Evangelism Emphasized

Special services will be held at the Klamath Falls Free Methodist Church, 1918 Oregon Ave., beginning Feb. 6 and continuing through Feb. 15. Rev. Ragland J. Stewart will be the speaker for the nightly services at 7:30.

Rev. Stewart is minister of the Free Methodist Church of Medford. A Seminary graduate, he has pastored in the Oregon Conference for approximately seven years.

The local Free Methodist Church is cooperating with the Oregon Conference-wide emphasis on evangelism, with February designated as the "Month of Evangelism." During the month, each church is inviting a minister in the conference or an accepted evangelist of the church to conduct special meetings.

According to the local pastor, C. O. Tremaine, Rev. Stewart's messages are designed to meet present day spiritual needs. The public is invited to attend the services which will feature special music every night.

Sects Seek Unity Move

NEW YORK—A plan that would unite 20,000,000 American Protestants in a single new church by 1965 will be released next month. The Insider's Newsletter reported on Jan. 28.

The result of a five-year study by a committee of 24 leading clergymen, the plan was formed under the Anglican Bishop of Oxford and the former president of the World Methodist Council. It sweeps away theological obstacles standing in the way of unity and makes possible a reunion of Britain's Anglicans and Methodists after a 170-year separation.

Prior to the study, the biggest barrier to unity was the Anglican's refusal to accept the validity of the orders of a Methodist minister who had not had the hand of a bishop laid upon him.

The committee gets around this by setting up a service which would be attended by both Anglican and Methodist clergymen. The Methodists would be ordained by an Anglican bishop and the Anglicans would receive the hand of a Methodist minister.

It also proposes that in small communities where the two churches compete with one another, one of the two should eventually be closed.

Word of the plan has, according to The Newsletter, caused Methodist, Episcopal, and Presbyterian leaders to see in it a solution to the problem posed by Episcopalian insistence that any church formed by three denominations must have clergymen ordained by a consecrated bishop.

University Choir Slates Concert

The Pacific University Singers, select 38-voice a cappella choir, will present a concert Feb. 2 at 8 p.m. in the First Congregational Church, 2160 Garden.

The concert will feature great choral works of contrasting styles. Vivaldi's "Gloria" will be one of the numbers representative of the 18th century. The contemporary idiom will be portrayed in works by Oldroyd, Christiansen, Glarum, and J. Wesley Harris.

The choral tradition at Pacific University, located at Forest Grove, Ore., dates back to the founding of a conservatory of music there in the late 19th century. Seven years ago the a cappella chorus was re-organized under its present name, and since that time has traveled nearly 29,000 miles presenting concerts in California, Oregon, and Washington.

The members of the singers are drawn from varied fields of interest and study at the university. With membership open to all students meeting the entrance standards, the group of selected voices represents a significant cross-section of student life.

D. Deane Hutchison, instructor in organ and director of choral organizations at Pacific, is conductor for the 1963 ten-day tour. He began his music studies at the age of four, and at seven was a special student at Grinnell College.

Presently Minister of Music at Portland's First Congregational Church, he is acclaimed by critics as an outstanding American virtuoso with a mastery of programming and an authority in the art of registration. Dr. Hutchison is a member of the American Guild of Organists and has concertized extensively in this country and abroad.

Jerry Wesley Harris, associate conductor, received his academic training at Lewis and Clark College, University of Oregon, Portland State College, and the University of Southern California. His current duties include director of the Pacific University Community Orchestra, director of choral music and orchestra at Sunset High School, Beaverton, and editor of the Oregon Music Educator. Holding both the B. Mus. Ed. and the Mus. M. degrees, the accomplished violinist has a list of some fifty published arrangements and compositions to his credit.

The assistant tour director, Tom Grigsby, is a native of Klamath Falls. He received his bachelors degree from Pacific University in 1959, taught high school for three

years in Rockway, Ore., and joined the faculty of Pacific University last year to teach choir and band while working on his masters degree in music. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Grigsby of Klamath Falls and was graduated from KUHS.

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Klamath Falls LDS Church Sponsors Korean Classical Dance Troupe As Goodwill Measure

Authentic Korean culture in music, dance, and song will be presented in Klamath Falls on Feb. 9 at 8 p.m. in the Mills School Auditorium by the Korean Classical Dance Troupe from Seoul. They will appear under the auspices of the First Ward, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

The 10 member troupe, composed of Korea's leading professional dancers and musicians, are approved by the acting president of Korea, General Chung Hee of the country's culture. Having passed rigorous competition to qualify to represent their country in the United States, the dedicated artists are performing without pay.

Sponsored by the May 16th National Scholarship Fund Corporation, the purpose of the group is to raise money to educate outstanding but needy Korean students at home and abroad. May 16 was the date of the coup d'etat that resulted in the assumption of

power by the present military junta, marking the day of freedom for the people.

The six women and four men perform under the direction of Myoung Hoon Kang and Byung Sik Hong. Mr. Hong has become an elder in the LDS Church since his conversion seven years ago, and Mr. Kang, a three-year convert, holds the Aaronic Priesthood.

Coming to this country at the invitation of Brigham Young University officials, who are attempting to foster better understanding of our Asian neighbors, the troupe gave its initial performance in the BYU fieldhouse where it was accorded a standing ovation by thousands. President of the university, Ernest L. Wilkinson, said, "This outstanding activity is one of the best BYU has ever had."

Praise and a statement of endorsement were also given the artists by Elizabeth R. Hayes, professor and director of dance

education at the University of Utah, following the troupe's performance in Salt Lake City.

While realizing the importance of raising scholarship funds, the members of the troupe are more concerned that American citizens become familiar with Korean customs. "Many people outside of Korea do not know what kind of art and culture the Koreans have in music, dancing, singing, costumes, and traditional music instruments," said Mr. Hong to Brigham Young officials. His remark is substantiated by the fact that the troupe is the first Korean dancing group to be sent to the U.S.

Some of the many instruments played in Korea for centuries will be used by the performers, such as the Kayakum, a six-foot long, one-foot wide instrument strung with 12 silk strings; the Azeng, which sounds like a violin but is different in shape; a flute-like Tac Tu, about twice the size of an American flute; and the small Pirie, which makes distinctive sounds never heard in American instruments.

One of Korea's most famous drum dancers will beat out rhythm on nine Buks, or round drums, as she dances to a remarkably fast tempo. Although already ranked among the top drum players, Yun Joo Kim is a 15-year-old high school girl and the youngest member of the troupe.

Other dances will include colorfully costumed performers presenting the sword dance, fan dance, and group dances.

The Korean dancers arrived in this country by plane on Nov. 10, and plan to tour for four months. Following a number of performances in San Francisco, they will reach their Klamath Falls destination late Saturday afternoon. Monday they will move on to Eugene where they will perform at the University of Oregon. They are also booked for appearances in Portland, Corvallis, Seattle, and Vancouver, B.C.

Tickets for the Feb. 9 performance are \$1.50 per person. They may be purchased from Der-Pirle, which makes distinctive sounds never heard in American instruments.
