Five Attend Fairs Meet From Tule

TULELAKE—William Whitaker, secretary-manager of the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fair and directors, Chester J. Main, William G. Hagelstein, Bill Ganger, Tulelake, and Carol Robinson, Mt. Hebron, were present in San Francisco, Oct. 30 through Nov. 2 for the 39th annual convention of Western Fairs Association.

The delegates participated in more than 30 meetings, clinics, and panels relating to all phases of the fair industry, including sessions conducted by the Fairs and Expositions Division of the Department of Finance, and the Joint Committee on Fairs Allocation and Classification, headed by State Sen. Edwin J. Regan of Weaverville.

Registrants also participated in the unveiling of a "publicity kit," which officials said had been designed in an effort to generate 200 pre-fair special editions of newspapers, by providing them with 200 news stories, as well as photos, cartoons, illustrations and advertising aids. The kit, which will also include other materials prepared after a six-month survey of the news media field to determine methods which may help fairs in the presentation of a localized story of the industry, as well as to assist in the development of advertising in relation to fairs.

Man Arraigned For Assault

Jay C. Lemire, well known Klamath Falls businessman and past exalted ruler of the Elks Lodge, was arraigned in circuit court Monday on a charge of assault and battery.

Lemire was indicted secretly last week by the grand jury. After the charge was read, Lemire's attorney asked for additional time to consider the indictment. Judge Donald A. W. Piper set 10:45 a.m. next Tuesday as the time for a plea.

The charge involves an alleged incident on Sept. 15 at the office of Acme Concrete Co., 1920 Washington Way, which is owned by Lemire. Eddie Morrison was at the office discussing a bill on some hauling services which had been performed by Morrison when Lemire allegedly threw a hatchet at Morrison.

Lemire, about 42, lives at 1331 McClellan Drive. He posted \$1,000 cash bond Monday and was released from custody.

Kennedy Experiments In Public Relations

CHICAGO (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy opened a series of White House experiments in grass roots public relations today with an assertion that the administration has scored victories against recession, segregation and crime.

Kennedy was the keynote speaker at the start of a dozen "White House regional conferences" at which key cabinet officials will go on the stump to stir up interest in their domestic programs.

President Kennedy spoke to the Chicago conference via long distance telephone from Washington.

Kennedy told the conference "if we can provide a strong economy here at home, then we can maintain our position abroad with more effectiveness."

He called the conference non-partisan, saying "we believe that it's vitally important that the government remain close to the people."

Robert Kennedy and Undersecretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz were the stars of the Chicago conference. In St. Louis, Welfare Secretary Abraham Ribicoff and Commerce Secretary Luther Hodges addressed another White House conference.

The meetings have come under fire from Republicans who charge they smack too much of politics. Kennedy maintained the meetings were a "new extension of one of the basic principles of democracy—the belief and conviction that democracy can work only when the electorate is well informed."

Kennedy said a rise in the national product to \$40 billion dollars, a \$10 million increase in gold entering the United States, and boosts in industrial production, corporate profits, and personal labor and farm income show that "clearly...we are on the road to economic recovery."

He said the improvement came about from "the passage of effective new legislation...for effective administrative action...cooperation between federal, state and local governments...and a natural turn of events."

On crime, the attorney general said new laws passed by Congress represent more fresh legislation against crime than the country has known since the 1934 era of public enemy No. 1 John Dillinger.

"There has been a reaction on the part of gamblers in every section of the country to curtail their illegal activities so that they will be less vulnerable to federal prosecution," Kennedy said.

Mark's Slip Draws Fire

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's Gov. Mark Hatfield was berated Monday by a group of women because he had failed to proclaim United States Day last month.

The governor said the day had come to his attention too late.

"We are getting away from moral and spiritual values," said Mrs. Evelyn Burke, Portland, spokeswoman for the group of 42. "I am opposed to world understanding. I'm pro American."

Soldiers who defected in Korea did so, she said, because they had not been indoctrinated in Americanism.

Turning to a personal attack, one woman told the governor he didn't read the Bible. He replied that he reads it daily.

Another said "You can't be Christian and support the United Nations."

Hatfield responded: "The United Nations is one of the places where we can fight communism." The UN, he said, does not legislate but is a world forum.

He was told "this sort of support for the UN would mean the end to his political career."
