Wall Street

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market's newest upsurge ran out of steam and the market was irregular late this afternoon as trading slackened from its heavy early pace.

Volume for the day was estimated at 4.7 million shares compared with 5.09 million Wednesday.

Gains and losses of fractions to a point or more prevailed among most key stocks.

High-priced Hershey Chocolate was off about 13 points on disappointed stock split hopes.

General Motors, which inspired Wednesday's great rally, was ex-dividend and off a fraction. Most other motors dipped slightly.

International Business Machines halved a nearly 6-point gain. U.S. Gypsum, responding to a dividend hike, gained more than 2.

Losses exceeding a point were taken by Texaco, Liggett & Myers, Johns-Manville, Schering and Eastman Kodak. Xerox and Sears Roebuck were off about a point.

Prices were mixed on the American Stock Exchange after early gains were trimmed. Trading was heavy.

Corporate bonds were higher. The U.S. government list remained mostly unchanged.

Fraud Case Deliberated

PORTLAND (AP) — A federal district court jury deliberated today on whether 10 persons tried to defraud insurance companies by faking automobile accidents.

The case went to the jury Wednesday noon, ending a trial that lasted eight weeks.

Judge Charles L. Powell of Spokane, presiding in the trial, said the case was full of contradictions.

"I need not remind you that this case bristles with issues of veracity. In instances too numerous to specify the testimony of the witnesses called by the government is flatly contradicted by the testimony of the defendants. It is your function, and yours alone, to decide where the truth lies," he told the jury.

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Cattle Rustling Trial Drags Into Fourth Day

A cattle rustling trial dragged into its fourth day Thursday morning in Judge David R. Vandenberg's circuit court and rival attorneys estimated that the end is a long way off.

The first two state witnesses required two days of questioning and the third witness, Brand Inspector Everett Malone, was expected to take at least a full day.

Ralph D. Huitt, 31, Chiloquin, is accused of shooting a calf on Aug. 11 which was owned by Frank Sagehorn of Red Bluff and being pastured by Dayton O. Hyde on the Yamsay Ranch 28 miles north of Chiloquin.

Calving charges against Huitt and his brother, Robert L., 29, were dismissed at a district court preliminary hearing in Astoria.

Jury Decides Pusser

Morals Case Thursday

A circuit court jury was expected to decide the fate Thursday of Jerry N. Pusser, 21-year-old Klamath Falls youth accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Pusser testified in his own behalf Wednesday afternoon as the defense wound up its case. He denied that he committed an immoral sex act on May 28 with a 9-year-old girl, the basis of the charge against him. He said the girl never was at his house on May 28.

Pusser lives at 1038 Fremont Street with his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Pusser, and their five young children. Four of the children testified Wednesday that the 9-year-old girl was often at their house prior to the alleged incident. The Pusser family, excluding Jerry, had gone on a trip to Washington state early on May 28.

The alleged victim had testified Tuesday that she went to the Pusser home around 8 a.m. on May 28. She said Jerry Pusser was alone in the house. The little girl continued that Pusser took her to the bedroom, where he committed the immoral act. She said he told her to leave when Heinz Werner, a next-door neighbor, came to the house.

Werner's testimony was that the little girl was outside the house and that he was with Pusser all but 10 minutes of the morning.

The trial is in Judge Donald A. W. Piper's circuit court.

Chamber Committees Hear Duties; Board Approves Budget Of \$31,500

President Fred Ehlers of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce Wednesday read charges to the various chamber committees which had been decided upon at a Tuesday evening policy and planning session of the board of directors.

Little change in the duties and responsibilities of the chamber committees was noted.

Ehlers also said the board had approved a budget of \$31,500 for operations this year. Included in the budget was \$2,500 as a drawing account for the chamber divisions. Chairmen and directors of these divisions were asked to submit a projected estimate of expenses as soon as possible.

Also included in the budget was an item of \$600 for purchase of conference room furniture to replace the present folding chairs and "pieces of plywood strung between sawhorses," Ehlers said.

A report is expected Nov. 15 on mosquito abatement, Ehlers said. Also, at the Nov. 15 meeting an educational film, "Washington at Work," will be shown.
