

Morse, Unander Bandy Words In Vote Campaign

Sen. Wayne Morse said in Salem Wednesday that if any hitch develops in removal of Russian missile installations in Cuba the United States has its military forces poised to do the job.

Morse told a Veterans of Foreign Wars meeting "there is no doubt that this move by us is still very possible. And I favor it and shall urge it upon our President; and upon our administration if the prompt and inspected removal of the Soviet bases does not commence within the next few days."

The Democratic candidate for re-election said there has never been any question that the United States would not permit the completion of bases of this kind in Cuba.

"When we knew for a fact that Cuba was being used for a Soviet base, we moved; we acted," Morse said.

He said, "I have never, and do not now, advocate sending American forces into battle to attain an objective which can still be

won without sending them into battle. That has been my position for 18 years and it will be my position today, tomorrow, and on election day, and... it will be my policy after election day, too."

Sig Unander, Morse's Republican rival, spoke in Beaverton Wednesday and said Morse supporters are misleading in asserting Morse can accomplish more in Washington because of his 18 years in the Senate.

"Under the parliamentary system of our government," he said, "a senator's or a congressman's seniority dates only from his seating in Congress as a representative of one political party. Wayne Morse, because of his switching party labels... does not have 18 years seniority in the Senate, but a mere eight years."

Morse was elected twice as a Republican before switching to the Democratic party.

Unander said Morse "frittered away 10 years when he switched political parties" and added he does not hold one committee chairmanship.

Gov. Mark Hatfield was accused by Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., of "playing politics" with the lumber issue in saying President Kennedy had authority to impose a quota on Canadian imports under the 1937 agriculture act. Ullman said the President had no legal authority under the act to do so. Hatfield replied the White House had not denied the possibility of using Section 22 of the 1937 act.

Democratic Rep. Edith Green, seeking her fifth term, said the most important legislation that failed in the 87th Congress were bills for federal aid to universities and colleges and for health care for the aged under Social Security.

Ballot measure 9, which would apportion the Oregon House by area as well as population, came under attack in Portland by attorney Norman Wpanick, representing the Bipartisan League to Retain Equal Representation. He said the measure would be a "backward step."

Job Claim Reiterated

SALEM (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton reiterated today that State Employment Department figures show that Oregon has lost jobs in the manufacturing and lumber industries during the Republican administration of Gov. Mark Hatfield.

From 1959 to 1961, average annual employment in manufacturing dropped from 146,700 to 138,600, Thornton said, and in the same period, jobs in the lumber and wood products industry fell from 74,700 to 66,900.

The Democratic nominee for governor complained that State Employment Commissioner David H. Cameron included 1958 figures in a statement showing job increases. Thornton said Democrat Robert D. Holmes was still governor in 1958.

"The only increase that the Hatfield administration can claim during Hatfield's actual term beginning in 1959 is that the overall Oregon work force increased from 672,000 in 1959 to 677,000 in 1961, a mere 5,000 in three years," Thornton said.

He agreed with Cameron that some figures were off, because an employee of Cameron's department made a miscalculation. But he said Cameron's criticism of release of figures by the employment was unfair and unwarranted.

Embezzlement Charge Faced By Union Leader

WASHINGTON (UPI) — James G. Cross is a soft-spoken, bespectacled man of 50 who looks more like a banker than a labor leader. He first made headlines in 1956 when he was accused of having his position in the Bakery and Confectionary Workers Union (BCW) beaten up during a San Francisco convention.

The grand jury refused to indict him because of conflicting testimony. But Cross' troubles were only beginning. Robert P. Kennedy, then chief counsel for the Senate rackets subcommittee, accused Cross of bilking his union so he could live in luxury.

He was indicted on a charge of lying to the committee after he testified that he was not present when his opponents were clobbered in San Francisco. But he was acquitted for lack of evidence.

Pressure mounted within the labor movement against him, however, and last year former Labor Secretary Arthur Goldberg ordered a new investigation under the Landrum-Griffin Act after it was reported that Cross planned to retire with a \$250,000 pension. While the probe was under way he resigned and went to live in Boca Raton, Fla., on a \$900 a month pension.

Thursday, Kennedy, now attorney general, announced that Cross was indicted by a District of Columbia grand jury on charges of embezzling \$35,000 from his union, conspiring to obstruct justice by using the money to fix his 1959 perjury trial and conspiring to embezzle another \$35,000 to cover up the first embezzlement.

Five other former BCW officials and New York attorney Milton M. Levin, 48, also were named as defendants.

The indictments said Cross and James Landruscia, 61, former first vice president of the union, who also was indicted, gave Levin in \$35,000 to fix Cross' perjury trial. But instead of doing so, the indictment said, Levin kept the money for himself.

Accused of helping in the conspiracy were former BCW Vice President Robert E. Hart, 68, Belmont, Mass.; Frank H. Mykalo, ter P. Crawford, 49, St. Louis; and Frank D. Gardone, 37, McKees Rocks, Pa.

