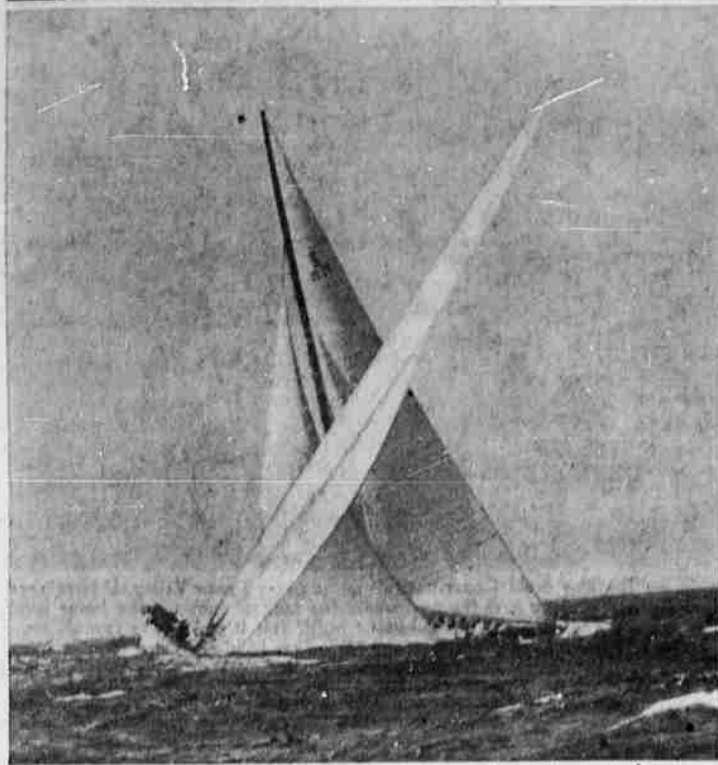


# GOOD SPORTS IN 1962

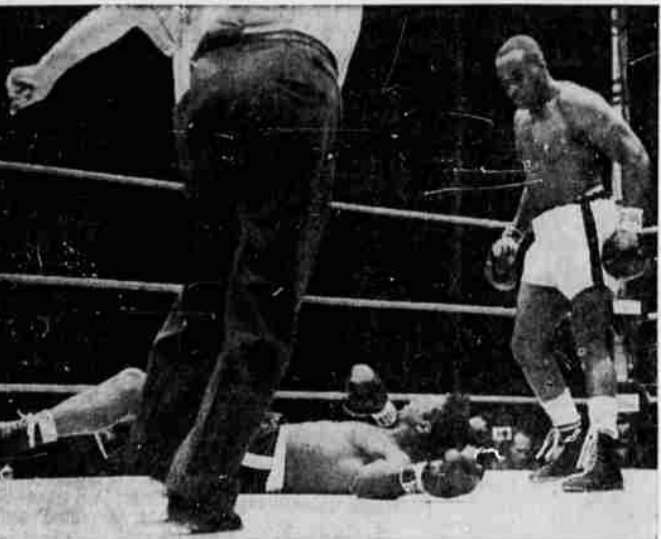

## NCAA Waits Acceptance

NEW YORK (UPI) — The NCAA today awaited word from President Kennedy whether the national Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) will accept Gen. Douglas MacArthur's arbitration in the dispute between the country's two leading amateur sports bodies.

Executive director Col. Donald Hull of the AAU wired the President at Palm Beach, Fla., Monday of his organization's answer, but refused to divulge the contents of the telegram.

The President's brother, Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy, had intended in the squabble in mid-November and it was thought an acceptable agreement had been reached.

Friktion erupted again in Detroit when the AAU complained the National Collegiate Athletic Association federations had refused to accept the coalition plan which offered a vote and voice in track and field.

## Riegel Leading LA Open Field

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Robert (Skeet) Riegel, former U. S. amateur champion, and young amateur Lee Davis Monday led 40 qualifiers for the 37th annual \$50,000 Los Angeles Open Golf Tournament.

The tourney starts Friday at the Rancho municipal course.

Riegel and Davis shot 67s to lead 310 golfers who played over six different courses for the 40 berths. Except for the four-day, 72-hole tournament were 116 players.

## Snell Defeats Oregon Runners

WAIMATE, New Zealand (UPI) — New Zealand star Peter Snell cut loose with a finishing kick Tuesday to defeat University of Oregon runners Daryl Burleson and Archie San Romani Jr. in a half-mile run in 1:48.8.

Burleson finished second and San Romani third. In other races, Oregon's Keith Freeman was second in a one-mile run and Vic Reeve sixth in a three-mile run.

Snell, world record holder for both the mile and half-mile, set the pace at the start. San Romani then whipped past on the backstretch of the first lap. Snell let him pass.

When Burleson moved up, the three runners came around the final bend virtually even. That's when the big, burly Snell turned on his power and gradually drew away from the blond Burleson as San Romani dropped back to third.

## Illini Upset By Notre Dame But Loyola Keeps Winning

If you think you've got a hangover, consider how the Illinois basketball team feels on this New Year's Day.

