Are we women really guilty of all those charm-killing conversational habits? If so, maybe we had better worry a bit less about how we look and a bit more about how we sound.

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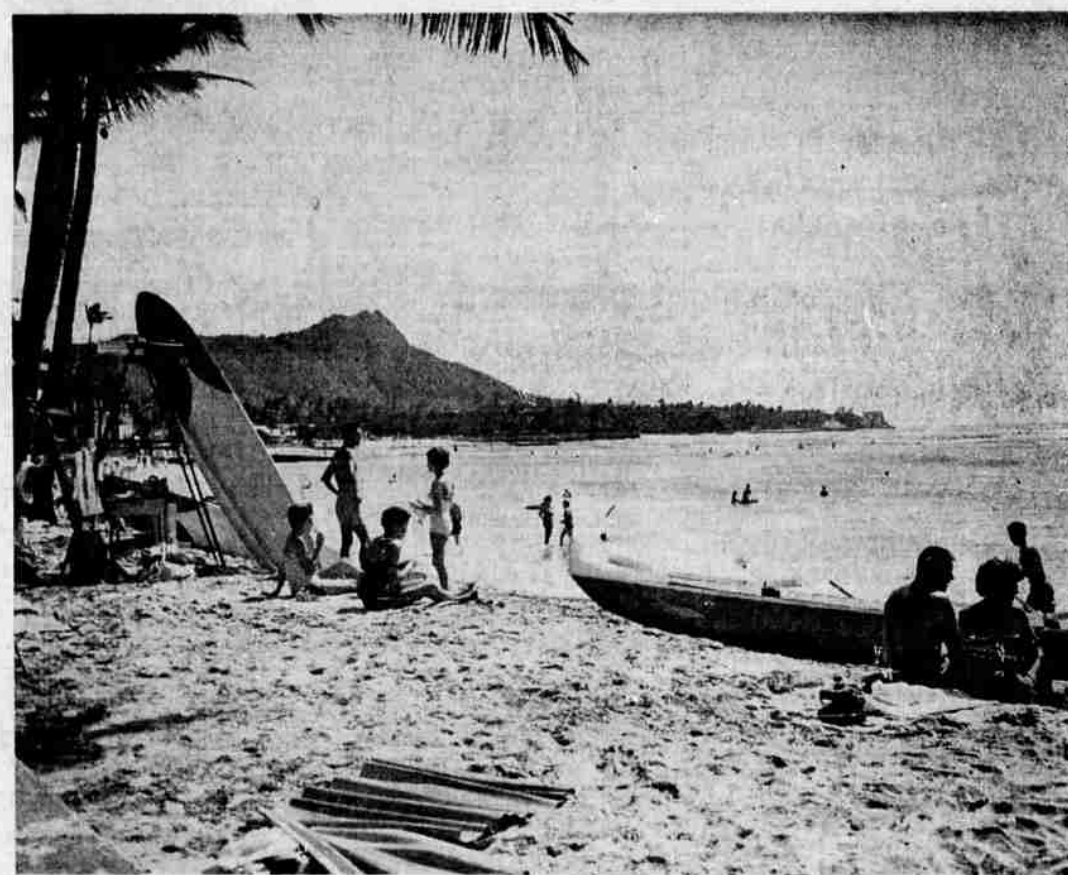
