This will be a very crucial game for the Pelicans. They need a victory to insure a possible three-way tie for the Southern Oregon Conference championship. The Pelicans lost to Medford but whipped Grants Pass. Grants Pass must beat Medford to insure the knot.

The game, however, can not be looked upon as a night of frolic

for the Pelicans. They will have to play a full 48 minutes of good football to beat the Cornets. Crater has a rugged team which almost pulled the big upset the night Klamath was upending Grants Pass. The Cornets finally lost 7-0. The Pelicans fell to the Tornado 13-0.

The Pels possibly could be made a very slight favorite because of the home field advantage and the Homecoming which should fire the Pels to a high pitch.

The Homecoming will begin Friday when they hold Homecoming assembly at Modoc Field at 1:30 p.m. where the queen will be crowned. The queen candidates are Andrea Silani, Mary Beth Solberg, Kaycee Martz, Pam Bauer and Janice LaGrande. The floats will assemble at Modoc Field and parade through town after the crowning.

Crater is 6-2 in league play, having lost to both Medford and Grants Pass. The Pelicans are tied in second with Grants Pass with a 2-1 record. So second place also hangs in the balance on the outcome of this game.

Crater will be no easy foe. They have quarterback Mike Glines whom many call the finest quarterback in the state. Coach Fred Spiegelberg of Medford said that and many voices have echoed it. And the coaches at KU aren't contradicting this quote.

The Pelicans expect to have a number of passes tossed against them in this contest. Glines throws well and runs well from his quarterback position. He will have ends Bob Turner and Paul Branson to fling to as well as backs Joe McCarty, Vern Swanson and John Mooster.

But the Pelicans discovered their passing abilities last week when quarterbacks Rick Horn, a

senior, and Walt Smith, a junior, connected on seven of 11 attempts. This could complement their running attack this week to a great extent. Horn and Smith both have shown abilities of late in the running of the roll-outs and options.

Ron Hitchcock, Grover Dahn and John English will spearhead the running attack. Hitchcock and Dahn are the first and second leading ground gainers respectively. English, a converted end,

played his first game at half-back last week and runs as hard as Dahn or Hitchcock. He does little feinting and sidestepping, but rather runs through tacklers. Mike Kitching will also see action as a running back either at quarterback or halfback.

Those who will see action on defense are Bill Mills, Thurston Hensen, Hitchcock, English, John Otterbein, Kitching, Horn, Bud Wolter, Rick Gustafson, Terry Ecles and John Robinson.

This should be one of the best games of the season on Modoc Field. There also could be a lot of scoring in the game. The Pelicans want the Homecoming win for the alumni and to keep hope for that first place tie.

Oregon Tech basketballers report for their first practice session of the season at the Owl Gym today and head coach Jim Partlow expects anywhere from 15 to 30 prospective players to turn out the first day.

The Owls are the defending Oregon Collegiate Conference champion but admittedly will be hard pressed to retain that title this year although Partlow thinks he has some fine prospects.

"There are 15 kids I know that will turn out, but there may be as many as 30 show up," Partlow said.

He has only two returning regulars from last year's quintet. They are Norman Jones and Hewlett Nash. The other two returners are Wayne Dennis of Klamath Falls and Mike MacDonald.

Partlow is high on some newcomers. He has a 6-10 lad from Willamette High in Eugene which undoubtedly will help. "He will help us some way with that size," Partlow said.

He pointed out recently to watch for the name of Willie Anderson whom Partlow says is a great prospect. He is a tall one also and has a lot of moves.

Another top gunner for the Owls could be Jerry Franklin who was the leading scorer in the Class A-2 State Tournament last season. Partlow also mentioned Charlie Johnson as a good prospect.

Equipment will be issued today and they hope to get onto the floor at about 4 p.m. The first game will be in the NALA Tip-Off Tournament Nov. 29-Dec. 1 in Willamette and Portland against Lewis and Clark.

Merrill edged by Bonanza, 28-14, last week in the Potato Festival despite a great effort by Rod Pfeiffer. Bonanza and Chiloquin tied in a great game the week before. But Chiloquin appears improved and ready for the Huskies this outing.

