

# Church Challenged To Push 'Blockbusting' For Negroes

CHICAGO (UPI) — Churches and synagogues were challenged today to take an active part in helping Negro families buy homes in all-white residential neighborhoods.

They also were urged to use their purchasing power as a weapon for racial justice by demanding pledges against job discrimination in all contracts for construction or supplies.

These were some of the specific suggestions thrown out as delegates from 70 Protestant, Jewish and Catholic organizations got down to brass tacks at a National Conference on Religion and Race.

The conference is the first of its kind in U. S. history. It convened under the joint sponsorship of all three major faiths.

Its announced purpose is to galvanize America's religious bodies in "courageous and effective action" against segregation, discrimination and prejudice in all areas of life.

Theological Seminary told the delegates it is time for organized religion to display its concern for racial justice in deeds rather than words.

"We do not need any more resolutions," he said. "What we need is disciplined conduct."

The Rev. Will D. Campbell, associate director of the Department of Racial and Cultural Relations, National Council of Churches, said President Kennedy's recent executive order banning racial discrimination in federally financed housing "offers every church and synagogue an opportunity to involve itself in appropriate direct action."

"The housing order, if enforced and supported, will do far more to change the racial picture in

America than did the Supreme Court decision on public school education in 1954," he said.

"Whereas the school desegregation crisis has affected but a few southern communities, the housing order has far-reaching implications for all parts of the nation."

He said local congregations can back up the presidential order by "securing open occupancy pledges, putting buyer in touch with seller and following up the situation as long as needed."

The Rev. Mr. Campbell, a white southern Baptist, is a former chaplain at the University of Mississippi. He said religious organizations also should become active in Negro voter registration drives.

## Taxpayers Warned Not To Approximate Expense

Taxpayers should not try to approximate their travel and entertainment expenses without any substantiation for the taxable year 1962, the last year that the Cohan rule will remain in force under the 1962 Revenue Act.

A. G. Erickson, director of Internal Revenue for Oregon, warned Internal Revenue Service will employ the same standards to such expenses for the 1962 taxable year as in the past.

He said these standards require the taxpayer must prove: (1) that some expense actually was incurred; (2) that the expense claimed is so directly related to the business of the taxpayer that it qualifies as an ordinary and necessary business expense; and (3) that a basis for approximation has been constructed from available evidence both as to the amount and the business purpose of the expenditure claimed.

The Cohan rule has been nullified by the 1962 Revenue Act effective Jan. 1, 1963, ending the privilege of taxpayers to approximate travel and entertainment expenses when they did not maintain adequate records in support of the deductions.

"But the standards set up by Internal Revenue Service to support such deductions," Erickson said, "placed the burden of proof on the taxpayer. This will continue for the last year of the Cohan rule, the taxable year of 1962."

## Five Hunted By Officers

WALLA WALLA (UPI) — Law enforcement officers of Oregon and Washington searched today for a family of five missing since Jan. 7 when they started out for Enterprise, Ore., along snowy, treacherous roads.

Missing were Richard Brown, 33, Walla Walla, his wife, 34, and their daughters, 2 and 3, and son, 4.

Mrs. Brown's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Schnell, Richland, Wash., spent last weekend searching trails, canyons and roads in the Tollgate, Ore., area for the missing family. They appealed for help in a further search of the mountainous region.

Brown, employed by a door to door canvassing firm with headquarters here, left Jan. 7 with his family to work temporarily at Enterprise. His employer, Edward Johnson, said when Brown failed to return to attend a sales meeting Jan. 9 he notified Oregon State Police.

A state police spokesman at Pendleton said they had been asked only for information and therefore had conducted no search. The spokesman said a search would be conducted since the family now was listed as missing.

The Browns were driving a 1946 blue Ford sedan.

## Beaver Boys State Scheduled In June

The 27th annual Beaver Boys State, sponsored by the American Legion, will be held at Oregon State University, Corvallis, June 23 to 29 inclusive, according to William Stevens, Portland State chairman and director of the program.

Under plans worked out with Oregon State University officials an enrollment of 500 can be handled this year as compared to 485 last year, Stevens announced.

Beaver Boys State is a citizenship training program for boys, 15 to 18 years of age, who have completed their junior year in high school and still have their senior year ahead of them. Boys who are not in school but are otherwise eligible and are properly recommended will be accepted.

"Boys State attempts to show them the American form of government has not outworn its usefulness; that all a democracy needs is an intelligent citizenry and a clean, honest and impartial administration responsive to the will of the people," Stevens remarked. "It is an intensive program for high school boys of outstanding character who have leadership abilities. It is our aim to help develop these boys so they can assume community and state leadership roles in the future."

Enrollment will be handled through local posts of the American Legion.
