WASHINGTON (UPI)—Larry Silveira, 9-year-old punt, pass and kick star from San Luis Obispo, Calif., left here Saturday for New York.

Larry and nine other boys ranging in age from 7 to 11 will take part in the finals of the national punt, pass and kick competition in Yankee Stadium Sunday.

The boys will demonstrate their skills before a sell-out crowd expected to attend the National Football League title game between the Green Bay Packers and the New York Giants.

The California lad, who will wear the uniform of the Los Angeles Rams, will compete against 9-year-old Robert McKeag Jr., of Greenville, Pa., who will represent the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The 10 boys are the finalists among more than 411,000 competitors in the contest sponsored by the NFL and a motor company.

Larry and his companions, to gether with their parents, wound up a two-day visit in the national capitol with a banquet Friday night. Their tour included visits to the White House, the Smithsonian Institution Air Museum, the FBI and Mount Vernon.

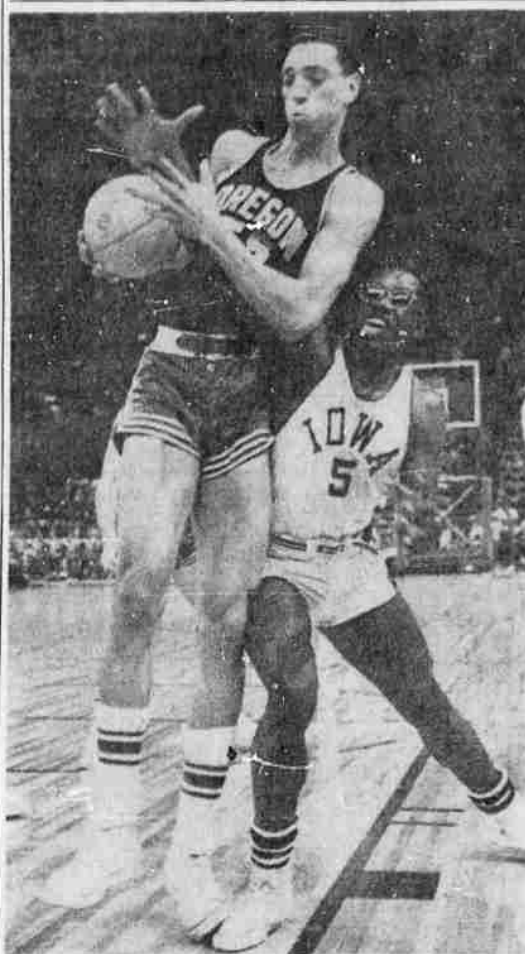

Baker Leads OSU Past Bears

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Oregon State's improving Beavers met Iowa in an attempt to win their seventh straight Far West Classic basketball championship here Saturday.

The Beavers, led by football star Terry Baker, defeated California 58-50 and the Hawkeyes rolled over Oregon 62-48 in the semifinals of the four-day, eight-team seventh annual tournament Friday night.

California and Oregon battled for third place in the tournament Saturday. Seattle faced Arizona for fourth place and Idaho battled Washington State for seventh spot Saturday.

In consolation games Friday, Seattle ran past Idaho 75-71 and Arizona topped Washington State 67-57.

The championship game between Oregon State and Iowa is a replay of the contest for third place in the Kentucky Invitational Tournament at Lexington last weekend. The Beavers won 61-55.

Baker, who received the Heisman Trophy as the nation's top college football player after the past season, carried Oregon State into the finals.

Portland Beats Pacific, 50-42

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Portland University, playing only slightly better than a cold University of Pacific team, defeated the Tigers, 50-42 Saturday in the lowest scoring game of the West Coast Athletic Conference Tournament.

The two teams were playing a consolation game to determine seventh place in the four day affair.

Steve Anstett, Portland's 6-foot-8-inch center, dominated the backboards, collected 16 rebounds and led all scorers with a total of 16 points.

Anstett was followed in the scoring column by Bill Wilson of UOP and Tom Nichols of Portland with 15 each.

Honkers Suffer First Cage Loss Of Season To Kuna

KUNA, Idaho (Special)—The Lakeview Honkers suffered their first defeat of the season here Friday night when they fell before non-conference foe Kuna, 42-31.

The loss left the Honkers with a 4-1 season and they traveled on to Payette, Idaho, for a Saturday night clash.

Dennis Warren was the only Honker to hit in double figures as he netted 13 points. Kuna had three in double figures with Ron Tucker hitting for 12 and Ken Calloun and Pat Rhodes 10 each.

Kuna led from the outset by taking a 12-8 first period lead but the Honkers fought back to cut the margin by half time to 16-14. But Kuna walked away in the final half by scoring 15 in the third and 11 in the fourth while the Honkers could hit only 10 and seven points.

Lewis and Clark defeated Western Washington 67-64 but Willamette was beaten by Humboldt State 62-33 in consolation action in the Chico State invitational basketball tournament at Chico, Calif., Friday night.

Weber walloped Eastern Oregon 91-68 in the opening round of the Northwest Nazarene tournament at Nampa, Idaho. In a non-conference game, Linfield won over St. Martin's 102-100 in overtime at McMinnville.
