

# Green Bay Ace Has Two Games Left

## GB, Colts Sharing Spotlight

The disappointing Baltimore Colts will have this battle cry Sunday in their National Football League game with the Green Bay Packers: Stop Paul Hornung.

Hornung, the Packers' star halfback and field goal kicking artist, dealt the Colts misery a month ago when Green Bay clobbered Baltimore 45-7. He scored 33 points and made 111 yards rushing in the NFL's finest individual performance so far this season.

The game will be Hornung's next to last this season. He will report for military service Nov. 14.

Green Bay leads the Western Conference with six victories and one loss. Baltimore has a 3-4 record.

The Green Bay-Baltimore duel shares the spotlight today with an interconference game at Philadelphia between the defending champion Eagles (6-1), Eastern Conference leaders, and the Chicago Bears (5-2).

Elsewhere, the Washington Redskins (6-7) visit the New York Giants (5-2); the Pittsburgh Steelers (2-5) journey to Cleveland (5-2) for a test against the Browns, who will have halfback Bobby Mitchell in the lineup despite his Army induction, and the St. Louis Cardinals (3-4) invade Dallas to meet the Cowboys (4-3) in eastern action.

Mitchell was inducted into the Army earlier this week and sent to Ft. Meade, Md. late Friday. Mitchell and defensive end John Paluck of the Redskins received permission from Ft. Meade authorities to be absent from 4:30 p.m. Saturday until 6 a.m. Monday.

Other activity in the Western Conference finds the Detroit Lions (4-3) at San Francisco, where the 49ers (4-3) hope to snap a two-game losing streak, and the Minnesota Vikings (1-6) at Los Angeles for a date with the Rams (1-6).

Although the Packers are elated by the news Hornung will be available for two more games, Green Bay will have to get by without middle linebacker Ray Nitschke, who has reported to the 32nd division at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

"Please clarify the following: Is a team on offense or defense when it receives a punt? If it's on defense, then how come it's running the ball? Or if the receiving team is on offense, then isn't the punting team on defense?"

(s) Another bewildered football fan.

The answer: The punt-receiving team is on the defense. This is true regardless of whether there might be a runback of the punt or signal for a fair-catch. It might be well to note that punt-returns, kickoff-returns and runs originating from the recovery of a fumble are not included statistics. Only plays originating from the line of scrimmage are considered in the yardage gains.

A team is on the offense only after having set itself in an offensive formation.

Hope the answer is satisfactory... but I'm curious as to what circumstance may have prompted the question.

There's only one thing tougher in the Western Hockey League than trying to keep the Edmonton Flyers from scoring — and that's scoring against them.

Soaring Albertans made it seven victories without a defeat Friday night with a 4-1 win over the Calgary Stampeders, and set the rest of the league to wondering who's going to stop them.

Friday night's only other contest saw the Vancouver Canucks ram home a goal with only 49 seconds to play to edge the Seattle Totems, 3-2.

The Flyers, who have allowed their opponents only 12 goals in their seven games, opened up a 2-0 lead in the first period on winners by Chuck Holmes and Don Poole.

Both teams were shut out in the second frame, and then Ed Joyal scored again for the Flyers to make it 4-0. Ron Leopold spoiled Edmonton goalie Dennis Riggan's shutout at 15:23 of the third period, then Roger DeJordy added the final insult for Edmonton with a backhand goal at 19:40.

Vancouver's last minute win came on Dave Duke's second goal of the night. Duke first hit the net after only 26 seconds of action in the first period.

Bob McCusker scored again for the Canucks in the opening period before Don Chipka answered for Seattle. The Totems' Bill MacFarland scored midway in the third period, setting the stage for Duke's tie-busting goal.

The win moved Vancouver into third place in the Northern Division with six points, one more than Calgary.

## SL Tongue Lashing Results In Victory

That tongue lashing owner Ben Kerner gave his St. Louis Hawks several days ago seems to have had the desired result.

The defending Western Division champions in the National Basketball Association snapped out of their complacency Friday night to whip the Syracuse Nats 106-94.

