Felt Predicts Viet Win

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Adm. Harry D. Felt, U. S. Pacific commander, predicted today that the American-backed government of South Viet Nam will win its war against Communist Guerrillas within three years.

Felt also told a news conference he did not think Communist China or North Viet Nam would plunge into the Southeast Asian war with overt military action.

Planners in Peking and Hanoi would "hesitate a long, long time" before throwing military forces into South Viet Nam because they would reason that such action would mean "confrontation with the United States."

"They don't want to fight the United States because they know how strong we are," Felt said.

The admiral gave a generally optimistic picture of the progress of South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem's progress in putting down the Communist Viet Cong insurgents.

Felt said "confident" that victory could be achieved in three years, with the Saigon government in control of more than 90 per cent of the population and the guerrillas driven out or underground.

Felt said that there was "no thought" of American forces taking over any command functions in South Viet Nam.

"This is their war," he said, "and the American role will continue to be equipping, training and advising."