Several others — including former Secretary-Treasurer Peter H. Olson, 52, Minneapolis — were named as co-conspirators but were not indicted. Olson pleaded guilty to embezzlement last June.

Pair Lauded For Peace Promotion

NEW YORK (UPI) — Dr. Linus C. Pauling, a Nobel Prize-winning scientist, and author James P. Warburg Thursday night received 1962 Gandhi Peace Awards as "two of America's foremost leaders in the cause of promoting world peace."

The awards were made at the Community Church of New York by Promoting Enduring Peace, Inc., a nonprofit, nonpolitical organization.

Warburg, in accepting his award told Pauling he shared "your concern for humanity." He added: "Rightly or wrongly, I have a strong feeling about enlisting citizens of other nations in protests to our government, and an even stronger aversion to collecting foreign signatures to petitions which seek injunctions in our courts against the action of our own government."

"It is a matter of regret to me, Dr. Pauling, that I have not found it possible to support your attempts to influence the policies of our government."

Warburg said he felt the job "can and should be done here at home."

Pauling has been active in groups which seek an end to atmospheric nuclear tests by the United States and Russia.

Relatives Attend Rites

FORT KLAMATH — Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur B. Hecock returned Oct. 29 from California, where they were called by news of the death of her maternal aunt, Miss Adelia Gay, Oct. 24, at Berkeley.

Funeral services were held Oct. 29 at McNary Funeral Chapel in Berkeley. Interment was in the family plot at Oak Hills Cemetery, Red Bluff.

Parents of the late Miss Gay came to California by wagon train from North Carolina, and she was born Jan. 18, 1859, at Colusa. She was the oldest living retired school teacher in California, having taught at Whittier Elementary School and later at Garfield Junior High School in Berkeley until she retired in 1936 after 43 years of teaching.

Among her relatives, her uncle, Grant Gay, was among early day settlers in the southern part of Klamath County, where Miss Gay had visited often. She was the oldest and last of the six children of her family, which included three sons and three daughters. Survivors include numerous nephews, nieces, and other relatives.

Jury Convicts Howard Graham

Howard Allen Graham, Merrill, has been convicted of a charge of burglary not in a dwelling following a trial which started Monday in the circuit court of David R. Vandenberg. The jury deliberated 13 minutes early Wednesday afternoon before returning a unanimous verdict of guilty.

Judge Vandenberg set 10 a.m., Monday, Nov. 5, as the time he will pronounce sentence.

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Senator Keating Explains Sources Of Cuban Missile Base Information

ALBANY, N.Y. (UPI) — Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., has disclosed that he had no more information than the Kennedy administration when he announced a Cuban arms buildup seven weeks before President Kennedy announced the U.S. quarantine.

Keating, in an interview Thursday, said the Caribbean island now is completely under the control of the Soviet Union.

The junior senator from New York said his speeches on and off the Senate floor between last Aug. 31 and Oct. 12 warning of the arms buildup and Soviet missiles in Cuba came "from either an official source or some other source that had been checked with an official source."

There was little doubt at the time that Keating was getting information from Defense Department sources. Some also apparently were coming from Cuban exiles. Other quarters thought Keating was getting reports from Latin American sources available to New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, a long-time authority on the area.

Sources Weren't Refugees

The senator never confirmed the latter.

"It has been repeatedly said that my sources were Cuban refugees," he said Thursday. "That is not so."

Keating said he felt there was nothing political in President Kennedy waiting until Oct. 22 to announce that the Russians had brought offensive weapons into Cuba but he said administration action "baffled" him.

He said it was his own "speculation" that "while the administration had the facts, there were differences with the administration."

He said it "didn't want the American people to have the facts" until it had a policy.

The senator said he made a speech in the Senate Oct. 10 warning of six intermediate range missile sites under construction in Cuba.

"It was emphatically denied by the administration," he said. "The information," he said, "was not only available to the administration, it was in their hands."

Needed Proof

Another possible reason for the delay, he said, was because the United States may have felt it could not convince our Allies of the buildup unless it had pictures to show them. This, Keating said, was not his idea but was reported "by some columnist."

Keating said on Oct. 13 a national meeting of newspaper editors was told by the administration that there "was no thought of anything like a blockade."

"Then on Oct. 22, the President said everything I had said on the 10th."

On Sept. 4, the President confirmed the existence of Russian personnel, materiel, short-range ground-to-air missiles and sites in Cuba. He termed the buildup "defensive."

Coronation of the homecoming queen will take place Friday night at the post-bonfire dance. The queen will be chosen by popular vote from five candidates: Susan Fort, Sandra Novak, and Sally Taylor, all of Portland; Joan Yasui, Hood River; and Mary Georgina Elliott, Lake Oswego.

A reception honoring President Arthur S. Flemming will be held following the game.

Big event of Saturday night will be the homecoming concert and dance with Duke Ellington. The concert will be at 7:30 in McArthur Court, followed by the dance at 9:30.