It was a 107-90 defeat by Syracuse last Tuesday night that caused Kerner to give his team a dressing down behind closed doors the next day.

Kerner couldn't complain about Friday night. The Hawks put forth a good team effort. Bob Pettit led with 33 points and Cliff Hagan got 20. Big Clyde Lovellette who Kerner said "had been taking a lot of guff that belonged to everyone" finished with 19.

In other NBA games the de-

fending champion Boston Celtics shipped Philadelphia 112-96. Cincinnati ended the five-game winning streak of the Los Angeles Lakers 122-114 and the Chicago Packers defeated New York 129-118.

Bill Russell and Bob Cousy sparked the Celtics to their victory over Philadelphia and Wilt Chamberlain. Cousy scored 27 points and set up many others. Russell blocked so many of Chamberlain's shots that the Warrior star finished with 28 points compared to his game average of 51.2.

Oscar Robertson was back in form Friday night with 31 points to lead the Royals. He got 18 in the third quarter when Cincinnati broke the game wide open. As usual Elgin Baylor topped the Lakers. He got 30 points.

## Hornung Okayed By Army

CHICAGO (AP)—Halfback Paul Hornung of the Green Bay Packers was found physically fit for Army duty Friday but will not report until Nov. 14 enabling him to play two more National Football League games.

Hornung, the league's scoring champion the last two years, underwent a series of tests at Great Lakes Naval Training Station last week. He was ordered to report for duty at Ft. Riley, Kan., and will join the 896th Army Engineers Company.

The 26-year-old former Notre Dame star was surprised at the decision. Bothered by a pinched nerve in his neck, he expected to be disqualified.

He revealed in Milwaukee that he had been told he was "disqualified" after his first physical Oct. 25.

"At that time I was told that due to the jammed nerve in my neck I was disqualified," Hornung told football writer Bud Lea of the Milwaukee Sentinel in an exclusive statement.

However, the Army ordered Hornung to the Great Lakes hospital for a more thorough examination.

Hornung and teammates Ray Nitschke and Boyd Dowler were recalled as Army Reservists. Nitschke reported for duty Friday but Dowler was deferred for two weeks before reporting to Ft. Lewis, Wash.

Like Hornung, Dowler will be able to play against Baltimore Sunday and the Chicago Bears this week.

Sen. Alexander Wiley, R-Wis., reportedly suggested to the Defense Department that the three players be deferred until the end of the season Dec. 17.

"I'm sorry that a few people in politics thought they had to take part in this," said Hornung. "At no time did I or any members of the Packer organization make a request for a deferment through a congressman or anyone else."

The Packers lead the Western Division of the NFL with a 6-1 record, one game ahead of the Bears. The Packers will have to play five games without Hornung and Dowler and seven without Nitschke.

## Tommy, Slammer Get O.K.

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP)—Sam Snead and Tommy Bolt, two veteran golfing professionals who were suspended in September for ducking the Portland, Ore., Open tournament, will be reinstated next Tuesday.

The Professional Golfers Association's appeals committee, meeting here Friday night, reduced their suspensions for six months to 45 days and their fines from \$500 to \$100 each.

"It was the committee's decision that Snead and Bolt have been punished enough for the incident," said PGA President Lou Strong.

Both Snead and Bolt told the committee they did not intend any violation of PGA rules. They were required to obtain permission in order to play in a pro-amateur tournament in Cincinnati last Sept. 23-24.

Bolt did not apply for an excused absence. Snead sent a telegram to Portland officials the morning of Sept. 23 but was already on the course when information came from Portland that he could not be excused.

## U Of Miami Win Sparked By Ace QB

## THUMB OUT OF ball first, left foot at right angle to foul line. Ball Release Important

Releasing the ball properly is not difficult, but it is important. Once you let go of the ball, things are out of your hands. Nothing you can do after that, not even the most violent body English—has any effect.

The ball should be released smoothly, not dropped or thrown, but rolled. It should slide on to the lane with the grace and smoothness of an airplane making a perfect landing.

