost to Rice 19-10, and last Saturday LSU flattened them 23-0.

Coach Dodd concedes he has a better team now than he believed possible two months ago. Tech vaulted to the No. 3 spot in the Associated Press top 10 after routing Southern California and Rice, tumbled after losing to LSU, and then fought its way back to its current No. 7 listing with successive triumphs over Duke, Auburn and Tulane.

"It won't be hard to get our boys keyed up for this Florida game," Dodd said today.

"Our team set only one goal this season, revenge on the five teams who beat us in 1960. So

far we have gotten even with Duke and Auburn, and we hope Florida will be the next on that list."

## TRIBE SIGNS KATT

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—Former major league catcher Ray Katt was signed today as first base coach for the Cleveland Indians, completing the Tribe's coaching staff for 1962.

Manager Mel McGaha last week announced the signing of Salty Parker as the third base coach. Mel Harder was retained as pitching coach.

## 'Free Ride' Over For Packer; Starr 'Arrives' As Q-Back

GREEN BAY, Wis. (UPI) — There's no more free rides to the bank for Green Bay quarterback Bart Starr.

The 6-1, 200-pound former Alabama ace has "arrived" as one of the National Football League's top quarterbacks.

Starr, now midway through his first full season as Green Bay's No. 1 signal caller, is making the so-called experts and rival coaches alike sit back and take a second look.

"One of the Packers' most underrated players," says Baltimore Coach Weeb Ewbank about Starr.

Norm Van Brocklin of the Minnesota Vikings, a pretty good quarterback himself in his playing days, also lauded Starr, saying he feared the Packers' passing attack more than their powerful rushing.

Such words of praise weren't always issued.

Criticized Last Week

In fact just last week a St. Paul

sports writer had claimed the Packers were great "in spite of Starr, not because of him."

"The Packers running power and defense do the job and then Starr gets a free ride to the banks," said Don Riley of the St. Paul Pioneer Press.

If nothing else, last Sunday's performance against the Vikings should have impressed Riley as well as other of Starr's detractors. With the Packers' running attack slowed to a walk by injuries to Paul Hornung and a superb job of defending Jim Taylor, Starr took command and completed 18 of 24 passes for 311 yards and two touchdowns—using a wet ball and playing on a slippery field.

The performance boosted his season totals to 93 completions in 150 throws (62 per cent) for 1,381 yards and eight touchdowns. He's averaging 9.3 yards for every pass thrown—a figure that should slow critics who claim Starr can't throw the long "bomb."

## Doubles TD Pass Total

Starr has already passed for more yards this year than he did last and has doubled his touchdown pass total. He credits speedy receivers like Max McGee, Boyd Dowler and Ron Kramer for his new-found success at throwing the long one.

"Take Dowler," he says. "He's so fast he can outrun the secondary. This forces the defense to lay back and then we can come back and fire short hooks to him."

"He credits McGee with having 'some of the best moves of any end in the league' and about Ron Kramer—who's risen to stardom this year after four years of bench warming."

"I can't say enough about him. He's been playing with a bum shoulder, but still tears into the opposition like a bull. That's the kind of desire that makes this team a great one."

## Hall Of Famer Predicts 1962 To Feature Big Homer Derby

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The biggest home run derby in the history of baseball — one that could make the Maris-Mantle fray of 1961 look like little league stuff — is on tap for the National League next year.

Take the word of Carl Hubbell, the Hall of Fame pitcher who now is farm system director for the San Francisco Giants.

"With the pitching spread out even greater than it ever has been in the major leagues," says Hubbell, "there's no question but that there'll be more homers."

And who will be in the home run derby, gunning for 60 or more?

Plenty of Belters  
"I think the man in front may be Orlando Cepeda of the Giants, who won the home run crown this year," says Hubbell. "But

Willie Mays has a chance and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee has an outside chance. And you might add that Frank Robinson of Cincinnati and Eddie Mathews of the Braves also have good chances. "Even Dick Stuart of Pittsburgh, if he plays regularly, could make a run for it."

Hubbell thinks they'll all be up there shooting around the 60-61 home run mark.

"Addition of the Polo Grounds to the playing fields won't hurt the chances of a lot of the sluggers," Hubbell pointed out. "It's too bad that Gil Hodges, who'll be playing there, isn't 10 or 12 years younger. He'd be in the race, too."

## Not Enough Pitchers

Many baseball observers pinned the Maris-Mantle home run race upon the fact that the American League added two teams to its roster—and thus had to bring in

a lot of pitchers who otherwise would be in the minors. The belief is that about 20 men hurled in the American League last season who would have been in the minors if there hadn't been expansion.

The same situation would hold true this year—except that instead of having 16 major league teams as there were in 1960, there would be 20. That means 40 pitchers—20 in each league—who were only of minor league caliber two years ago.

Hubbell said he didn't recall much about the Houston park where the new Houston team will play for the first year.

"But, assuming it is of regular dimensions," he said, "there still will be a great outburst of home runs hit. It's bound to be that way because of the spreading out of the pitching talent."

