

Area Youngsters Warned By OGC

Youthful Klamath Falls area hunters were cautioned this week that the date is drawing rapidly near when they must show a certificate stating they have successfully completed the Hunter's Safety Training course made mandatory by Oregon law earlier this year.

Dan Eastman, KF representative of the OGC, warned that as of Jan. 1, 1962, when the law goes into effect, any hunter between the ages of 12 and 18 will be arrested and turned over to juvenile authorities if he cannot produce a certificate signed by an accredited instructor, whether he has a hunting license or not.

Eastman said that interest in the safety training program has been lagging.

Area instructors have long waiting lists of youngsters who wish to take the course but are hampered in their efforts to complete classes by the failure of youths to finish the course once they have enrolled.

The course calls for the completion of a four hour training program in order to receive a certificate.

Waterfowl Hunt Said Just Fair

Waterfowl hunting in the Klamath Basin area remains only fair after getting off to an unusually good opening, according to Jim Cromwell, U.S. Game Management agent.

Cromwell notes that shooting has been generally spotty with some reports of good hunting along the Stateline where wind conditions are favorable.

Upper Klamath and Agency lakes have also provided fair shooting on geese and ducks. A large number of shovellers are present in this area reported in fine condition.

The new Klamath Forest Marsh is providing good teal and some goose hunting in that portion of the refuge open to hunting. Best shooting is reported in the vicinity of Little Wocus Bay. The area open to hunting is well posted and no difficulty should be encountered in selecting your hunting spot.

Chargers Get Shot At League Title-Tie

Sid Gillman claims his unbeaten San Diego Chargers would "do all right" in any pro football league and could win the championship anywhere with about six more players.

Gillman's Chargers, winners of eight straight, can clinch a tie for the Western Division title of the American Football League this weekend. If the second-place Dallas Texans (3-4) lose to Boston Friday night, and San Diego (8-0) thumps the New York Titans in a rematch Sunday, the Chargers could lose them all and still wind up in a playoff.

The Chargers' coach, who has coached the Los Angeles Rams in the National Football League from 1955 to 1959, said in San Diego today that he was not concerned about throwing the new league out of balance.

Eagle Passer Now Second In Pro Stats

NEW YORK (AP)—Philadelphia's Tommy McDonald is moving toward the top among pass receivers in the National Football League.

McDonald jumped two notches Sunday in the Eagles' 27-24 triumph over the Washington Redskins and pulled into second place behind the Los Angeles Rams' Jim Phillips.

The NFL's weekly statistical report released today shows McDonald has caught 34 passes for 519 yards and 5 touchdowns. Phillips snared 38 for 660 yards and 3 touchdowns.

Sonny Jurgensen clung to the lead as the No. 1 passer with 111 completions in 191 tosses for 1,724 yards and 14 touchdowns. All of Philadelphia's three touchdowns against the Redskins came on Jurgensen's aerial strikes.

Green Bay's Jim Taylor remained at the top among the ground gainers, rushing for 618 yards in 111 thrusts. Cleveland's Jimmy Brown is right behind him with 610 yards on 153 plays.

Paul Hornung of Green Bay added 10 points to his scoring total in the Packers' 28-10 victory over the Minnesota Vikings and has 102 points, 36 more than runner-up Lenny Moore of Baltimore.

Detroit's Yale Lary tops the punters with an average of 47.9 yards; Green Bay's Willie Wood, punt returns, with 8 for 184 yards; Detroit's Pat Studstill, kickoff returns, with a 40.1 yard average, and Pittsburgh's Johnny Sample, pass interceptions, with 8 for 141 yards.

Elk Hunter Success Fair

Approximately 50,000 elk hunters enjoyed clear weather and good hunting conditions on the opening weekend of the state-wide elk season resulting in a pleasant and successful hunt. The conduct of hunters was generally good and many bull elk were taken.

Game commission reports show the opening weekend in the coastal units was orderly and successful. The controlled seasons in the Clatsop, Wilson, Trask, Douglas and Siuslaw units produced a large number of bulls and there were no hunting accidents reported. The loss of protected animals was less than in past years.

Although the conduct of the majority of the 5,000 hunters in the Clatsop unit was exceptionally good, a few careless individuals violated the 9 a.m. opening and shot 13 protected animals. With the cooperation of indignant hunters, enforcement officers apprehended a high percentage of the known violators.

The south coast hunt was considered on a par with past years. In the popular northeastern Oregon game management units, hunters encountered up to 14 inches of wet snow at the higher elevations which was laid down by storms earlier in the week. Hunter success was considered below normal on many ranges, especially in the higher country.

Baby Buffalo Top Lineman Say Pollsters

Steve Barnett, known as the "Baby Buffalo" to his University of Oregon teammates, was selected as the Lineman of the Week today by The Associated Press.

