Noted Humorist, James Thurber, Dies Thursday

NEW YORK (UPI) — In death, the boy who roamed the streets of Columbus, Ohio, as Jamie Thurber will return to that Midwestern wellspring of his humor—his talent now compared with that of Mark Twain.

James Thurber died late Thursday at 66. The author-humorist-cartoonist-playwright had entered Doctors Hospital a month ago for surgery for a blood clot on the brain. Pneumonia set in this week.

Burial was scheduled in the Thurber family plot in Columbus, the town where he was born "on a night of wild portent and high wind in the year 1894" and grew up amid a family of glorious eccentricity, which had a passion for Civil War and dogs—one of which bit the lieutenant-governor of Ohio but was immediately, according to his mother, sorry.

Compared to Twain
In its obituary today, the New York Herald Tribune called Thurber "perhaps the greatest humorist this country has known since Mark Twain, but, like Twain, he was far more."

Danny Kaye, the comedian who starred in the movie made from Thurber's short story "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty," said he be-

lieved Thurber was a humorist of Twain's stature and that "Walter Mitty" would be as universal and immortal as "Huckleberry Finn."

William Shawn, editor of the New Yorker, the magazine on which Thurber began his rise to fame in 1927, called Thurber "a master among comic artists, one of the great American writers of our time, and one of the few great humorists in all literary history... his writings and drawings were loved by millions of people throughout the world."

Suffered Blindness
James Grover Thurber wrote some 25 books and did thousands of comic cartoons; he did essays, sketches, New Yorker "casuals," a full-length biography of New Yorker founder Harold Ross; he co-authored the play "The Male Animal" with his former Ohio State University schoolmate Elliott Nugent; he acted in the recent musical "A Thurber Carnival," made from his writings.

And yet, for the last two decades he had been, for all practical purposes, blind. When he was 6, he lost his left eye in an accident. When he was 40, a cataract began developing in the other eye. Surgery failed to help; gradually he lost his sight.

East Braces For First Cold Wave

The season's first major cold wave, spawned in the far north, knifed deep into the midlands today. Residents braced for possible sub-zero temperatures and heavy snow.

The killer storm already had claimed a number of lives, including five in the Colorado-Wyoming areas which got an unwelcome preview of the mighty arctic front Thursday.

The clash of the cold front with tropical air from the Gulf of Mexico touched off tornadoes in the Southwest and flooding in Kansas and Nebraska. Elsewhere, it produced strong southerly winds which brought record high temperatures to Chicago, Indianapolis,

lis, Nashville and other midwestern cities.

Heavy Snow Falls

Winds of up to 60 miles an hour were reported as the near-blizzard storm howled eastward across the plains states Thursday night and early today. In their wake, they left mountain communities paralyzed by snowfalls of up to 16 inches.

Montana was the first state hit as the storm blasted in from Canada Thursday. The mercury plummeted 45 degrees in parts of the state, dropping to 19 below zero at Drummond, Mont.

Then it moved southward into Wyoming, New Mexico and Colorado and eastward through the Dakotas, Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin.

The first snow of the season, some of the flakes the size of a

half-dollar, fell in the Texas Panhandle.

Storm Heads Eastward

The twisters struck at Pleasant Hill, La., Grandview, Tex., Parks, Ark., and Cherokee, Kan., but no fatalities were reported.

The weatherman said the fast-moving storm would spread eastward and southward today. The front fringes were expected to move into Louisiana, Kentucky and Ohio.

The Weather Bureau predicted a hard freeze as far southeast as the Ohio River and as far south as Oklahoma. The mercury was slated to drop as low as 10 to 20 in Wisconsin and in the 20s as far south as central Illinois by Saturday morning.

Strike Ends In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — A strike against six Portland furniture and upholstery companies has ended with union acceptance of contract proposals by employers.

A spokesman for local 65 of the Upholsters International Union reported that members Thursday voted 116-55 in favor and said they will return to their jobs Monday.

The contract, to be in effect until next Sept. 1, provides a 7½-cent hourly pay boost retroactive to Oct. 16 and a one per cent increase in health and welfare benefits to take effect next April 1. The spokesman said it is comparable to a settlement worked out recently with Seattle-Tacoma Area manufacturers and upholsterers.

Expense Claims Spark Arrest

PORTLAND (AP) — Multnomah County Surveyor Donald Ewing was arrested Thursday on a charge of attempting to obtain money by false pretenses.

Details of a grand jury indictment against Ewing will not be disclosed until he is formally charged in court.

Ewing posted \$500 bail and was released. Bail was set originally at \$1,000.

County Auditor John J. O'Connell had refused payment on mileage vouchers Ewing submitted for last spring and summer. The board of county commissioners supported O'Connell's contention that the vouchers were not substantiated.
