Check Sent To County

The State Department of Motor Vehicles has sent a check in the amount of \$101,216.63 to Klamath County for its share of various motor vehicle taxes collected in the county during the quarter from Oct. 1 through Dec. 31. County Treasurer Eva Cook said Friday.

Nineteen per cent of state tax revenues collected in the county for motor vehicle operation registration, vehicle fuel taxes, motor carrier fees, and fines for violations of motor vehicle laws are refunded to the county, Mrs. Cook said.

The tax refund will go to the County Roads Department fund and will be used for the construction and maintenance of roads.

Illness Claims Irish Primate

DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI) — John Cardinal D'Alton, Roman Catholic primate of all Ireland, died today after an illness of several months. He was 80.

The exact cause of death was not immediately known.

D'Alton, Archbishop of Armagh, was a shy, retiring man with the reputation as Ireland's greatest classical scholar. He was 11th successor to the Emerald Isle's patron saint Patrick.

He was the second cardinal to die within 10 days, reducing the strength of the sacred College of Cardinals to 83 members. William Cardinal Godfrey, Archbishop of Westminster and the leading Catholic prelate in Great Britain, died Jan. 22 at the age of 73.

In Vatican City, Pope John XXIII received the news of D'Alton's death with "deep sorrow" and went immediately to his private chapel to pray for the Irish primate.

Belskey Named Police Matron

Attorney Claims Crabtree 'Has Attempted To Impeach Judge's Dignity, Integrity'

"District Attorney Dale Crabtree has attempted to impeach the dignity and integrity of Judge David Vandenberg in a manner that is dilatory, sham and frivolous."

Those were the remarks of Attorney William Bradshaw as he appeared before Judge David R. Vandenberg in circuit court early today to argue against a demurrer filed by the district attorney in the case of the state of Oregon vs. Arline Lee Rich, charged with burglary in a dwelling.

In an affidavit filed last Monday, District Attorney Crabtree charged, "Judge Vandenberg is prejudiced against the interest of the plaintiff and myself and that the state of Oregon and I believe it cannot have a fair and impartial trial before the said judge."

The affidavit was read by Judge Vandenberg in court today and set off a stormy 20-minute dispute with Bradshaw and deputy district attorney Bob Thomas, representing the district attorney, as principals and the jurist as the observer.

After the judge read the document, Bradshaw addressed the court and said acidly, "District Attorney Crabtree has gone a long way in speaking for the attorneys in Klamath County and the people of Oregon. As a member of

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Ragland Commends Organizations For Hospital Effort, Enthusiasm

Clubs and service organizations sponsoring projects to raise funds for the construction of the proposed 141-bed Intercommunity Hospital in Klamath Falls were commended for their efforts and enthusiasm in a policy statement issued Friday by Ross Ragland, president of the Intercommunity Hospital Board of Directors.

Ragland also requested those and other groups to refrain from initiating new projects during the next four months, and urged them to contact the Hospital Association Development Office to learn how they may best serve during that time.

The statement read in part, "The Board of Directors does not and cannot encourage, sponsor or endorse any money-raising projects outside of the official campaign which is headed by James Stillwell, Mike Balsiger and Dick Henzel."

But clubs and individuals eager to assist in the fund drive may contact the association development office and become members of the person-to-person money-raising project which will begin soon, the policy further stated.

Many more men and women are needed in the official fund drive and those persons and clubs who assist will receive recognition for serving in the work of the regular campaign, it continued.

2 Consumer Protection Measures Introduced

SALEM (UPI) — Two consumer protection bills, one regulating retail installment sales, the other prohibiting retailers from placing a quantity limitation on advertised merchandise, were introduced today in the Senate.

They were submitted by the Senate Committee on Financial Affairs.

In the House a bill to permit school districts to furnish free textbooks to secondary school pupils was introduced at the request of the Oregon School Boards Association.

At present, free textbooks are provided only through the eighth grade.

The retail installment bill would require time purchase contracts to include a listing of the credit service charge in addition to the price of the item sold.

The other measure would prohibit retail sellers from refusing to sell for the stated price. It also would prohibit a retail seller from advertising merchandise with a limitation on quantity which any one purchaser may buy at the advertised price.

A bill by Sen. Thomas Mahoney, D-Portland, adds to the list of gubernatorial appointments subject to senate confirmation.

The confirmation requirement would be extended to all members of the Public Welfare Commission, Tax Commission, Industrial Accident Commission, Highway Commission, Liquor Control Commission, Racing Commission, Board of Agriculture, Fish Commission, Game Commission, Board of Parole and Probation, superintendent of state police, public utility commissioner, corporation commissioner, superintendent of banks, and real estate commissioner.

A bill by Rep. Gerald Detering, R-Harrisburg, would permit zoning of land exclusively for farm use. Such land would be assessed as farm land and not at the value of other potential use.

A bill to create a department of natural resources, as urged by Gov. Mark Hatfield, was submitted by Rep. F. F. Montgomery, R-Eugene.

A bill submitted by Rep. W. O. Kelsay, D-Roseburg, would raise resident hunting license fees from \$4 to \$5, and from \$4 to \$6 the fishing license fee.

Plans Drawn For Building

TULELAKE — Plans are being drawn up in Sacramento by the Division of Fairs and Expositions for an addition to the present home economics building on the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds.

The 32 by 64 structure will be of pumice tile with maple floor and sliding doors, to be built at a cost of \$36,000.

Completion date is for 1963 fair time, Sept. 7, 8, 9.

Announcement on the plans was made by Bill Whitaker, fair manager.
