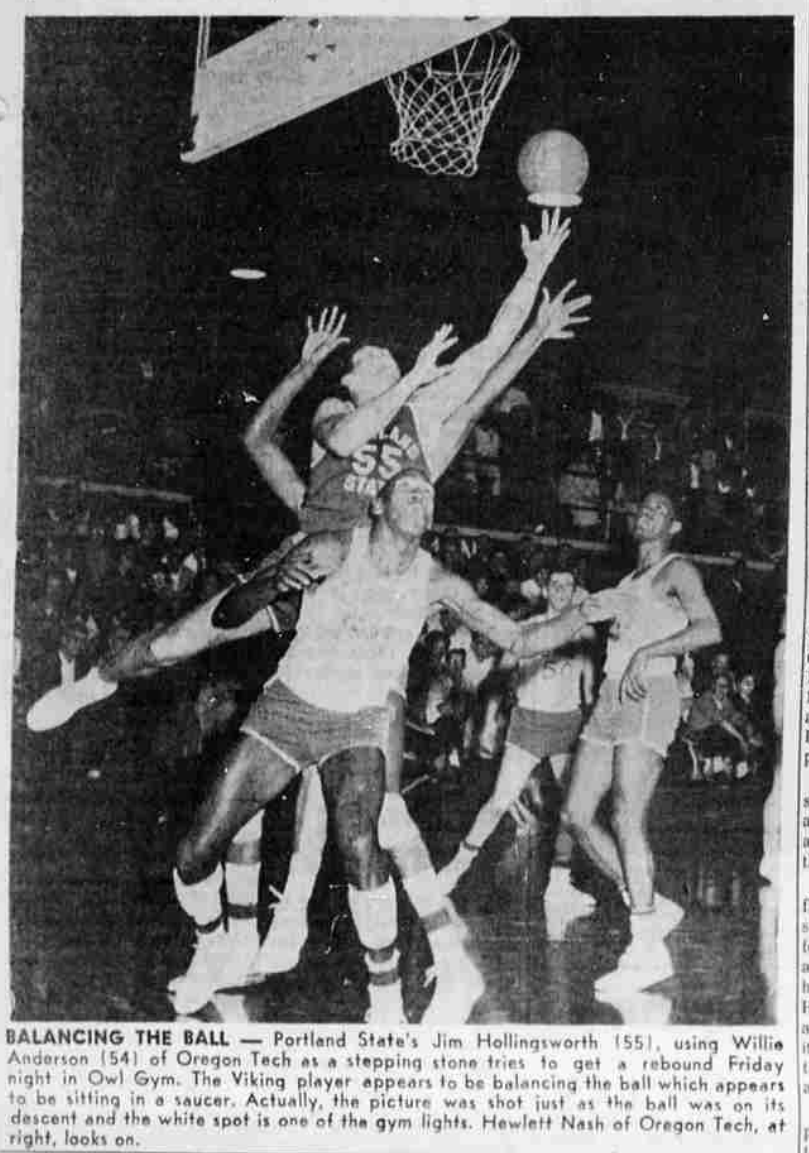


Owls Open Defense Of OCC Title; Top Vikings, 76-52

The Oregon Tech Owls started off their Oregon Collegiate Conference schedule with a loud bang here Friday night in the Owl Gym when they blasted the frustrated...

Portland State Vikings, 76-52, in a fine display of scoring power and a good defensive effort.
Coach Jim Partlow's crew, defending champions of the OCC, appeared to be in pretty good shape of retaining the league title with the Owls over the Vik-

ings but the first in league competition. The Owls beat the Portland Staters in the NAIA Tip-Off Tournament in the second game of the season by only one point, 65-64. But the Owls made no mistake Friday night about which team was the superior one.



The Owls looked as good as they have all season in winning Friday night to even their season record at 5-5 and give them a 1-0 league mark. The Vikings gave the Owls a battle for their lives in the tournament when big Jim Hollingsworth hit for a tournament record of 30 points. But he had Smith on his back Friday night and could manage only eight points.

Smith, the two-time All-OCC all star and leading scorer and rebounder both years, also played his first game of the season Friday night and he had been working out only since Monday with the team. But he got back into the swing of things quickly by pulling down 17 rebounds. He led in the rebound category but the scoring honors went to the Kangaroo-jumping Willie Anderson who was hot as a firecracker on the Fourth of July by ripping the nets for 25 points.

But the key to the big win was little 6-0 guard Hewlett Nash who was as slick as Bob Cousy on offense in setting up Tom Cousey. In addition to this he also tallied 16 points on some fantastic drives and held all conference guard Drew Iltersagen to only two points in a great defensive effort.

Anderson connected on 12 of 24 shots for an even 50 per cent but also was great on defense in almost ramming them back down the throat of the Viking shooters. Norm Johns, a steady but not flashy player, hit five of seven shots for 10 points in a good effort. But Van Zitek, who had been averaging 14.5 points per game, had the worst night of the season. He failed to hit in eight shots and missed both from the charity line. He just simply had one of those horrible nights a player has at times.

Coach Partlow was very well pleased with the showing of his team. He also was surprised to learn that Southern Oregon defeated Eastern Oregon in the other league game, 73-69. Oregon College of Education dropped a non-conference game to St. Martin's, 90-78.

The game was virtually no contest. The Owls jumped off to a quick four-point lead on a pair of baskets by Smith and stayed that way until PSC tied it up at 14-14 and 16-16. But the Owls pulled ahead from there and continued to increase the lead most of the remainder of the game.

Smith hit 11 of his 17 points in the first half and the Vikings began to sag back onto him in the second half, leaving Anderson open for his red-hot hand. Anderson scored 16 of his 25 points in the second half.

The Owls never were in trouble after that. The Vikings were in trouble for four consecutive points to open the second half but Anderson lifted that quickly with a pair of jumpers and the rout was on from then on. Both he and Smith stuffed shots with both hands to delight the fans.

The Owls go to Eastern Oregon next weekend for a two-game series there.

Owls, SOC Gain Wins

Defending champion Oregon Tech rallied past Portland State 76-52 at Klamath Falls and Southern Oregon defeated Eastern Oregon 75-69 at Ashland as the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball season got under way Friday night.

Willie Anderson scored 23 points to pace Oregon Tech's win over Portland State. Sammy Smith, who led the conference in scoring during the past two seasons, tallied 17 in his first game of the season for the Owls.

Jerry Shulls and Dave Hughes hit 11 and 17 points to spark Southern Oregon's victory against Eastern Oregon. The Red Raiders were in front 29-33 at halftime. In a nonconference game, St. Martin's won over Oregon College of Education 90-78 at Olympia, Wash. Bob Maer scored 17 and Steve Rankin added 15 for the losers.

Pacific edged Willamette 40-44 in an opening game in the Northwest Conference. The Badgers were ahead at halftime 22-17. Ken Alcorn and Fred Willis topped the winners' scoring with 12 and 11.
