Oregon Tech Battles OCE '11' Saturday

The Oregon Tech Owls, humiliated at their homecoming last week by the powerful Southern Oregon College Red Raiders, will attempt to save some face this weekend when they travel to Monmouth to take on the improving Oregon College of Education elevens.

The Owls simply didn't have anything working for them last Saturday in the 50-0 loss to SOC. "We played our worst game of the year," said Coach Ron Pheister. Their effort must be much better this week or they will fall to OCE.

"We were hurt by the loss of Cecil (Ed) in that game," Pheister said. Cecil was hurt early in the game when he had some ribs badly bruised and had to leave the contest. "He was the only center we had and his loss hurt us," Pheister said. He was also

one of the top defensive men at his linebacker post. He will be back this week for the OCE game.

The Owls didn't help themselves statistically last week, either. They finished the game with minus 46 yards rushing and minus 27 net for the game. Averages took a sharp dip for most part while the opposition continued to build up a massive statistical lead.

Claire Hawkins, big 250-pound fullback, was the only Owl runner who finished with plus yards in the rushing department. He is now the second leading ground gainer with 94 yards in 39 carries for a 2.4 mean. Ken Lewers continues to lead the rushers with 115 net yards for a 3.3 mean although he finished with a minus five yards rushing against SOC.

The Owls are hopelessly behind in most statistics. The Owls have

rushed for a net of only 401 yards in the six games this season while the opponents have amassed 102 yards. The Owls have 166 air yards to the foes' 895. The Owls' net yardage is 567 to the opposition's 1,627.

The Owls have connected for only 24 of 96 passes and had nine of them intercepted. Forty six of 112 have been completed against the Owls and eight of them picked off. The Owls, however, have lost only eight fumbles to the foes' 11.

Marvin Massey continues to show well in the punting department despite some bad centers and being booed hard all season. He has booted 31 times for 1,038 yards and an average of 33.3. Bill Ransom got off a quick kick of 44 yards against SOC.

The Owls have only this game and a non-conference tilt with Grays Harbor remaining on the schedule and both are away.

Maris Tabbed Flop Of Baseball In '62

NEW YORK (UPI) — Only one short year after he was the toast of baseball, New York Yankee slugger Roger Maris was tabbed the flop of the year today by the United Press International.

A UPI board of 24 baseball experts singled out Maris as the season's No. 1 disappointment in a close vote with the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Cardinals.

Six of the 24 experts selected Maris, five picked the Tigers and four chose the Cardinals. The failures of individual stars Norm Cash, Don Schwall and Jim Piersall and the team failures of the Baltimore Orioles, New York Mets and Chicago White Sox also were noted.

The figures tell the story of the difference between the Maris of 1961 and the Maris of 1962.

In 1961, Maris established a new home run record of 61 in a season despite the enormous pressure of chasing "the ghost" of Babe Ruth and learning to live in a goldfish-bowl atmosphere.

That performance plus a league leading total of 142 runs batted in enabled Maris to win a second straight American League Most Valuable Player award. He rose into the \$70,000 class as a salary performer and stood alongside Mickey Mantle as a Yankee superstar.

The only hitch was his .298 batting average — an average which caused some baseball experts to sneer at his 61-homer feat and to predict that he would never again come close to that total.

Maris' 61 home runs made him a marked man in 1962.

Sir Roger did not take kindly to the situation. He believed his 61 homers spoke for themselves as an achievement and he resented any criticism. He frequently engaged in arguments with newsmen during spring training and definitely wore a chip on his shoulder at the start of the season.

It developed that American League pitchers were only too happy to knock it off. Maris' batting average dipped to .256 in 1962, his runs batted in total fell to 100 and his home run total—the key to the entire image of Roger Maris — spiraled downward from 61 to 35.

Actually, Maris put in a good season of work for the Yankees. Despite his uneven home run hitting, he delivered frequently in the clutch, drove hard day after day and played an impeccable right field. In emergencies, he also filled in for the injured Mantle in center field and he did a good job there, too.

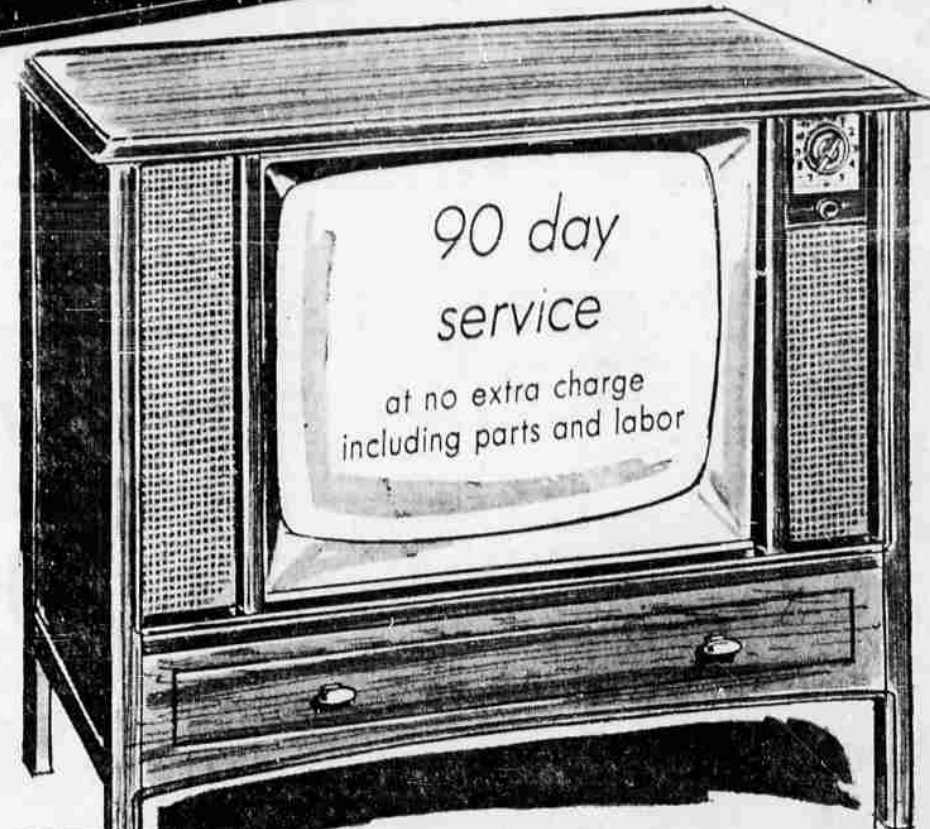

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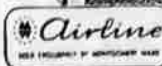
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