## William's Retirement Nixed As Sox Fan Decline Factor

BOSTON (UPI) — Was it because Ted Williams had retired that Boston Red Sox attendance plunged 279,277 last season?

"Nope," concludes the Red Sox brass, thereby exploding an assumption of long-standing that the colorful Williams personally was responsible for as much as half of the million or so in annual Fenway Park attendance.

The fact is, according to Red Sox Vice President Dick O'Connell, that Boston home attendance really dropped only 35,000 from Williams' final season to the first Red Sox campaign without him.

O'Connell, a combination general manager, business boss, and chief tenant executive of Tom Yawkey's American League club, says the reasons for the attendance loss were: 1. The Red Sox didn't win, and 2. a radical slash in ticket sales through a grocery chain.

"There's no doubt that Williams had an effect on Red Sox attendance for years and years and years," O'Connell said.

## Didn't Have Winner

"But the biggest single reason we dropped to 859,389 paid last season was because we didn't have a winner. The second reason is that we cut our promotion ticket arrangement (with First National Stores) to one month instead of most of the sea-

son and required that you buy twice the amount of groceries as the year before in order to get a free ticket.

"When we total up regular paid attendance for the two years—one with and one without Wil-

liams — we find a difference of only 35,000. Our losses were under the promotional plan. Regular attendance was practically a draw."

"Actually, too, our income was relatively the same. Our per capita was higher because we increased the number of box seats from 2,300 to 6,000. And believe it or not, we still have less box seats than most major league parks. Why in some cities the next last row in the second deck is still called a box seat."

## Remains Special Adviser

As to Williams' role with the Red Sox, O'Connell said the outfielder with the left-handed "picture swing" would continue as a special adviser, and that he would be one of five Boston executives attending the major league meetings in Florida next month.

"Ted has helped us a lot as a special batting instructor in both the majors and the minors, for his tour of our farms, and for helping to sign some players. He's helping us evaluate players in our system and others in the big leagues whom he has seen."

## Is Ted likely to be the next manager of the Red Sox?

O'Connell said, "Mike Higgins is our manager and we see no reason to change."

## Donut King Early Choice

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Vern Winchell's Donut King today was established an early 6-3 favorite to win Saturday's ninth running of the Garden State, the world's richest race for 2-year-olds.

Twelve horses are set for the mile-and-a-sixteenth race, which means a gross of \$302,365 with \$181,419 going to the winner.

Donut King, who will be ridden by Donald Pierce, defeated the leading Eastern 2-year-olds Jai-rur and Sy Gaylord in the Champagne at Aqueduct and scored by nine lengths over Obey, Green Ticket and others in the second division of the Garden State trial last Saturday.

Crimson King Farm's Crimson Satan, winner of one of his last four, was rated as second choice at 8-5 odds. He will have Willie Shoemaker up.

Third choice at 8-1 is the entry of Obey and Pinster.

## West Coast Grid Decline Blame Placed

NEW YORK (UPI) — Pete Newell, University of California athletic director, today blamed the decline of West Coast football on "pro football, a cycle of losing and increased interest in other sports."

Newell, a former Bears' basketball coach, said the cause of such a decline also comes from lagging alumni activity and a reluctance of good players to go with a losing team "because they want to play with a winner."

"I'm not talking about the dollar when I refer to the alumni," Newell explained at a New York football luncheon Monday. "I mean that winning is taken for granted, they stop talking up their college to good young players and the momentum runs down before you realized it has happened."

Newell deduced that the resulting out-of-state manpower drain has weakened West Coast college teams which in turn has caused an attendance decline.

The ex-coach said "it takes a long time to overcome a cycle of losing. It happens to them all."

Newell pointed to Notre Dame and Oklahoma as prime examples and said it took Minnesota 20 years to get back to the top.

The California official said there are a lot of good football teams around and indicated they are beating his school at almost every meeting. The Bears have lost to Texas, Iowa and Penn State and tied Missouri this season in a cross-section of national power. Newell considers Texas the strongest foe the Bears have met this season.

## Pass Leader Rides Bench, Keeps Margin

DALLAS (AP)—The American Football League's leading passer sat on the bench, watched his replacement set records and still retained his place.

That was the story Sunday as Jack Lee of Houston was held out of the game with Buffalo while George Blanda played all the way and hung up a one-game passing record of 444 yards. He beat the 457 yards Lee had thrown two weeks before.

Lee still topped the passers by one-half point under the six-department rating system that includes completions, yards gained, touchdown passes, completion percentage, interception percentage and yards gained per attempt.

Lee has connected on 55 of 106 passes for 998 yards while Butch Songin of Boston is second with 63 of 132 and 942 yards. Blanda is third with 70 of 145 for 1318.

In rushing Paul Lowe of San Diego leads with 345 yards but Bill Mathis of New York has moved into second place with 374 on the strength of a 76-yard dash against Oakland.

Gino Cappelletti of Boston leads the scorers with 100 points, Wayne Crow of Oakland the punters with a 45.8 average, Dick Christy of New York the punt returners with a 28.7 average, Al Frazier of Denver the kickoff returners with a 28.6 average and Charles McNeil of San Diego in interceptions with six catches.
