Bid Shows Power Hand

Bobby Nail of Houston will be the only member of the 1962 American team competing in the Phoenix trials. He and his partner, James Jacoby of Dallas, will be the only Texans in the trials. I would be rooting for them even if Jim weren't my son.

In their bidding they like to show strength early unlike many other experts who keep partners as well as opponents in the dark. Thus, Jim's two spade responses to the opening diamond would not be made by many top players, but it simplified things for Bobby.

Bobby's rebid to three diamonds was intended to see what type hand Jim had for his jump bid. After Jim rebid spades Bobby was ready to take control.

The four and five-trump bids disclosed that Jim held two aces and one king. The king would have to be in spades. Jim would not have bid two spades with only two aces and a suit headed by ace-jack.

Bobby was also sure that Jim would hold either a seven card spade suit or strength in diamonds. In either case, Bobby counted 13 tricks and set the grand slam in no-trump to guard against such things as ruffs.

Outstanding Unit Honor Given Portland Sector

The Air Force Outstanding Unit Award was presented to the Portland Air Defense Sector Oct. 31, the first time that this award has been given to an entire Air Defense Sector.

The award was presented by Lt. Gen. Robert M. Lee, commander of the Air Defense Command, All Air Force Base, Colo. All units of the Portland Sector are among those cited in the award, which is given in recognition of exceptionally meritorious service during the period of June 3, 1960 to April 30, 1962.

Move Made By Ranger

Officers of the Klamath Ranger District of the Winema National Forest have moved to a new location, it was announced today by District Ranger Bud Twombly. New office location is on the second floor of the Veterans Memorial Building. The move is underway this week and the ranger's office is now open to serve the public in the new location, Twombly said.

For many years offices of the Klamath Ranger District have been in the Post-Office building but in recent months space available was insufficient to meet the total district needs. Timber sales and engineering personnel have been located in the commerce building at 11th and Walnut streets. The move to the Veterans' Memorial building will make it possible, Twombly said, to bring all of our personnel together in one office and increase the efficiency of the organization. Offices in the Veterans' Memorial building have been made available through lease arrangements with the Klamath County Court.

The new office location for the Klamath District Ranger should not be confused with the office of the forest service supervisor. Forest supervisor headquarters for the Winema Forest will continue to be at 411 Main Street in the Loomis Building.

Guard Plans Reserve Unit

Lt. Col. Clifford L. Sanders, commander of the Second Battalion of the state National Guard, has been asked by the Adjutant General to form a National Guard Reserve Company in Klamath Falls.

The unit Sanders commands is the 249th Artillery, composed of Battalions B and C, Klamath Falls and Battalions A and D Medford.

Sanders, who is attempting to find a company commander for the new unit, plans a meeting at the army at 7:30 p.m. Thursday for all who are interested in helping to form the unit.

There were National Guard Reserve units in Oregon during World War II, but the units were disbanded after the war. The state is anxious to organize the reserve again because of the seriousness of the international situation.

The primary mission of the National Guard Reserve in peace time is to augment the National Guard as an internal security force. In time of war, it replaces the National Guard as a state force when the National Guard is ordered into federal service. Its main objective is the support of Civil Defense.

Units will be trained as military police, using training programs, schedules and manuals as published by the Department of the Army. Wherever possible, personnel will be trained concurrent with the training of the local National Guard unit.

The Klamath Falls unit will have strength of five officers and 100 enlisted men. Personnel will be comprised of prior servicemen who have no military obligation. Preference will be given to prior National Guard, Active Army and Army Reserve personnel. Active members of any Reserve component will not be accepted.

Two Fights Investigated

Klamath Falls police are investigating three crimes including a theft of 70 cents and two fights that occurred Tuesday and Wednesday night.

Police reported that the Tidewater Oil Company was broken into sometime between 9 p.m. Tuesday and 8 a.m. Wednesday. Entry was gained by breaking the back door window and unlocking the door from the outside. The thief escaped with all he could find—70 cents.

A man was assaulted about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday during a dance at the Klamath Auditorium. Jim Sheridan said he was dancing with a girl when an unknown man came up to him and told him to leave. When Sheridan asked why, the man struck him with his fist.

Sheridan was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital to have his lip stitched.

Another assault occurred at the Oxtail Bar, 535 Main Street, Wednesday evening.

Norman Swanzey, 825 Grant Street, told police he was struck on the head with a broken glass when he got up to play the juke box. Swanzey said he didn't know his assailant.

Red Cross Blood Donor Target Set 2,200 Pints

Representatives of leading business, industrial and PTA groups of the community met with Red Cross leaders Oct. 30 and reviewed a plan for blood donor recruitment for the coming year. Target for the next year's local blood program is 2,200 pints.

Dr. George R. Nicholson, chapter chairman, explained the growth in the local program, pointing out that 10 years ago about 30 pints a month were needed for patients in local hospitals, while today usage can reach over 150 pints in a month, with an average usage of 125 pints. Military and veterans hospitals and many state hospitals are also dependent on the program to provide blood for patients.

Mrs. Virginia Dixon, chapter executive explained the scope and financing of the program; through its volunteer donor program, the Red Cross returns to the community each year blood and blood derivatives of a value of approximately \$30,000; patients pay a portion of the Red Cross cost in collecting, processing, and delivering the blood to the local hospitals, and pay the hospital charges for infusion and laboratory costs, but there is no charge for the blood itself.

The program results in saving of thousands of dollars for the sick and injured, and also insures a supply of blood readily available at all times.

Mrs. Winston Purvine, blood program chairman, emphasized the importance of strengthening the donor recruitment plan to meet unforeseen needs in the event of a national emergency.
