The largest crowd ever to attend an Oregon A-1 prep football championship game was the 21,512 which watched Medford shade Jefferson 7-6 in 1959, nearly 8,000 people more than were on hand the year previous when Jeff won 21-7 over the Tornado.

The smallest crowd on record attended the Jefferson-Salem game in 1957... Jeff won that one, 12-7.

Renfro Ruins Tribe

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Sel-dom has one player done so much in so little time as Oregon's Mel Renfro did against Stanford in the Ducks' 19-7 victory Saturday.

The fleet sophomore halfback, returning to action after an injury five weeks ago, played less than 10 minutes.

He scored touchdown on runs of 4 and 94 yards and passed 39 for Oregon's other TD.

Stanford had 20 first downs to 13 for Oregon and outgained the Ducks 265 to 260.

Yet Renfro rushed twice for a total of 19 yards, hit his only pass attempt for the touchdown, caught a screen pass gaining 17 yards and ran the 94 with a kick-off.

The 19-year-old speedster has been clocked in 9.6 seconds for 100 yards and 13.9 for the 120-yard high hurdles. He used his speed Saturday.

On the debit side, Oregon lost the services of its halfback and co-captain, Mickey Bruce, who suffered a dislocated shoulder in the first half and probably is out for the rest of the season.

Despite the victory, Oregon coach Len Casanova wasn't happy, saying, "we played sloppy ball, made mistakes we hadn't made in a long time. When the chips were down, we did all right. We played poor defense, our guards pulled too soon sometimes and a thing like two men in motion is bad stuff."

Under California rules it goes as a knockout.

Clay, who is ranked fifth nationally as a light heavyweight, filled in for Argentina's Alejandro Lavante, who suffered a split lip in a sparring session Wednesday.

The Coyotes struck for three touchdowns in the first quarter, one in the second, two more in the third and wound up the game with four more in the final period.

Len Lutero passed for four touchdowns, and Bill Cunningham and Gary Matlock each accounted for one successful touchdown throw.

College of Idaho's glue-fingered Len Leonard hauled in four of the touchdown passes, laterally to Matlock for the fifth. Ed Bradbury hauled in one pass and tossed it to Moyal Kirk, who plunged over the score.

Linfield Rolls Over Pacific In 46-0 Tilt

FOREST GROVE (AP) — Powerful Linfield rolled to its seventh straight victory of the season Saturday night, crushing hapless Pacific University, 46-0.

The Linfield attack was led by quarterback Bill Parrish's passing arm. Parrish, a senior, hit 11 of 15 in the first half for three touchdowns and 210 yards as the Wildcats rolled up a 32-0 halftime lead.

Parrish accounted for 239 yards total passing during the evening. The victory clinched at least a tie for the Northwest Conference championship for Linfield.

Pacific put up a surprisingly tough struggle in the second half to hold the powerful Wildcat to touchdowns. One Pacific score was nullified by a penalty.

Pacific threw an eight-man line against Linfield to try and stop its powerful running game, and succeeded well, but left the airline open for Parrish and his receivers.

Still, Steve Beguin ran for two touchdowns and gained 113 yards, and his running sidekick, Bill Dressell, scored one TD and ran up 106 yards in 17 carries.

Ole Miss Dreams Smashed

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Jerry Stovall, a 193-pound half-back, streaked 57 yards to set up a touchdown and Louisiana State smashed Mississippi's dreams of a national championship with a 10-7 victory over the Rebels Saturday.

Stovall's dart through the Rebel line came late in the third period and paved the way for a 7-yard touchdown run by halfback Wendell Harris.

Mississippi ranked second in The Associated Press poll. LSU was rated sixth.

Mississippi kept the 68,000 screaming fans tense until the final seconds when LSU end Gene Sykes recovered Rebel quarterback Glynn Griffing's fumble on the Tiger 36-yard line.

LSU moved out front midway in the first period when Harris booted a 37-yard field goal.

But Griffing and starting Rebel quarterback Doug Elmore opened a passing attack and got Mississippi rolling just before halftime.

Griffing tossed to end Wes Sullivan for 2 yards and a touchdown to give the Rebels a 7-3 lead.

A 22-yard field goal attempt by Sullivan in the third quarter came just two plays before Stovall found a weakness in the Mississippi line and scampered to the Rebel 23.

Fresno State Earns Mercy Bowl Berth

LONG BEACH (UPI) — Fresno State, a small school with a big line, will meet Bowling Green in the Mercy Bowl on Thanksgiving.

The Bulldogs rolled to their fourth straight California Collegiate Athletic Association title and earned the right to face Bowling Green in the Los Angeles Coliseum when they overpowered Long Beach State 37-14 before 4,682 fans at Veterans Stadium Friday night.

The Bulldogs, rated the fifth strongest small college team in the land, struck for two touchdowns in the first period, added a touchdown in the second and then cracked the game wide open with a 17-point third quarter avalanche.

