



THE DOCTOR'S MAILBAG Solvents Ease Pull Of Adhesive Tape

Q—Pulling adhesive tape off of my 8-year-old boy is an ordeal because he has hairy skin. What can I do to make it easier?

A—Several solvents work, but some are not advised because of possible poisonous effects. Gasoline would be ideal if you could get it without any tetraethyl lead which most commercial gasoline now contains. Cleaning fluid containing carbon tetrachloride should be used only by an open door, or better still, out of doors. Lighter fluid is safe. You might try shaving the area to which the adhesive tape is to be applied.

Q—My doctor says I need more calcium. If I put an egg, shell and all, through my food blender, will this serve the purpose?

A—Eggshell is a rich source of calcium carbonate and as such is readily changed into soluble forms of calcium in the digestive tract. Finely divided eggshell has no appreciable taste.

Whether calcium in this form would meet your needs would depend on whether your blood contains sufficient phosphorus and vitamin D. This is a matter your doctor would know better than I would. If you do use the whole egg, be sure to wash it well before blending.

Q—I weigh 154 pounds and my doctor says I'm overweight. How many calories would I lose by walking a mile at 3 1/2 miles per hour?

A—A study made by the Army indicated that a person of your weight would lose 105 calories. Why not cut out desserts and walk two miles?

Ullman Says JFK Lacked Authority

BAKER (UPI) — Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., said today President Kennedy did not have authority under section 22 of the 1937 Agriculture Marketing Act to limit imports of Canadian lumber into this country.

Ullman issued a statement in connection with Gov. Mark Hatfield's request, made in Portland Tuesday, that the President limit Canadian imports.

"Even if lumber could be legally construed as an agricultural commodity, of which there is still some doubt, it would not be eligible for quota action because such authority is strictly limited under the law to agricultural commodities for which there is a specific government program under the agricultural act," Ullman said.

He added, "this grandstand play will fool no one who is knowledgeable on this subject."

Zealand Visits Here

Cliff McDonald, who has been spending many months abroad from his native New Zealand, part of the time in Klamath Falls, has returned for a second visit.

Since leaving here last July, he has lived and worked on a 1,300-acre wheat ranch in Central Kansas where he handled heavy machinery in the preparation of the land for fall seeding of grain. The harvest in the Midwest was largely over by the time he arrived.

The ranch also produced cattle and alfalfa hay and McDonald helped put up 14,000 bales of hay. His future plans are indefinite, may hinge on the loss of a run. On his plans to return to New Zealand, he left home last April.

Unlawful Aid Count Admitted

Ernest Stanley Gayhart appeared before Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenbergh early Wednesday and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of unlawfully obtaining public assistance last Oct. 18. Judge Vandenbergh set 10 a.m. Monday, Nov. 5, as the time he would pronounce sentence.

Gayhart's attorney recommended that his client be placed on probation and make restitution for more than \$7 in assistance he unlawfully received from the Welfare Department.

It was established that Gayhart has been unemployed but has since been promised work in the potato harvest.

Unemployment Declines To Lowest In 3 Years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Unemployment showed an unusually good decline in October, falling to a three-year low, Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz reported today. The number of jobs fell by 218,000 to 3,924,000.

As a result the unemployment rate declined from 5.8 to 5.5 percent of the total labor force.

The decline caught Labor Department officials by surprise. Before the figures were issued, Seymour Wolfbein, deputy assistant secretary of labor, said he hoped the rate would drop during October, but he did not foresee a big change in either direction.

The department's monthly report on the job situation also showed that the number of job holders rose by 225,000 in October, a record high for the month of 68.9 million. More significant, the department pointed out that non-farm employment has not increased since last May apart from normal seasonal expansion.

The month's employment figure marked an increase of about one million from a year ago. Unemployment was down about 640,000 over the year.

A normal seasonal decline in unemployment during October would have been about 50,000, meaning the drop was about four times what could have been expected.

Wolfbein expressed guarded optimism that "some downturn" in the jobless rate would be experienced in the months ahead. He said the rate might hover in the range of 5 or 5.5 percent.

He said the October labor force figures "show a substantial im-

provement in the economy since January, 1961," when President Kennedy took office.

But he added that "there are still far too many unemployed workers in the nation."

Error Noted In Thornton Job Figures

SALEM (UPI) — State Employment Commissioner David H. Cameron claimed Tuesday that employment figures put out by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton on a telecast in Portland Sunday were wrong.