The Illini weren't too highly regarded when they started the 1962 college court season. But they reeled off eight straight victories and climaxed the string by winning the Holiday Festival tournament in New York. As a result, they're rated among the top five teams in the country.

But that was last year. Today, 1963, they're just another team that was clipped by an underdog.

The Fighting Irish of Notre Dame were the New Year's Eve celebrants who whipped the Illini by a 90-88 score at Chicago.

Loyola of Chicago, the nation's second-ranked team, almost ran into some more of the same in the second half of the double header before beating Dayton, 74-69.

Come From Behind

Capt. John Andreoli hit on nine of 10 shots from the field in the second half to help Notre Dame overcome a nine-point deficit and spring the night's big upset. The Irish had led, 45-22, at halftime but Illinois came steadily back to go in front. Bill Burwell, 6-8 center, led Illinois with 28 points.

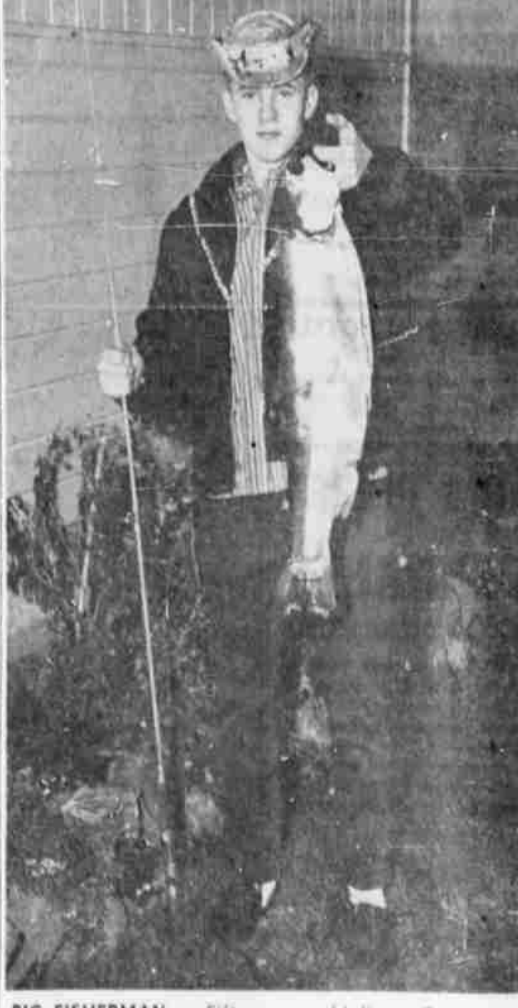
Loyola was held to its lowest score of the season but stretched its winning streak to 11 games with the aid of 25 points by Jerry Harkness. Harkness scored 16 of his points in the second half with teammate Vic Rouse adding 11 points per game in 10 previous victories.

Cal Bradds scored an Ohio State home arena record of 45 points to lead the Buckeyes to a 97-91 triumph over Brigham Young. Bradds' total also was the highest ever scored by a Buckeye player in a non-conference game. Jerry Dahlgren scored 25 points for Brigham Young.

Present for Coach

St. Louis University gave coach John Benning a happy birthday and a Happy New Year's present with an 87-63 win over Kentucky at St. Louis. The Billikens led, 49-29, at halftime. Dave Harris had 22 points for the winners and Cotton Nash led 16 for Kentucky.

Brian Generalovich's 28 points led Pittsburgh to a 71-62 triumph over Princeton and Eric Magdanz tallied 28 as Minnesota downed Houston, 87-68, in other games. Pittsburgh raised its record to 7-2 for the season while Minnesota snapped a six-game losing streak.

## Bruce Kidd Snaps Mark

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Bruce Kidd, American three-mile record holder, shattered a 21-year-old mark Monday and was named the outstanding performer in the Sugar Bowl track and field meet.

Kidd, of the University of Toronto, breezed to a 13:37.9 clocking in his speciality, the three-mile, to break a record which had stood since 1941 when Greg Rice of Notre Dame ran the distance in 14:13.0.

The hard-striding Kidd, who set the American three-mile standard the past year, was pressed for the first six laps by Houston's Geoff Walker and Southwestern Louisiana's Malcolm Robinson, but he turned on the steam and won going away—finishing 45 yards in front of Walker, Robinson faded and wound up a distant third.

One other record was broken—Loyola's one-mile relay team winning in 3:14.3 to break the mark of 3:26.1 set by Rice in 1954. Second-place finisher Louisiana State also was under the old standard, but trailed all the way.

## Patterson Will Receive Money

NEW YORK (UPI) — The federal government confirmed today that its \$2 million tax crackdown on receipts of the September Sonny Liston-Floyd Patterson heavyweight title fight has resulted in an agreement among all parties concerned that:

—Patterson will receive his \$997,500 purse in payments already made in 1962 and to be made in 1963, instead of being spread over 17 years, an extended maneuver that might have saved him about 60 per cent in taxes.

—Championship Sports, Inc., promoters of the September fight, will accept the tax responsibility on all "ancillary" moneys from television, radio, movies, etc., received by Graff, Reiner and Smith Enterprises, which the government claimed actually was a CSI corporation.

The government is holding \$207,000 of champion Liston's purse until it determines the amount of his taxes.