The Huskies topped the Panthers 33-12 in the first meeting this year, but this one is expected to be closer. Chiloquin is led by one of the best backs in the league in Al DeBortoli who scored 20 points last week in the Panthers 41-2 victory over Malin.

Merrill has a top-notch backfield in quarterback Dale Kurtz, fullback Jim Thompson who tips the scales at a little over 200 pounds, Ken Smith and Bob Moore. Kurtz throws the ball well and calls plays well. Thompson is a big fullback with power while Smith and Moore do most of the speed work. Ted Roller is Kurtz' favorite target.

In addition to DeBortoli, the Huskies will have to stop the breakaway antics of sophomore back Kim Hale for the Panthers. Hale broke off on runs of 70 and 80 yards last week against Malin. The ball can be thrown with reasonable success against Chiloquin. Malin threw for 91 yards against them while gaining only 66 on the ground.

Bonanza should take Malin with little trouble. The Antlers are a hard-hitting team led by Pfeiffer. He scored both touchdowns against the Huskies last week and is a terror on defense. Malin is a young team in a building season and have some key injuries to personnel. Jerry Morris and Stan Harrison, outstanding defensemen, are on the injured list and probably will not play.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Mary Mendels Wismer, wife of New York Titan owner Harry Wismer, was named president of the American Football League club Wednesday. Wismer, who owns 90 per cent of the Titans' stock, said his wife will be the "chief executive officer" of the club.

Dayton U. Handed 2-Year Probation

DAYTON, Ohio (UPI) — The University of Dayton says it will accept the two-year probation handed it Wednesday by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) without seeking a review.

The University was accused of violating rules on aid to athletes and of allowing the 1960-61 freshman basketball team to play an excessive number of games.

Dayton, which last year won the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) championship and has three starters from that team returning this season, will be prohibited from competing in the NCAA basketball championships during the probation period.

The ban also extends to other invitational basketball events co-operating with the NCAA unless prior contracts already have been signed.

"We accept the penalty imposed by the NCAA committee on infractions," the Very Rev. Raymond A. Roesch, university president, said in a statement.

"Since there had never been any question in the past about the games played by our freshman teams, we were not aware that we were violating the code," he said.

Fr. Roesch said that even before being advised by the committee, the university Student Welfare Council recommended more than a year ago that the

freshman schedule be shortened and no post-season play be scheduled. The 1962-63 schedule was shortened considerably, he added.

The committee also charge that the university on three occasions during the college year of 1960-61 provided free transportation to a freshman basketball player so he could return home for personal reasons and paid transportation costs from his home to the campus in order for him to enroll.

Fr. Roesch said the athletic department was motivated in this matter "by what it judged to be a hardship case and felt that they were justified."

"The incident referred to is that of Roger Brown returning to New York for appearance in a traffic court," he said.

Brown, a member of the Flyers' freshman team which played in the AAU tournament at Denver in 1961 and lost in the second game, was involved in a point-shave scandal which broke in May involving New York men. Brown was dropped from school after the investigation began into point-shaving.

The probation means the Flyers will not get the opportunity to defend their NIT title, but is not expected to keep them from playing in the Holiday Festival at New York City for which they had contracted already.

Funeral Services Slated For Umpire Larry Goetz

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—Funeral services will be held here Friday for Larry Goetz, former National League umpire, who died Wednesday en route to Cincinnati General Hospital after becoming ill at his home.

The loud and fast talking Goetz later was hired as a baseball commentator by the Mutual Broadcasting Co.

Services are scheduled for 10 a.m. EST at W. Mack Johnson Funeral Home for the 67-year-old former official. Burial will be in Goshen Cemetery at Goshen, Ohio, near here.

Goetz' death ended a stormy career which saw him dismissed from the umpire staff by National League President Warren Giles in 1957 after sitting out that season because of illness.

He had hoped to be named supervisor of the league's umpires, but his long battle with the league office and with players' raceway