Barnett, a 252-pound tackle, won the honor in the weekly Associated Press poll of sportswriters and broadcasters for his sterling play that helped Oregon beat Washington 7-6 last Saturday.

Gifted with exceptional speed and agility, he played a terrific defensive game. Len Casanova, Oregon coach, reportedly said after the game that Barnett played a "perfect defensive game."

Steve is a 20-year-old junior from Fremont, Calif. He stands 6 feet, 1 inch and is very durable. He played 378 minutes last year as a sophomore and is regarded as one of the best tackles on the Pacific Coast.

Barnett beat out his teammate, Kent Petersen, a senior end from Long Beach, Calif. Petersen caught several key passes and, like Barnett, played a bangup game on defense.

Two other ends, Hal Bedsole of Southern California and Pat Richter of Wisconsin, were cited for their fine play.

Sox, Card Hurler Star

NEW YORK (AP)—Don Larsen of the Chicago White Sox and Curt Simmons of the St. Louis Cardinals topped the major league pitchers in batting during the 1961 baseball season.

Larsen, who started the campaign with Kansas City, led the American League hurlers at bat with a .311 average, statistics compiled by The Associated Press showed today. The big right-handed swinger collected 14 hits in 45 at bats.

Simmons, a southpaw hitter, batted .303 in pining National League pitchers. A former Philadelphia whiz kid who found the comeback trail with the Cards, Simmons delivered 20 hits in 66 trips.

Kansas City's Joe Nuxhall ranked second in the American League with a .292 average on 19 for 63. Frank Baumann of the White Sox was third with .262. He had 16 hits in 61 at bats.

Ray Sadecki of St. Louis was runnerup to Simmons with a .233 average, going 22-for-87.

Newly-Wed Gopher Back Earns Honor

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Sandy Stephens of Minnesota, a sandy new bridegroom picked as Back of the Week in The Associated Press poll, isn't quite ready to fully credit his new-found football fortunes to his week-old marriage.

"I don't know yet," said the mild-mannered young man with the bruising style of play. "If things don't go right with Michigan State Saturday, the experts just may reverse themselves."

The Gophers coaching staff has kiddingly attributed Stephens' spurts to his marriage to an attractive St. Paul, Minn., girl two days before the Michigan victory last Saturday.

In that game, the 215-pound whirling dervish passed and ran the Gophers from seemingly sure defeat to a 23-20 come-from-behind victory. Despite legging 63 yards for one touchdown, passing 45 yards for another and throwing for four points on two pass-conversions, Stephens still was pressed for the weekly AP honor.

Close behind him were John Hadl of Kansas, Dave Hoppman of Iowa State, Galen Hall of Penn State, Ron Miller of Wisconsin, Larry Benz of Northwestern, Pat Trammell of Alabama and Jay Wilkinson of Duke.

"I'm just happy I guess," said the Uniontown, Pa., youth when told of his selection.

Indian Back On Sidelines

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Tests at Stanford confirmed Tuesday that sophomore quarterback Steve Thurlow has mononucleosis, a blood ailment.

Coach Jack Curcio said the standout signal caller will be held in the hospital until Thursday and will probably not play until the Indians meet California in the Big Game Nov. 25.

Rod Sears and Chuck Butler will share the quarterback duties in the meantime. Oregon invades Stanford Saturday.

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Texans Claim Offense Edge Over Rebels

NEW YORK (AP)—Texas' undefeated and untied Longhorns are the No. 1 offensive unit in the country and could bring new honors to the Southwest Conference, which never has provided major college football's total offense leader.

Texas has rolled to 2,632 total yards in conquering six opponents and leads Mississippi's Rebels by 20 yards in the latest tabulations released today by the NCAA Service Bureau. Together they have compiled the best six-game total yardage figures for two teams in a decade.

The Texas juggernaut was rambling to 1,967 yards on the ground, an average of 327.8 which also gives the Longhorns the No. 1 spot in rushing offense, and have averaged 438.7 a game over-all. Mississippi, second in passing with a 185.0 per game mark, is No. 2 in total offense with a 433.7 average.

Detroit is the top team in passing with 1,070 yards gained via the aerial route in five games for a 214.0 a game clip.

The Longhorns also can become the first team in the pass-conscious SWC to nail down a rushing championship. They lead runner-up New Mexico State, which has averaged 284.6 a game on the ground.

Owens Drives Husky Squad

SEATTLE (AP)—Coach Jim Owens drove his Washington Huskies through a long workout against offense patterns of the Trojans of USC Tuesday.

Afterward, Owens labeled the drill "very satisfactory," but he said plenty remains to be done if the Huskies are going to be able to cope successfully with USC when the Trojans invade Seattle Saturday.

After the first, second and third strings worked out against USC plays run by the fourth team, the Huskies polished some plays of their own.

For the sixth straight week, tackle John Meyers will be a co-captain. End Lee Bernhardt will be the other.

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
