

# Nixon Advises Primaries 'Fight' For GOP Presidential Hopefuls

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—Fight it out in the primaries, Richard M. Nixon advises Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz.

The former vice president and losing candidate for the presidency last year said Monday night Rockefeller and Goldwater should "clash in primaries" to determine who would be the best candidate to challenge President Kennedy in 1964.

Nixon, who is seeking the Republican nomination for governor of California, has said he will not campaign for the GOP presidential nomination. He declared Monday night he would not enter any primaries in 1964.

He addressed an overflow crowd of 8,000—more than 1,500 diners at \$100 a plate and a gallery of 6,500—in the Syracuse War Memorial Auditorium.

Nixon returned to New York

City after the dinner aboard Rockefeller's private plane, on which he and the governor had traveled to Syracuse.

Nixon refused, both at the dinner and a press conference that preceded it, to take sides between Rockefeller and Goldwater as the Republican presidential nominee in 1964. He said his mission was to unite the Republican party, not divide it.

In his formal talk the former vice president said he was "mighty proud that the Republican party has a man of such capabilities, stature and voter appeal as the governor of New York."

Rockefeller has said he will make no announcements regard-

ing the 1964 presidential race until after 1962 state election in New York, when he will be up for reelection.

In other comments, Nixon said: He agreed with Rockefeller's statement of last Friday that the United States should resume testing of nuclear weapons in the atmosphere.

He felt a properly trained Peace Corps would make contributions to backward nations of the world but the present, youthful members of the corps were not equipped to deal with "hard-nosed Communist operatives."

If the United Nations admitted Red China, a massive public opinion could develop in the United States against the world body and lead to American withdrawal.

# 300 Stopped By Pickets

PORTLAND (AP)—An estimated 300 employees are affected by picketing at five Portland furniture and upholstery companies.

The pickets are members of an Upholsterers Union local which called a strike Monday after a breakdown of prolonged negotiations.

Members of a nonstriking Furniture Workers Union local respected the upholsterers' picket lines, although they accepted an employer contract proposal last week.

By agreement between the unions, work continued in the furniture division of the big B. P. John Furniture Corp. Only the upholstery division was picketed.

Alfred Beecher, Upholsterers local business agent, and Dan Hay, an employer spokesman, said they were only \$5 apart on wage discussions.

They said the main disagreement was whether any pay increase should be retroactive to Sept. 1 or Oct. 16.

In addition to B. P. John, the plants picketed are the Portland Furniture Co., Rose City Upholstery Co., Sealy Mattress and Furniture Co., and Fashioncraft Furniture.

# Castro's Antics Flavor Sugar Boom In Florida

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—One of the sweetest economic developments of south Florida is a sugar boom touched off when Fidel Castro's revolutionary antics cut Cuba out of the U. S. sugar market.

American sugar men, and many former bigtime growers in Cuba's one-crop economy, are building refineries and planting sugar cane in vast Everglades areas which for centuries produced little but sawgrass and snakes.

Their \$100-million sugar expansion program hopes to recoup losses which Cubans and Americans suffered in the Castro expropriation of Cuba's sugar industry.

Eleven mills are either in operation, under construction, or in the planning stage.

Florida's sugar production, only 80,000 tons 10 years ago, is expected to be more than 300,000 tons in 1962, and 500,000 annually within a few years.

Land prices in the new "sugar bowl" have jumped. An acre that brought \$25 two years ago may be worth \$500 now. Owners of

choice land near Lake Okechobee are getting as much as \$900 an acre.

U. S. Sugar Corp. has under construction a \$15-million plant near Belle Glade. U. S. Sugar has operated a mill at Clewiston for many years.

Talisman Sugar Corp., a \$10-million Cuban refugee venture, plans to bring a mill from Louisiana for erection on a 16,800-acre site south of Belle Glade.

Sugar Cane Growers Cooperative of Florida has just broken ground near Belle Glade for a \$13.5-million plant.

Cuban sugarmen Manuel Arca and Luis de Armas are heading a project to establish a \$3.5-million grinding factory for the Glades County Sugar Growers Cooperation Association.

South Florida Sugar Corp., headed by P. J. Serralles of Miami, hopes to bring a complete mill, from Puerto Rico to a site near Belle Glade.

Other sugar firms are building or expanding facilities.

# Portlanders Face Lack Of Public Transportation

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland may be without mass transportation service after tonight if bus company and union negotiators do not agree to terms today.

Rose City Transit Co. has announced intentions to discontinue service at midnight if a contract agreement with the Motor Coach Employees union can not be reached by then.

The transit company's city operating permit and contract with the union both expire at midnight.

Both sides in the negotiations were urged late Monday by Portland Mayor Terry Schruk to continue service for 30 days. Schruk asked the bus company to apply for a 30-day extension of its city permit. The mayor also asked the union to continue under the present contract during that time.

Negotiations have been conducted by federal mediator George Walker. Schruk said members of the City Council had agreed to act promptly on any permit extension request. Walker promised to provide a panel of mediators if desired, the mayor said.

LIHUE, Kauai, Hawaii (AP)—President Urho K. Kekkonen of Finland sent his foreign minister home Monday to handle a Soviet request for a joint defense pact against West Germany.

Foreign Minister Ahti Karjalainen headed by plane today for Helsinki by way of San Francisco.

The Finnish president stayed behind to complete his visit to Hawaii. He was to leave this afternoon for Los Angeles, last stop on his tour of the United States.

The U.S.S.R. called on Finland to join with it to thwart what the Soviets called a growing West German threat to use the Baltic Sea as a jumping off place for war. The move was seen as an effort to bring independent Finland in line with Warsaw Pact nations.

1 15-oz. can Walla Walla Spinach  
1 1-lb. can red salmon
