Congressman Asks Status For Troops

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Connecticut congressman who is a former West Pointer and Army officer has asked President Kennedy to prevent enlisted men from being used as "officers' servants."

Rep. Frank Kowalski, D-Conn., said he wrote to Kennedy Friday after he received a report on an investigation he had asked the Office of the Comptroller General to make at Ft. McNair in Washington.

Kowalski said the federal auditors reported that 25 sergeants were doing nothing but household duties for 14 senior military officers and one State Department official living on the post. Their names were withheld.

Pay and allowances for the men add up to about \$120,000 a year. Their duties were listed as including making beds, lawn and bar tending, cleaning, chauffeur and the like.

Kowalski, who has been crusading against such use of enlisted men since he entered Congress in 1953, said the situation at Ft. McNair was just one example.

His mail and reports show, he said, that 3,000 to 5,000 enlisted men are assigned to household jobs for officers.

He figures this total would rise to "at least 30,000" with the inclusion of enlisted men working in officers' clubs, commissaries and in assignments of "little or no value to our national defense."

In his complaint to the comptroller general last August, Kowalski, a former colonel estimated that taxpayers were footing a \$180-million servant bill for military brass.

Kowalski advised Comptroller General Joseph Campbell—whose office watches over government spending—that it would not be easy to get to the bottom of "the corruptions of these directives and violations of law."

Regulations permit use of enlisted personnel by senior officers for duties including "care of quarters," Kowalski said, but the law specifically forbids using personnel as servants.

Kowalski blamed the situation on senior officers, their wives and enlisted men "who often enjoy their plush assignments and join in collusion to frustrate any investigation."

In one case the Ft. McNair study showed a staff sergeant, trained as a stewardess, draws pay and allowances of \$5,275.20 a year to look after the yard, do housework and serve meals occasionally for a three-star general.

Seven Youths Picked Up In Lodge Burglar Probe

Seven Klamath Falls youths, ranging in age from 16 through 18, were in police or juvenile department custody Thursday morning on charges that they burglarized the Moose Lodge, 1010 Pine Street, last Friday night.

Three 18-year-old youths were arrested Wednesday and booked at the city jail on charges of burglary not in a dwelling. They were Terry R. Stafford, 2236 Vine Street; Samuel A. Herrera, 638 Owens Street, and Steve E. Taylor, 2853 Front Street. The other four youths, two 16 and two 17, were held for juvenile authorities.

City Juvenile Officer Ray Howard and Juvenile Counselor Gene Olp investigated the burglary, in which 40 bottles of whisky and some candy and cigarettes had been stolen. Lodge officers said the whisky was worth more than \$300. Howard said some of the loot has been recovered.

One of the juveniles was already in custody at the juvenile home in connection with another burglary Sunday night at the Medo-Land Creamery, 1500 Esplanade Street. Taylor had been arrested outside the creamery for being drunk and was also questioned about that burglary, in which four cases of beer were stolen.

Howard said the youths had apparently climbed through a rear window of the Moose Lodge and had two doors open on the inside of the building. The whisky and small items were behind the bar.

Alderman released a copy of a letter from the organization to Gov. Edmund G. Brown, detailing the aims of the organization.

"We are not a private army, rebel rousers or guerrilla bands," the letter said. "We are a non-profit, self supporting organization whose members are 100 per cent pro-American and for the Constitution of the United States. We are definitely against any person or groups of persons who are in the least way anti-American, against the Constitution or the American way of life."

Alderman told the governor "we sincerely hope you were not referring to the Minutemen" when Brown reported to the annual conference of the U.S. Civil Defense Council last month that guerrilla bands plan to shoot citizens "entering areas designated by the selfish as their own." Alderman said that in case of a major emergency "we would share our food, medical equipment and supplies with the population."

Transient Fire Costs \$40,000

PORTLAND (AP)—It was chilly in Portland this morning and a transient is thought to have built a fire in a warehouse of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railway Co. to warm himself. It got out of hand and caused an estimated \$40,000 damage.

The cause was not known for certain but firemen said they had a report of an unidentified man running from the area about the time the alarm was turned in at 2:45 a.m.

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