Phyllis Notaro, BPAA All-Star champion and the highest average woman bowler in the country, says the final slide should end as close to the foul line as possible, without crossing it, of course. The action arm should continue out as though reaching toward the target and continue upward in a natural, flowing motion.

The thumb should come out of the ball first. The left foot should be at a right angle to the foul line. Be balanced during the release. Phyllis advises trying to stand in your foul line position until the ball reaches the pins.

If you can do this, you have been well balanced during the release and follow through.

# Exuberant Fans Nearly Cost Patriots' First Place Perch

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Patriots may try to patent the frantic finish.

Exuberant fans almost cost the club its undisputed first-place perch Saturday in the American Football League's Eastern Division.

A spectacular 91-yard sideline dash by Ron Burton on a kickoff return late in the third quarter gave the Patriots a 28-21 triumph over Dallas Friday night, then with 10 seconds to play, a surge of spectators almost took it away.

There were 35 seconds remaining when a desperation Dallas bid from a double reverse plus lateral chicamery sent a pass from Texan territory to the Boston 3. A faulty clock showed no time left and the crowd spilled onto the field.

The game officials told The Associated Press there were 10 seconds to go on the official time-piece and time would have run out before Dallas could get off another play. But the crowd forced a time out call to clear the field.

The Patriots rushed passer Cotton Davidson on the next play. So did a spectator, though the latter veered away on his charge through the end zone before he got to the goal line. The ball was battered down by Chuck Shonta, saving the victory.

Boston Coach Mike Holovac, unbeaten in four games (three victories, one tie) since he succeeded Lou Saban, was ecstatic.

"Not much offense, not much defense—just great football," Mike said.

Two games earlier in this stretch were settled with time running out. Gino Cappelletti's field goal with three seconds to go nipped Dallas 1-7 last Sunday. Houston came back to tie the Patriots 31-31 on a George Blanda field goal with five seconds remaining.

New York, Boston's partner sharing the Eastern Division-lead prior to Friday night, figures to fall a full game behind facing San Diego's unbeaten powerhouse (8-0) Sunday while Oakland is at Buffalo and Houston at Denver.

"When they needed it, they had it," said Holovac in his review of his players' performance. "They made a lot of mistakes but played great football when they had to. That's what we're trying to sell out there. The fans love it."

Holovac praised the tremendous pass catching of Dallas' Chris Burford whose efforts "you just can't defend against."

## SPORTS TRIMMINGS

ASHLAND (Special)—"I really don't know how good we will be this year," said Dr. Ted Schopf, coach of the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders who sent his 1961-62 basketball squad through its initial paces here last Wednesday.

The Raiders may have 10 returning lettermen all told, but Schopf isn't keeping it any secret that he's banking on the incoming crop of freshmen and newcomers to bolster this year's SOC squad.

"Last year I thought that we might have the personnel to come out with a good record, but Oregon Tech and some of the other teams we played seemed to have other ideas," Schopf mused. "Now we have another big group of lettermen, but we still lack that necessary 'big' height that is almost necessary for any college team in the country to have."

Last winter the Raiders started off fast, winning their first four Conference games. After that, however, the roof descended and the Ashland collegians finished with a 6-10 OCC win-loss record and 9-16 over the entire season.

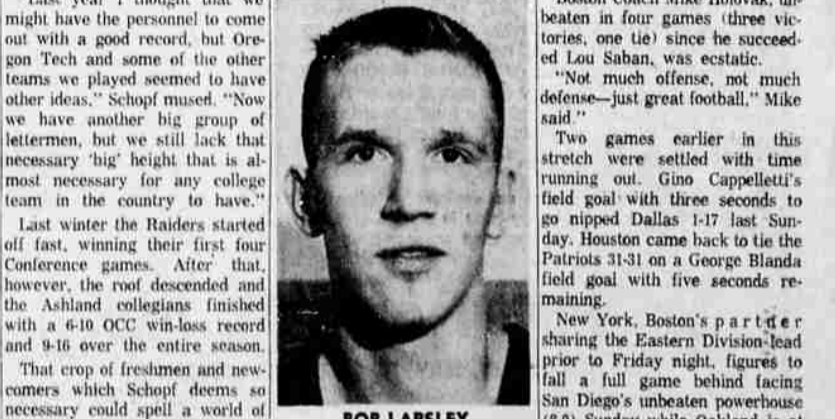
That crop of freshmen and newcomers which Schopf deems so necessary could spell a world of difference this season. Included are players with some height, and still others with tremendous potential.

