

Minnesota, LSU Coaches Share Honor

NEW YORK (UPI)—One was facing the No. 1 team in the country and the other was facing the No. 2 team, and each found himself a one-touchdown underdog.

But both men guided their teams to stunning upset victories and that's why, for the first time in history, United Press International "Coach of the Week" honors in college football were divided today between two men.

So—hall to Murray Warmath of Minnesota, whose Golden Gophers handed top-ranked Michigan State a 13-0 beating, and hall to Paul Dietzel of Louisiana State, whose Bayou Bengals followed suit a few hours later by whipping second-ranked Mississippi, 10-7, under the lights.

Each week the 35 famous coaches who make up the UPI football ratings board nominate one coach as the man who did the top job on the preceding Saturday. But this week Warmath and Dietzel received exactly the same number of votes.

But then the pattern has been the same almost all season for Minnesota and Louisiana State.

Both were highly touted at the beginning of the year. Each lost its opening game, but Minnesota now has come storming back to win five in a row and Louisiana State has won six in a row. Minnesota has pulled up to the No. 5 slot in the national UPI rankings and Louisiana State has topped that by going to No. 4.

Warmath and Dietzel agreed without hesitation that squad enthusiasm was the main factor in their upset triumphs.

Tigers Trip Host Logger Eleven 19-0

MOUNT SHASTA (Special)—After breaking even with the Loggers for the first half of the ball game the Dunsuir Tigers came up with a trio of touchdowns in the final periods to annex a 19-0 victory over Mount Shasta here Saturday night.

The host Logger eleven was able to penetrate the Dunsuir defenses relatively easy during the first and second quarters but a tumble and penalties nullified any scoring chances.

The Dunsuir squad got on the scoreboard in the third when Bear-Hisey bucked over from the two after a steady downfield march.

They added another pair of TD's plus a conversion in the fourth frame to sack up the win. Ed Fischer scored twice, once on a five-yard run and once off a 30-yard pass tossed by Paul Burton. Hisey kicked the lone conversion.

Dunsuir coach Walt Butcher was high in his praise of Burton's offensive efforts and also lauded defenseman Jim Moore for his work in halting Logger thrusts.

Argentina's Jumpers Win

NEW YORK (UPI)—Argentina's brilliant precision jumpers, led by Lt. Eduardo Castaing, wound up the New York National Horse Show Tuesday night with a victory in the Nations Cup and a smashing overall triumph.

With Castaing turning in two perfect rides in the two-part team event, Argentina won the Nations Cup by a wide margin and raised its total team points for the eight-day show to 106. Canada was second with 63 points and the United States, the pre-show favorite, finished with 62.

Mexico was fourth with 30 points and Ireland was fifth with 32. The five teams now move on to Toronto to compete in international jumping at the Royal Winter Fair next week.

Argentina completed the Nations Cup event with 12 1/4 faults to 17 1/2 for Canada. Mexico had 4 1/2 and Ireland 11 1/4. The United States withdrew after Kathy Kusner on Sinjon went off course as the first rider in the evening section of the competition.

Pittsburgh, Hawaii Breeze Through ABL Maple Quintets

Pittsburgh and Hawaii were leading the young American Basketball League today and the ease with which they won Tuesday shows they may be tough to dislodge.

Pittsburgh breezed to a 105-99 win over Chicago Tuesday night before a turn-away capacity crowd of 13,816. Hawaii debuted at Washington and garnered a 91-76 triumph. Los Angeles took care of San Francisco 119-98 in more ABL action.

The Pittsburgh franchise looks like one of the league's most solid. Some 5,000 fans were turned away from Tuesday night's game which also featured the Harlem Globetrotters.

On the court, the Rens also looked tough as they grabbed a 50-40 half-time lead and dominated the second stanza about the same way.

Hawkins Scores 27

Connie Hawkins, who just

turned 20, led the way with 27 points. The front line of Hawkins, George Patterson and Joe Cincibello controlled the boards against the Majors, who appear doomed to a second division ABL finish unless they can find that one good big man every basketball coach hopes will turn up.

Hawaii faced a tough task as they played their first game far from home against a rugged Washington team.

But Hawaii grabbed a 47-42 half-time lead and then blasted the Tapers off the court in a 22-10 third quarter.

Former William and Mary center Jeff Cohen looked like a good one as he popped in 20 points while Frank Burgess, who led the nation's collegiate players in scoring at Gonzaga last year, added 17 to the well balanced Chief attack.

But it was on defense that the Chiefs especially looked sharp.

During the third period, Washington was able to sink only a trio of field goals and the bewildered Tapers were repeatedly forced into playing errors by the pressing Chiefs.

Win and Lose

Los Angeles and San Francisco have met each other some 14 times in exhibition and regular play now and there is still little to choose between them as they keep knocking each other off.

Tuesday night it was the Jets' turn as they piled up a 20-point lead and then lost it. Former National Industrial League scoring champ Danny Swartz sparked the Jets with 29 points while 7-foot-1 Bill Spivey tossed in 23. Kenny Sears led the losers with 22 markers.

A full slate tonight finds Pittsburgh (2-0) at Washington (1-2); Cleveland (1-1) at San Francisco (3-2); Los Angeles (2-2) facing Chicago (1-3) and Hawaii (1-0) meeting Kansas City (1-2) in a twin bill at Kansas City.

Oddsmakers Rate Iowa Pick Over Gophers, UW Gets Nod

NEW YORK (UPI)—The oddsmakers, obviously feeling that the old betting axiom of "horses for courses" also applies in college football, today listed twice-beaten Iowa as a two-point favorite over Minnesota in one of Saturday's key games.

Minnesota has won five straight, including a 13-0 shocker over previously unbeaten Michigan State last week, while Iowa has lost its last two games—to Purdue and Ohio State. In addition, Minnesota is ranked No. 5 nationally and Iowa 16th.

However, Iowa always runs wild against Minnesota at Iowa City, where this weekend's game will be played, and this apparently had a large bearing on the odds. The Hawkeyes whipped Minnesota by such scores as 33-0, 44-20, 26-0 and 27-0 in their last four meetings on their home field.

All the other top 10 teams are picked to win this weekend, most of them by comfortable margins. Top-ranked Texas is a 10-point pick over Baylor and third-ranked Ohio State is favored over Indiana by the same margin.

Second-ranked Alabama, eighth-ranked Mississippi and ninth-ranked Colorado are such prohibitive favorites that no odds are quoted on their games. Alabama meets Richmond, Ole Miss has a date with Chattanooga, and Colorado faces Utah.

In the only major Friday night contest, UCLA is a seven-point favorite over Texas Christian.

The odds on Saturday's other major games:

East—Harvard 1 over Princeton, Columbia 2 over Dartmouth, Notre Dame 3 over Pittsburgh.

South—Navy 3 over Duke, Kentucky 3 over Vanderbilt, LSU 12 over North Carolina, Georgia Tech 7 over Tennessee, Clemson 7 over South Carolina, Florida 9 over Georgia, Maryland 9 over North Carolina State, Auburn 10 over Mississippi State, Miami (Fla.) 14 over Tulane.

Midwest—Michigan State 6 over Purdue, Northwestern 6 over Wisconsin, Iowa State 6 over Nebraska.

They took a major step in that direction Tuesday night, defeating The Hawks 127-110 behind the slick shooting of Elgin Baylor and Jerry West.
