

Ducks Whip Stanford 19-7; Oregon State Edges WSU 14-6

Mel Renfro Paces Oregon Offense

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Oregon's fleet halfback Mel Renfro came off the injured list to score the first time he carried the ball Saturday. He passed for another touchdown and ran back a kickoff 94 yards for a third as the Ducks whipped Stanford 19-7.

Hurt on Sept. 30, Renfro saw only limited service this sunny afternoon but turned in an unlimited performance.

He smashed four yards for his opening TD in the first quarter. Then on the final play of the second, Renfro threw a 39-yard pass to end Paul Burlison to give Oregon a 13-0 halftime advantage.

Uclans Wreck Bears

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Tailback Bobby Smith led a relentless ground attack that wrecked the out-weighted California Bears and UCLA moved a big step closer to the Rose Bowl Saturday with a 35-15 victory.

A crowd of 33,792 watched the winning Bruins stop an imposing mark of two wins against no losses in the Big Five Conference run for the roses at Pasadena New Year's Day, Cal is 1-2.

A free for all fight broke out in the last 15 seconds as both teams mixed it up for more than a minute in midfield.

The bowl chances of UCLA were further enhanced by the 0-0 tie at Seattle between Southern California and Washington.

The hard-running Smith, a 193-pound senior, scored three touchdowns, one on a beautiful 63-yard jaunt, kicked a 26-yard field goal and ran for two points after one touchdown.

California went ahead briefly in the first quarter on a dazzling 70-yard run by sophomore Alan Nelson. It came quickly after the Ducks' field goal. A 190-pounder, Nelson hit a pile of players, bounced off, was struck again, rebounded and then went all the way.

ASHLAND (Special)—The Ashland Junior High football team scored a fourth quarter touchdown and followed with a pass for the conversion to defeat the Klamath Union frosh football squad 7-0 here Saturday afternoon.

The game was played on the muddy Ashland high school field. The defeat was the third one-touchdown loss for the baby Pelicans, their fourth loss in six starts. The game wound up the KU season.

Crimson Satan Richer

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Crim-son Satan, ridden by the veteran Willie Shoemaker, came with a rush around the far turn and into the stretch for a victory Saturday in the world's richest race — the \$301,365 Garden State Stakes — by 2 1/2 lengths at Garden State Park.

Backed to 6-5 favoritism by a crowd of 37,015, the chestnut 2-year-old son of Spy Song earned \$180,819 for owner Peter Salmen Sr. of Detroit, who almost sold the horse for \$12,000 at a yearling sale just a year ago.

Although the horse did the running in this 1-16-mile run for 2-year-olds, Shoemaker gave the Salmen colt a magnificent ride, moving him in and out of others in the field of 11 like a halfback picking his hole and blockers.

Shoemaker thus became the first jockey ever to win in the same year the Gardenia, Garden State's rich run for 2-year-old fillies, and the Garden State. The "Silent Shoe" won the Gardenia here two weeks ago aboard Christopher T. Chenery's Cicada.

Navy, Army Air Force Are Winners

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Greg Mather, 226-pound Navy end with a magic toe, kicked his seventh and eighth field goals of the season Saturday and the Middies defeated Notre Dame 13-10.

Halfbacks Doug Chan and Wayne Walker scored the other touchdowns for Willamette and quarterback Tommy Lee, who played a masterful game, kicked barefoot five conversions.

End Dave Barker scored twice for UBC, both on passes from quarterback Gerry Garkner, and fullback Roy Bianco scored the other UBC touchdown. Barker kicked two conversions in three attempts.

Minnesota Upsets Michigan Staters

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Inspired Minnesota, with slick quarterback Sandy Stephens directing a surprise unbalanced line attack and hurling a 23-yard touchdown pass, upset nationally top-ranked Michigan State 13-0 in a crucial Big Ten football game Saturday.

Halfback Bill Munsey, benched by injury the past three games, scored both Gopher touchdowns, one on a lateral from Stephens and the other on the 23-yard payoff toss by Stephens.

The Gophers, stealing a page of the erstwhile unbeaten Spartans, unveiled an unbalanced line for the first time this season and impressively punched over in the first and last quarters.

Michigan State, a 7-point favorite and suffering its first defeat after five victories, could do no better than pierce to the Minnesota 5 in the first quarter. It was MSU's first shutout defeat in 26 games.

OSU Withstands Passing Attack

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Oregon State's Beavers, their backs to the wall in the second half, withstood a brilliant passing performance by Dave Mathieson to edge Washington State, 14-6, today.

The Beavers scored both their touchdowns in the first half on the strength of some crisp offensive blocking and fine pass catching by Don Kasso.

Washington State, playing listless ball in the first half, did not make a first down until midway through the second period and never threatened until Mathieson look over for Cougar starter Mel Melin, near the end of the half.

Mathieson, a sturdy 6-1, 205-lb. sophomore, completed 16 of 23 passes for 183 yards. He directed the Cougars on a 34-yard drive to the Oregon State 37 before the end of the half, then mixed end sweeps and sideline passes on an 8-play, 54-yard touchdown drive in the third period.

Fullback George Reed booted the final three yards. Moments earlier, a 65-yard Cougar drive fumbled on the Oregon State two.

Penal ties and an unfortunate break cost WSU at least one touchdown in the fourth period.

Kasso, recently converted to the split end position after playing two years at halfback for Oregon State, caught nine passes from quarterback Terry Baker, including a two-point conversion.

All of his catches came after he had drooped a long pass while in the clear early in the first period. Beaver fullback Tom Gates cracked the Washington State middle, Leroy Whittle swept the end, and Baker passed sharply to Kasso on both OSU touchdown drives.

The first went 43 yards in the first quarter on 12 plays, the other 24 yards in six plays in the second quarter. Whittle and sub fullback Bruce Williams scored the Beaver touchdowns on one-yard plunges.

The second beaver TD was set up when the nation's leading pass catcher, Hugh Campbell of Washington State, nabbed a bullet pass from Melin, then threw the ball away trying to lateral to a teammate cutting across. OSU recovered and went on to score.

Quarterback Baker, who usually picks up good yardage on end sweeps, kept the ball only twice and lost a total of 16 yards. He depended on Gates, Whittle and Williams for most of the ball carrying. Between them, they handled 41 of Oregon State's 53 rushing plays.

Campbell showed the Beaver homecoming fans plenty of skill by catching eight passes. Two other receptions were nullified by penalties.

Huskies, Trojans In Tie

SEATTLE (AP) — Stout defensive work by two rugged lines, plus occasional miscues by both clubs, added up to 60 minutes of scoreless play Saturday when Southern California and Washington clashed in a Big Five Conference football game.

Washington actually crossed the goal line once on a 50-yard gallop by quarterback Kermit Jorgenson but a holding penalty erased the touchdown.

The weather was sunny but crisp and both teams fumbled frequently. Threats by both teams usually ended in a fumble or pass interception but each club turned in a sturdy last-ditch stand near its own goal.

Aside from the nullified touchdown, the closest either team got to the enemy goal was the 10-yard line. Southern Cal's Trojans powered to the Washington 10 in the third period. With a yard to go on fourth down, the Huskies line stopped Hal Tobin for no gain. In the fourth quarter Washington ran a fourth-and-one play at the Trojan 30 and was stopped cold.

Each team also took one try at a field goal. Washington tried for a 3-pointer in the second period from the Southern California 30 but Dave Kopay's kick fell short. The Trojans, stalled at the Washington 13 in the final quarter, called on Carl Skvarna for a field goal effort from the 20 but his kick was wide.
