Shutout Bid Fails

Jerry Levitt and Garrett Nash of St. Louis will be dark horse entries at the Phoenix trials.

Jerry hates to be shut out of the bidding and when West's four heart bid came around to him Jerry tried four spades.

East doubled. It didn't look like a mistake at the time and things looked even better to East after his partner opened the five of diamonds and ruffed the diamond return.

But Jerry was optimistic. He was pretty sure that West had opened four hearts with 4-3-1-1 distribution. Assuming that West held the king of clubs as part of his bid Jerry set out to teach East when not to double.

West could have beaten the hand with a club shift, but he played ace and another heart, whereupon the defense was through.

Jerry ruffed in dummy and led a spade. He planned to play the eight if East played the seven, but East played the nine. Jerry won with the queen and led the jack of clubs. West ducked and Jerry played dummy's queen. He led another spade and won East's ten with the king. He led a club to the ace, ruffed a club, entered dummy with the jack of diamonds; led another club and showed East his hand.

East could ruff or discard his last diamond, but he couldn't get a trick.

Enrollment Hikes 38%

Fall term enrollment in Oregon community colleges and vocational-technical schools has increased 38 per cent over the 1961 fall term enrollment. A total of 9,942 students are reported by the nine institutions according to Dr. Leon P. Minear, superintendent of public instruction.

This compared with 7,137 enrolled in the fall of 1961. Treasure Valley Community College at Ontario, the only new institution to come under the program this year, reports an enrollment of 241.

Programs designed for full-time students comprise the major portion of the enrollment this fall, with 945 in college transfer students and 2,065 in vocational-technical curriculum. Evening vocational and general education classes make up the balance of 6,932 enrollments.

Dr. Minear also indicated that enrollments for the 1961-62 school year had come within four per cent of earlier projections made by the State Department of Education in the 10-Year Joint Projection with the State Department of Higher Education.

Based on current enrollments it appears that the joint projection figure for the 1962-63 school year will miss the actual enrollment by about the same amount.

In addition to the 1961-62 enrollment in state reimbursable programs, 4,200 students were enrolled in classes which did not receive state financial aid. This made a total of 19,444 individuals who were enrolled in classes offered by Oregon community colleges and vocational - technical schools in 1961-62. While current enrollment figures for non-reimbursable courses are not yet available, it is expected that a slight increase will be recorded in this area also.

Oregon Republicans Confident Of House Control

SALEM (UPI) — Republicans are as confident as ever that next week's election will give them control of the 1963 Oregon House of Representatives — for the first time since 1955.

The Democrats now have the upper hand, but by the shakiest of margins, 21-29.

All 60 House seats are up for grabs, and part of the GOP hopes are riding on a poll that shows them either holding their own or gaining in four key areas—Multnomah, Clackamas, Lane and Jackson counties.

The poll envisions the GOP gaining one more house seat in Multnomah, giving them eight out of the 17: one in Clackamas, which has a total of four and where they have none now; and "at least" two of Jackson's three seats.

In Lane County, the Republican expect to hold onto the three seats they have now. This would be fine with them because one seat opened up when Rep. Carl Fisher, R-Eugene, became the GOP nominee for Congress in the fourth district.

The GOP also is counting on retaining its three seats in Marion County, which has four.

Voter registration statewide favors the Democrats but this is a risky guide, since getting out the actual vote is what counts.

Polls notwithstanding, most observers still regard control of the next house a tossup.

In the 1993 legislature, the Republicans were fat cats, controlling 49-11. By 1995 their edge had slipped to 35-25.

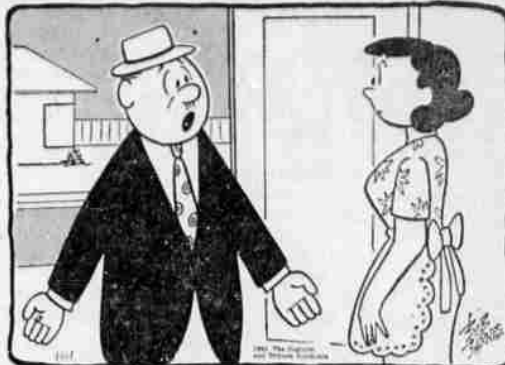
The bottom fell out in the 1996 election, and the Democrats took

over the 1957 House, 37-23. Then the Democrats began to slip, controlling the 1959 House 33-27, and falling to their 31-33 edge in 1961.

The Republicans think the pendulum is about to make a full swing.

In the Oregon Senate, Republicans concede there is no possibility of regaining control this time. The Democrats have a 20-10 advantage now, and with less than half of the seats up this election, including some powerful Democrats, GOP control is out of the question.
