

# Opening Set For Freeway

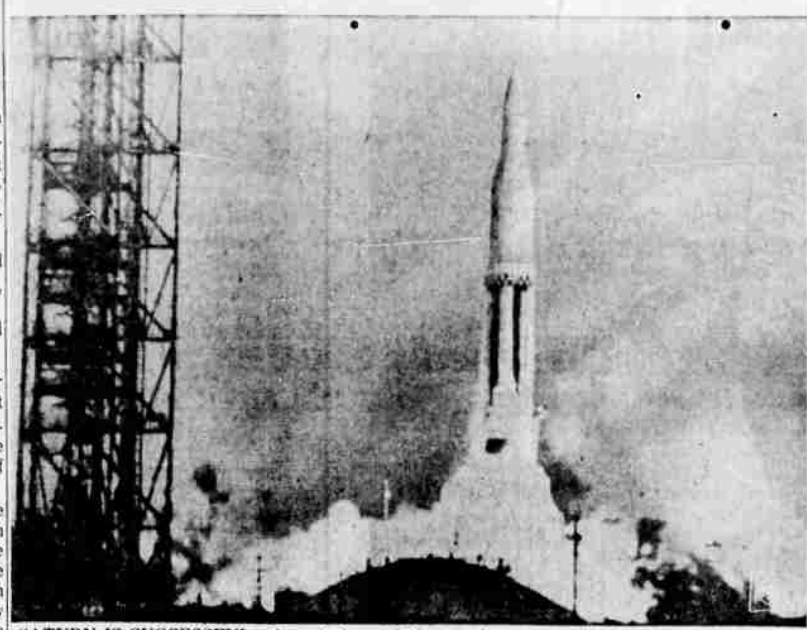
SALEM (AP) — The extension of the Baldock Freeway into Portland probably will be opened about Dec. 21, Forrest Cooper, deputy state highway engineer, said today.

The opening might be delayed beyond then if the weather is bad, he said.

The opening had been expected about Nov. 15.

Cooper said two other big projects also will be completed about Dec. 1. They are the Pacific Freeway through Eugene, and the Pistol River-Brookings section of the Oregon Coast Highway.

He also announced that the Highway Commission would open bids Dec. 8 on construction of the piers of the Willamette Bridge across the Willamette River in Portland. This bridge will carry Pacific Freeway traffic across the river.

## Storms Churn West Pacific

TOKYO (AP)—Two late-season typhoons churned in the west Pacific today but appeared steering clear of any heavily populated areas.

Typhoon Billie, with winds at 76 miles an hour, headed toward the Kurile Islands. Another storm of typhoon strength, Clara, raged southwest of Wake Island.

There are some 300 varieties of sharks, ranging from two to 60 feet in length. About a dozen are considered particularly dangerous.

## ICC Reopens Rail Talks

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The Interstate Commerce Commission reopened hearings in San Francisco Monday in the battle between Southern Pacific and Santa Fe for control of the Western Pacific Railroad.

The present phase of the hearings began in San Francisco early this month. In the past two weeks, sessions have been held in Los Angeles, Salt Lake City, Seattle and Portland.

A three-day hearing in Portland ended Friday, with Oregon shippers split three ways over the fate of Western Pacific.

The state of Oregon and one shippers' group insisted the ICC should deny both applications and urge an independent WP to continue competition with SP's parallel Oregon-California line.

Another group of shippers, served exclusively by SP, praised the monopoly service of Southern Pacific and said SP has tried in every way to help Oregon shippers.

## CONDUCTOR COLLAPSES

STOCKHOLM (UPI)—French-born American conductor Pierre Monteux had a heart attack Sunday night during the intermission of a concert here.

Monteux, 88, appearing as guest conductor, fainted but revived quickly and wanted to continue the second half of the program. But his doctors ordered him to bed and the remainder of the concert was canceled.

# Lookouts Caught By Wintry Blast

BEATTY—Friday's snow storm caught farmers, ranchers and two Klamath Forest Protective Association lookouts unawares, the Herald and News learned today.

Weather forecasts called for local showers, so with slightly added stimulus, agricultural areas dug into the harvest in earnest.

By noon Friday, the storm grew to blizzard proportions and the mountain areas were covered with a heavy blanket of snow, the season's first.

Letitia Wilkie was brought down from Calamus Butte lookout early Friday afternoon, at that time, the tower had received 20 inches and the storm showed no signs of letting up.

Buck Lindsay, Yainax Butte lookout, was completely snowed in while keeping the fire watch for KFPA and crews with snow equipment brought him down during the weekend.

When the storm hit, Modoc Lumber Co. was testing their slash areas to see if they dared to begin burning. As of Saturday, Weyerhaeuser Camp Nine reported 14 inches of snow.

Even the State Highway Department was caught unprepared.

By Friday evening, only one truck and a snow plow were ready for action in this area.