Among the freshmen crop are 6-foot-6 Roger Lenbert, ex-Corvallis high center, who was on the Spartan starting five last year which rode the ability-laden frame of Larry Enos into the State Tournament at Eugene. Others include Royce Kiser, 6-3 frosh, from Camas Valley High where he averaged 25 points per game last winter and was named to the Journal All-State second team prior to tournament play. Also, Gary Fox from Douglas and Tom Perdue from Eagle Point, both top-notch A-2 cagers in the state last year.

And... not to be forgotten is freshman guard Bob Lapsley, a member of Klamath Union's State A-1 champions last March. Bobby, who now stretches to a height of 6 feet even, is a good ball handler who has caught Schopf's eye in the early Raider drills.

"That boy," pointed out the veteran coach, "handles himself real well. From what he's shown so far, he could be a real fine reserve guard for us this year. He has the shooting ability, speed and ball-handling ability — not to speak of his play-making and setting up."

Lapsley, a cool and collected ballplayer on any basketball court is being dealt a big responsibility for being only a first year player. Schopf, however, figures the top four guard positions on the SOC quintet right now—and out make it.

One other SOC team worth mentioning at this time is the Raider cross country squad. . . . After losing its first two meets, Dan Bulky's crew has come up with three straight wins, including a victory over the highly-touted Chico State Wildcats last weekend.

Bulky, who is anxiously looking forward to track season next spring thanks to a wealth of material on hand, has high hopes for his distance-running harriers . . . as far as their performances in the upcoming Conference and District 2 NAIA meets are concerned.

The Raider squad has been improving its individual performances with each meet, and Bulky has nothing but words of praise for his No. 1 and 2 men, Terry Boatman and freshman George Ives . . . not to speak of the rest of the SOC squad members . . . Jerry Andt, Jamie Herring, Mike Swanson, Harry Cogle and Klamath Falls' Ken Coffman.

It has been strongly hinted that a sterling showing in the OCC and NAIA meets by the Raiders could earn the entire squad a trip to the NAIA championships late this month in Omaha.

That may be setting one's sights a bit high . . . but Bulky and his hard-working crew have set the Nationals as their goal . . . and don't be too surprised if they make it.

## Sprinter 'Noticed' By Enemy

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The guy American Football League clubs watch the closest is Charlie Hennigan, a sprinter who just can't be covered by one man when going for a pass.

At least that's what George Blanda, the Houston quarterback who throws to Hennigan, says.

"No one man can cover him — he's got the best moves in the league and a real quick burst of speed," observes Blanda.

Before the Buffalo-Houston contest last week, Coach Buster Ramsey revealed this defensive strategy: "We're going to try to stop Charlie Hennigan. He's the big key. They like to throw to him on third down plays."

Buffalo didn't stop Hennigan, who caught nine passes for 232 yards and two touchdowns.

In fact, no team this season has stopped the fleet, thin man who is well on his way to the most yards on pass receptions of any player in professional football.

With 1044 yards on 43 catches, Hennigan should easily better 1500 yards, more yardage than any pass receiver ever gained. Houston still has seven games to play.

Hennigan is from Minden, La., and played his college football at Northwestern Louisiana.

The Oilers got good reports on him and he made the club as a rookie last year despite two painful leg injuries and a shoulder injury that kept him out of two games. He snared 44 passes.

Three weeks ago at Boston Hennigan caught 13 passes for 272 yards—an American Football League record.

Only two men in pro football—Jim Benton of Cleveland in 1945 and Cloyce Box of Detroit in 1960—gained more yards than that.
