Geiger of Alsea. The candle-light double ring ceremony was read in a setting of white gladioli and large pink chrysanthemums at 8 o'clock by the Rev. Robert C. Groves.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. Her gown featured a fitted bodice of Chantilly lace over bridal satin with long bridal point sleeves and an illusion neckline of tulle, joined to the bodice with scalloped outlines in lace. The very full satin floor length skirt was covered first with a tulle skirt of tiered ruffles, then one of plain tulle. Over this was an overskirt of Chantilly lace, peplum length in front and cascading at the sides to full length in back. It also was finished in scalloped English silk illusion veil of place by a crown of aurora borealis crystals, borrowed from her sister-in-law, Mrs. Richard Seideman. Her bouquet was a white orchid centered in white feathered Mefo chrysanthemums.
