

# Jackie Kennedy Plans India, Pakistan Trip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, who already has visited five foreign countries in her 10 months as First Lady, has scheduled an unofficial and private visit to India and Pakistan, starting about Nov. 29.

She will be gone about two weeks, according to a White House announcement made late Friday.

There were no details of the places she will visit or how she will travel on the journey some 8,000 miles from Washington.

The White House said only that the First Lady would go to the two countries "in a private and personal capacity" to visit educational and research centers and to view the historical art treasures of the two neighboring nations.

She made a similar vacation visit to Greece last June after accompanying the President on earlier state visits to Canada, France, Austria and England.

Mrs. Kennedy will be traveling at her own expense, the White House said.

The Indian Embassy indicated that some of the planning on the Indian portion of her trip may be made Monday when President and Mrs. Kennedy entertain India's prime minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, and his daughter, Mrs. Indira Gandhi, in Newport, R.I. They extended the invitation to Mrs. Kennedy through U. S. Ambassador J. Kenneth Galbraith and will be Mrs. Kennedy's hosts in India.

In Pakistan, the First Lady will be the guest of President Ayub Khan and his wife.

The White House said Ayub discussed the visit with Mrs. Kennedy when he was here on a state visit last July. The Kennedys gave the visiting Pakistani president an unusual state dinner at Mount Vernon, the home of George Washington.

There were rumors at the time that an invitation had been extended. Recently there were reports from Pakistan that both President and Mrs. Kennedy planned to visit there next spring.

If Mrs. Kennedy leaves about Nov. 29 as reported, she will miss the birthdays of her two young children, Caroline, who will be 4 on Nov. 27, and John Jr., who will be 1 year old Nov. 25.

She also would be absent from the traditional Kennedy family gathering at Hyannis Port, Mass., for the Thanksgiving holiday.

It is not known now whether Mrs. Kennedy will be accompanied by anyone from her family or from her White House staff. When she went to Greece, she was accompanied by her sister and brother-in-law, Prince and Princess Stanislaus Radziwill, who live in London, and her White House social secretary, Letitia Baldrige.

# Job-Holder Total Sets New Record In October

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The number of Americans with jobs climbed to an October record last month but unemployment failed to drop significantly, the Labor Department reported.

The unemployment rate held at 6.8 per cent of the labor force for the 11th month in a row.

Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg, in a statement cabled from Japan, said failure of the rate to decline is disturbing.

"This underscores that we have a stubborn and continuing problem," he said.

The number of employed jumped by 786,000 to 67,824,000, a new high for October.

But with more than 600,000 persons entering the labor force, unemployment declined by only 151,000 from September to October. This was a normal seasonal drop. October is usually the low point of the year.

Thus, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate continued to indicate that 68 of every 1,000 persons in the labor force were out of work and looking for a job.

Failure of the jobs rate to drop from the high level reached during a business recession last

December is a disappointment to the Kennedy administration.

Seymore Wolfbein, the Labor Department's manpower expert, told newsmen a drop had been expected by autumn.

Wolfbein acknowledged that the report showed no improvement in the basic health of the economy, but only "a seasonal movement."

# Dumps Show No Activity

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An investigation of two atomic waste dumping sites more than 30 miles off the California coast has uncovered no radioactivity, the Atomic Energy Commission reported today.

The commission said it is conducting a similar study of two Atlantic Ocean dumping sites.

The AEC said in a statement its study of the Pacific dumping grounds—located more than 6,000 feet below the ocean's surface—disclosed "no detectable radioactivity attributable to waste disposal operations."

One of the Pacific sites is 48 miles west of San Francisco. The other is 32 miles southwest of Port Hueneue.

The AEC said about 14,000 curies of radioactive material in 22,000 packages has been dropped in the first area since 1946.

# California Recovering

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—With the exception of manufacturing, all nonagricultural employment in California has recovered from the 1960-61 recession, the Department of Industrial Relations said today.

Manufacturing has recovered only one-third of its loss while nonagricultural employment rose to an all-time high of 5,082,200 wage and salary workers in September, Director John F. Henning said.

Average hourly earnings of California factory workers rose slightly from August to an increase of about 10 cents an hour in September, Henning said.

The department noted in its monthly bulletin that one of the state's fastest growing nondurable industries is printing and publishing "where employment continues to rise to new highs month after month."

The department said employment has risen in the missile and electrical industries, despite the industries being slowed by the recent recession.

Employment exceeds that in September, 1960, by 15 per cent in missiles and 4 1/2 per cent in electrical equipment.
