

New York's Striking Milkmen Back On Jobs

NEW YORK (UPI) — Striking milkmen, their two-week walkout settled, returned to the job today, opening the flow of milk to 10 million New York City and Long Island customers.

Dairy industry spokesman said the settlement would cost consumers one to two cents more for a quart of milk. The average price for home-delivered milk has been about 27 cents a quart.

The Teamsters Union ordered three striking locals to return to work after agreeing to a settlement calling for an \$11 a week wage and welfare package and binding arbitration on one unresolved issue — the method of recording and computing route drivers' overtime.
