Sniper Strikes Thrice At Suburban Residences

BLOOMFIELD Township, Mich. (UPI) — Bloomfield Hills, is a small, wealthy Detroit suburb of expensive modern homes. But its residents live behind drawn curtains.

At night, outside lights are left burning until dawn.

Bloomfield Hills is a city gripped in fear. A sniper who stalks the town by night has attacked three times, firing a .22 caliber gun through windows of the private homes.

Twice he has missed his targets. The third time the mother of five children was shot in the head and fell dead in the kitchen of her home.

Mrs. Mary Godfrey, 38, was shot to death Friday night as she brewed a pot of coffee in the kitchen of her \$40,000 split-level home.

Police were without leads. The entire 19-man force was on duty patrolling the snow-covered, dimly lighted streets in search of the sniper.

They were looking for a teen-aged boy. Police Chief Norman Dehnke said they believed a boy was responsible for the shootings because of the hour they occurred, early evening, and the fact the sniper traveled on foot.

Dehnke said he planned to talk with two youths as soon as they returned from a skiing trip.

Mrs. Godfrey, the attractive wife of a Baptist lay minister, had been watching television with her husband when they decided to have some coffee. She went into the kitchen, which fronted on the street, to prepare it and did not return.

Her husband, Donald, 44, told officers he went to look for her when she did not return and found her on the floor. At first, he said, he thought she had fallen and hurt herself.

But she was pronounced dead on arrival at a nearby hospital and an autopsy revealed a .22 caliber bullet had penetrated her left eye and entered her brain.

The first sniping incident occurred last Tuesday night, and the second came about 24 hours later. The first shooting was at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hans, only two blocks from the Godfrey home. They were watching television when the sliding glass door that opened onto their back yard broke. But the shot failed to penetrate the second thickness of glass.

The next night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pittsley the sniper struck again.

Their daughter, Nancy, 16, was reading a book in the family room of the house when her dog, Capie, began barking. She let him out and he stopped about halfway to his dog house on the rear of the property and began barking.

Nancy said she went back inside and closed the drapes.

"Suddenly," she said, "there were two snapping, cracking sounds, very close together."

She and her mother investigated and found two holes in the plate glass of one of the sliding doors. On the floor of the room were fragments of two bullets.

Glue Jags Controlled

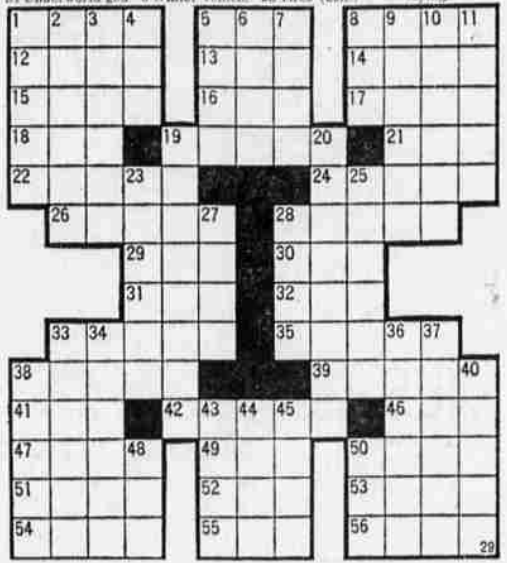

Tax Refunds Available In U.S. Savings Bonds

Taxpayers were reminded today of the new plan allowing them to take their tax refunds in United States Savings Bonds, by A. G. Erickson, director of the Internal Revenue Service, for Oregon.

Beginning with the 1962 individual income tax return, eligible taxpayers will be given the opportunity of taking their refunds in Series E Savings Bonds, in addition to the standard options of cash or applying the refund to next year's tax. When savings bonds are chosen, the smallest possible number of the highest denomination bonds will be issued, along with a check to cover any remaining balance of a dollar or more.

The idea of allowing a taxpayer to choose between savings bonds and a check is not new. Taxpayers have been recommending it for years. What enabled the treasury to offer it with the 1962 returns was the recent installation of high-speed data processing equipment to handle tax returns. The treasury also conducted a survey of taxpayers to determine their interest in a savings bonds refund. A significant number of those questioned said they would take their tax refunds in Series E bonds if given the option.

Last year, approximately five billion dollars in refunds were returned to American taxpayers. Sales of savings bonds could thus be swelled by many millions of dollars in the next few months, thus putting more of the public debt into the hands of small savers.

The tax forms—1040 (long) and 1040A (short)—have been changed to provide an extra space in which taxpayers may elect U.S. Savings Bonds for their refunds. Information on the option also appears in the instructions for both of these forms.
