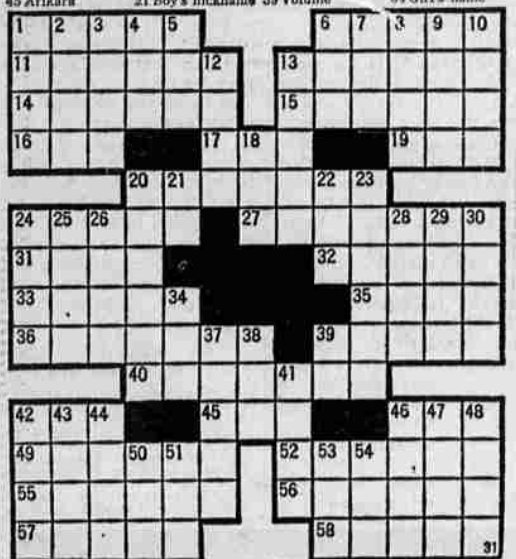

Oregon Revenue Study Stated

SALEM (UPI)—The House Tax Committee will concentrate next week on a general survey of the Oregon revenue situation.
Committee Chairman Richard Eymann, D - Marcola, said the schedule will include "general testimony" on bills that have been proposed to raise new revenues.
Eymann said Dean Ellis, Salem attorney and former state tax commissioner, will keynote the hearings Monday.

Law Regulates Psychiatry

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon would join 22 states with laws aimed at controlling unqualified and improper practice of psychology, under a bill sponsored by three senators and two representatives.
The bill would establish a state board of psychologist examiners, and would prohibit use of the term "psychologist" except by persons meeting certification standards, and persons employed by "bona fide" educational and non-profit organizations.

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Mine Blaze Sealed; Trio Feared Dead

LOGAN, Ill. (UPI)—Mine workers sealed off a fire that raged out of control in the Freeman coal mine No. 5 today, leaving little hope for three miners missing and presumed dead.

Wooden seals covered with plaster were placed over mine entrance and openings to contain the blaze in an area about one-half mile wide by a mile long. Officials hoped the lack of oxygen would snuff out the flames.

The relatively new and modern mine was the successor to the company's Orient No. 2 mine at West Frankfort, Ill., where an explosion and fire claimed 120 lives Dec. 21, 1931. The fire began Tuesday afternoon about a half mile from the main shaft and about five miles from the site of the 1931 tragedy.

The missing miners were identified as Charles J. Marvel, 43, a cutting machine operator and father of seven children; Harold Glenn Miller, 37, a mechanic and father of three; and Paul W. Hartsock, 34, a shuttle car operator and father of four.

Between 150 and 200 men were in the mine when the fire began. Seven or eight men suffered smoke inhalation and four were hospitalized. At first officials believed everyone had escaped safely. But company officials later found street clothes of the missing men hanging in a washroom.

Harry Treadwell, personnel director of the mine, said "we just don't know what happened to the men. One theory is that they might have been coming out and then went back to a resuscitator station, became woozy and collapsed."

Two six-man rescue crews made a thorough check of other sections of the mine before the seals were finished, but reported no trace of the missing men.

Officials feared an underground explosion might occur.

The fire began along a 400-foot section west of the main shaft near a rubber conveyor belt.

Court Okays Bay Action

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court ruled today that the State Board of Education had a right to deny a teacher's certificate to one-time convict Dean N. Bay.

The decision reversed a Union County Circuit Court ruling by Judge W. F. Brown. The Circuit Court had ordered the board to grant Bay a certificate.

The high court, in an opinion written by Justice William C. Perry, said "courts are not permitted to substitute their judgment for that of the State Board of Education where there is substantial evidence in support of the board's finding."

Bay was convicted of grand larceny in Washington in 1953. He served 18 months in a reformatory. In 1958, Washington restored Bay to his full rights.

Dear Ann Landers: This problem concerns a close friend of mine. I like her a great deal but she has one fault which is irritating. She asks to borrow my clothes.

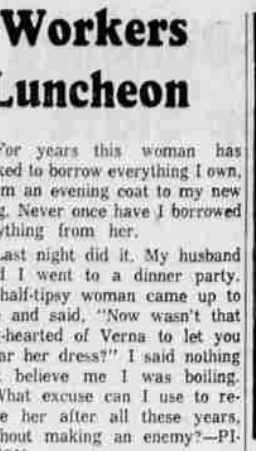

French Veto Denounced By America

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department today denounced France's blackballing of Britain's entry into the European Common Market. But it said the action could do no more than delay Atlantic unity.

In a formal policy statement, a department spokesman said the United States will continue policies to strengthen NATO, create a multilateral nuclear defense force and liberalize trade.

The statement, read to newsmen by press officer Lincoln White, said:

"The United States considers the breakdown in the negotiations for British membership in the European economic community as most unfortunate.

"We do not believe, however, that the present difficulty can do more than delay the movement toward a strong and united Europe working in effective partnership with the United States for the solution of mutual problems.

"For our part we will continue to pursue policies which derive from the hard realities of the situation, which have not been changed by recent events in Brussels. These policies include the strengthening of NATO, the creation of a multilateral nuclear defense force and the liberalization of trade.

"Most Europeans," the statement concluded, "recognize with us that the defense of the Free World is indivisible that the Atlantic community is economically interdependent and that we and Europe share joint responsibilities in the rest of the world."

Duck Preview Attracts Seniors To UO Campus

Duck Preview, the University of Oregon's one-day program for seniors from Oregon high schools, brought almost 1,000 guests to the Eugene campus Saturday, Jan. 26.

Pre-registration of the high school students who were interested in seeing the campus and facilities of the university indicated that some 860 seniors and their parents and counselors would arrive for the Saturday program.

Late registrations, however, swelled this total to between 900 and 1,000. The total registration included approximately 60 parents and fewer than 10 counselors.

Students and parents who arrived early during the morning registration period were taken on general tours of the campus. Those who came later started the preview program with the luncheon held at 11 a.m. in the Erb Memorial Union. Faculty and student leaders spoke at the luncheon.

The afternoon program included meetings in schools and departments of the university. Each visitor had the opportunity of attending two departmental meetings of his choice.

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
