

Guns Called Youth Crime Accelerators

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Los Angeles police officer testified at a Senate hearing today that the rising juvenile crime rate is being accelerated by the mail order sale of firearms.

"Anyone, virtually anyone, can get a gun," Sgt. Kenneth Carpenter, investigator for the Los Angeles Board of Police Commissioners, told the subcommittee on juvenile delinquency.

The Senate group is investigating interstate traffic in mail order firearms.

Carpenter said even though California and Los Angeles have strict regulations over sale and use of firearms, dealers are able to operate mail order businesses there "virtually uncontrolled."

In addition, Carpenter said, "There is no way of knowing how many of these weapons are being collected to form the secret arsenal of some subversive or revolutionary group."

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., subcommittee chairman, said the hearings followed two years of investigation which disclosed extensive traffic in concealable weapons to murders, felons, mental defectives and juvenile delinquents.

Carpenter testified that mail order dealers advertise their wares in national circulated pulp magazines and some newspapers. The ads, he said, are designed to tempt the juvenile reader to possess a firearm.

Carpenter suggested tightening federal laws to make mail order shipment of concealable firearms illegal and to require all persons obtaining firearms to be fingerprinted and investigated for criminal records.

The committee had on display for the hearing an arsenal of guns, knives, brass knuckles and other weapons available to juveniles. It also showed a number of advertisements through which youngsters could obtain weapons for as little as \$6.95.

Committee staff members said one gun on display which sells for \$19.95 was called a "man-killer" because it was a short-range weapon only and was good only for shooting people. They said the manufacturer had obtained a number of these from an overseas source and had sawed off the barrel to make it easier to conceal.

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE

Speaker Picks Assembly Committees — Slowly

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh was putting the final touches today to an assembly committee lineup that could set the tone of the lower chamber for years to come.

He refused to be rushed.

Unruh, an Inglewood Democrat who sometimes is credited with running the assembly with an iron hand, explained his views on the committee structure in an interview.

"When I appoint committees this time," he said, "I'm setting the philosophical makeup of the assembly for the next six to eight years."

As a result, he has been taking plenty of time. He plans to make public the committee chairmen and membership selections Thursday, nearly a month after the legislature convened.

Committees are where most of the hard work of the legislature is done. During hearings the bills receive expert testimony from proponents and opponents — sometimes taking many hours — and are either recommended "do pass" to the assembly floor, killed outright or sent to an interim study.

Unruh said there will be at least four Republican committee chairmen in the assembly out of nearly 30 committees. He pointed out that there aren't very many GOP members from which to draw the chairmen. There are 17 Republican holdovers in the lower chamber.

The Democratic leader, who is a close associate of President John F. Kennedy and headed his California campaign in 1960, also spoke about his own future in the interview.

"I never really plan ahead," he said. "But I don't plan to be speaker more than another four years. Then I'll start to look around."

He discounted entirely one report that he was a possible 1964 vice presidential candidate and said he felt the report was designed to embarrass both he and Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

He did not dismiss the possibility of being a gubernatorial candidate at some future date. However, he said private industry had made some very attractive offers and that he had been offered a vice presidency in at least two companies with salaries in the \$25,000 area.

"If you don't move forward, you start to move backward," he said. "You can't sit on top of a pyramid for too long."

In four years, Unruh said, there will be many "able, vigorous" men in the assembly who should be given a chance to move ahead. He said, for instance, that he knew of no member of the 80-member assembly who planned to quit two years from now.

Unruh credited former Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell, an unsuccessful gubernatorial candidate in last year's primary election, with being the real power behind the selection of Assembly-

man Charles Conrad, R-Sherman Oaks, as minority floor leader.

"I didn't even have to talk to my friends in the Republican Party," he said. "They agreed with me." He said the swing votes for the floor leadership were held by freshmen assemblymen who favored Conrad because Shell did other developments in the legislature.

Labor—Assemblyman Lester A. McMillan, D-Los Angeles, introduced a labor-sponsored bill to abolish California's ban on jurisdictional strikes.

Doctors — Assemblyman Gordon Colquhoun, R-Indio, proposed

legislation to protect from lawsuits doctors who administer blood tests to drunken drivers. He said some doctors fear they could be sued for assault.

Crossfiling—State Sen. Jack Schrade, R-San Diego, said he would "continue to run" with his bill to restore crossfiling to California, despite the failure of the GOP Central Committee to support the measure at a week-end meeting.

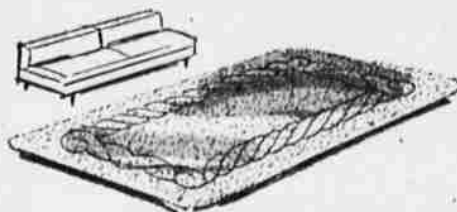

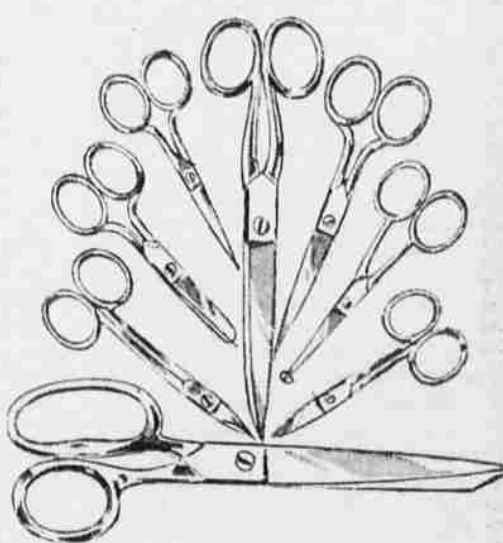

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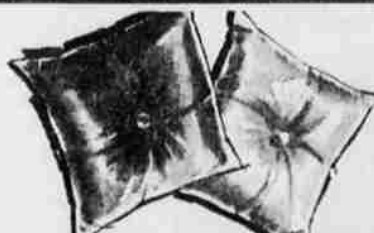