Cameron added that he is "very disturbed" over the fact that the inaccurate figures were released by an assistant attorney general assigned to Cameron's office by Thornton.

On the telecast Thornton said official state figures showed that Oregon has lost jobs during the Republican administration of Gov. Mark Hatfield.

In a letter to Thornton, Cameron said the contrary is true. Oregon's average employment, Cameron said, increased from 644,300 in 1958 to 677,200 in 1961.

The national job rate increased 4.4 per cent nationally, and 3.1 per cent in Oregon, he added.

Thornton said Oregon lost 16,000 jobs in manufacturing since 1958, but Cameron said that in fact, Oregon has gained 2,000 such jobs the past three years.

Air Lift To India Set

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States will start air lifting military aid equipment to India this week, the State Department announced today.

Department spokesman Lincoln White said the equipment, which India requested for its border warfare with Red China, is expected to include light infantry weapons, ammunition and transport and communications equipment.

"We expect the first priority items to be airlifted to India this week," White said.

White said the United States would provide airlift facilities. Other officials said Britain and Canada were cooperating with the United States on military aid for India.

The State Department spokesman said: "The decision to supply defense assistance to India in response to Prime Minister Nehru's request is prompted by a specific situation. That situation is created by massive Chinese Communist aggression is a serious development and is so regarded by this government. In extending assistance to India, we are responding to an urgent need arising from a situation which is of concern not only to this country but to our allies as well."

Estimate Shows Prison Labor Cuts Institution Cost By \$10 Million

SALEM (UPI) — Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. and State Treasurer Howard C. Belton estimated today that if organized labor is successful in preventing the state from using inmate labor on state projects, it will cost another \$10 million a biennium to operate state institutions.

They contend that the action would apply to all wards, not just inmates of the penitentiary.

Appling and Belton are members of the State Board of Control, which oversees the institutions.

The Oregon AFL-CIO has brought suit against the board seeking to prohibit it from using prison labor to build the new women's prison here.

They said they expect a "similar suit will soon be filed by the Oregon printing industry, joined by various craft unions."

The laws being questioned, they said, apply not only to prison inmates but also to "all wards of our state institutions."

"Since Oregon has for many years relied quite heavily on these wards of the state to perform productive tasks in support of the operation of the various state institutions, it is apparent that a legal overthrow of the state use policy would shift a substantial burden of operating expenses to the taxpayers of Oregon," they said.

In a letter to J. N. Peet, board secretary, they directed him to prepare exact figures on how much additional revenue would be required to operate state institutions "if all such productive employment were legally prohibited."

Significantly, the third board member — Gov. Mark Hatfield — did not join in the estimate, or the request to Peet. Hatfield has taken the position that some use of inmate labor competes unduly with free labor. The board ousted him on this, 2-1, and went ahead with plans that included construction of a greenhouse at Dammasch State hospital by inmates, and the women's prison job.

Hatfield was not immediately available for comment on today's statement by Appling and Belton.

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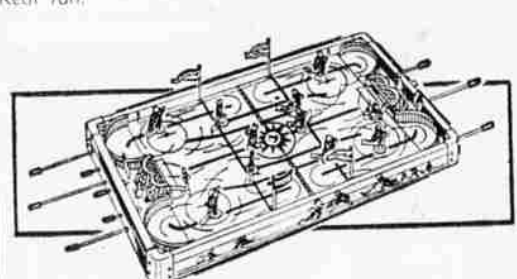
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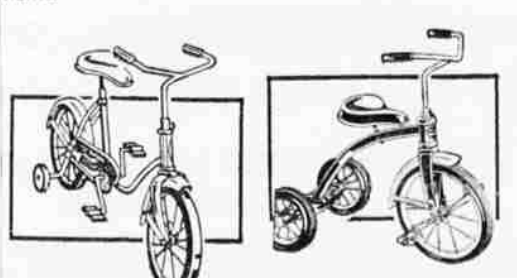
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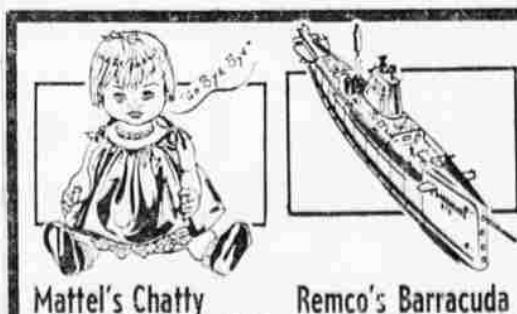


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