Fresno, which usually snows under the opposition with its depth in the fourth period, did a turnaround Friday while coasting to its 19th straight conference victory over four years. For the first time this year the Bulldogs failed to score in the final 15 minutes of play.

Duke Snider of the Los Angeles Dodgers has accounted for 384 in the home run derby, socking 16 homers in 1961. He jumped from eighth to seventh, trailing Musial, and leading Mantle by 10.

Babe Ruth is the all-time home run leader with 714, followed by Jimmy Foxx in second place with 534, Ted Williams in third with 521 and Mel Ott in fourth with 511. Then come Gehrig (493), Musial (444), Snider (384), Mantle (374) and Mathews (370).

Ralph Kiner rounds out the first 10 with 369.

Homecoming Tilt Is Defense Battle

The Oregon Tech Owls and the Oregon College Wolves didn't prove a thing when they battled to an exasperating 7-7 tie in the chilly sunlight on Modoc Field Saturday afternoon.

The standoff was the feature attraction of the 1961 Oregon Tech Homecoming celebration but it left the Techmen and the Wolves tied for second in the Oregon Collegiate Conference and finished up league play for each. Both now own a 2-1-1 OCC mark.

The two teams, neither of which can claim a sparkling passing attack, broke about even in every department of the statistics except for punting and fumbles.

The visiting eleven was forced to punt six times while the Owls had to kick only four. However, the Techmen found another way to get rid of the ball.

They fumbled four times and lost each of them while the Wolves were only charged with two lost balls.

The biggest play of the ball game was a 74-yard touchdown run by OCE's big Clayton Ladd the first time the Wolves got their hands on the ball in the third quarter. Ladd crashed off right tackle from his own 26 and out-ran OTT's Lanny Myers to put the Wolves on the scoreboard first with 11:48 left on the third.

Teammate Bruce Carpenter kicked the conversion and the Wolves had a 7-0 lead that held up until Techmen evened the count with 11:36 left in the final frame.

The only solid sustained drive of the game ended when Owl Harvey Graham sprinted 10 yards around left end for the Owl touchdown and Bud Maupin followed up with a successful kick.

The score culminated a march that began on the OCE 48 with 2:08 left in the third quarter. It took the Techmen 13 plays, including a pair of short passes from quarterback Bill Ransome to halfback Andy Cook for a total of seven yards, a five-yard run by Cook and an eight-yard gallop by Jack McCreary in addition to Graham's 10-yarder, to get on the scoreboard.

The Owls got their last chance to score with 1:26 left when they collected an OCE punt on the Wolves' 37 and moved down to the 23 in six plays.

Maupin came in to attempt a last-ditch field goal with 19 seconds to go but the try was wide to the left and way short.

The game ended as OCE quarterback Chuck Burns faked a pair of passes and collected 27 yards before turning the job over to Steve Villwock with one second left. Villwock connected with Don Habel, who was downed far short of a first down as the gun sounded.

Ladd was the offensive star, grinding out 137 yards in 17 trips in a strictly ground-defensive struggle.

His closest competition came from OTT's Graham who netted 76 yards in 20 carries, drawing the bulk of the Owl assignments after Stan Glass was sidelined with a broken rib in the second quarter.

Before leaving the game, Glass collected 43 yards in 12 trips.

Bob Pennell, the conference's leading ground-gainer, was limited to 41 OCE yards in 11 carries as the Owl defensive unit lived up to its reputation. He was also credited with 16 yards off pass completions from Burns.

The Tech defenders caused the Wolves to lose 36 yards on the ground while they were charged with only a minus four.

The deepest Owl penetration during the first half was to the Wolves' 45 as either fumbles or pass interceptions stopped their push.

The visitors punched to the Owl five at the start of the second period but a fumble erased the thrust.

The Wolves got in as far as the 27 late in the second stanza but here a pass interception spoiled their threat.

Kubek Swaps Yank Suit For GI Duds

FT. LEWIS, Wash. (AP) — New York Yankee shortstop Tony Kubek, bridegroom of two weeks, swapped his baseball uniform Saturday for the GI duds of an Army private.

The famed "Red Arrow" of Wisconsin's 32nd Division decorated his fatigue jacket on his second call to Army duty. He hurriedly put the insignia on after his arrival late Friday "to be in style."

He may have referred to other major league stars called up.

Kubek, 25, was separated from his bride until the first of next week. The routine processing of all newly-arrived soldiers was ahead during the weekend.

Kubek and his wife arrived from Milwaukee in a late model station wagon packed to the top with bags and personal gear late Friday. He said "we loaded up as much as we could, but we had to leave a lot of nice wedding gifts at home."

They looked happy as he introduced his bride to his commanding officer.

He was then assigned and began to unpack his newly-acquired gear.

Kubek had six months Army duty after induction in October, 1958. On release he became a reservist, and the recent call-up put him back in uniform again.
