

Death Penalty Moratorium Asked

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown asked the California Legislature today to approve a four-year limited moratorium on the death penalty.

In a special message to the lawmakers, the governor said: "A moratorium would end our modern equivalent of the Roman circus, the lurid and emotional attempt at a moratorium died on

an unusual 40-40 tie vote of the assembly two years ago.

The administration bill would grant a four-year moratorium to all but double killers, twice-convicted killers, kidnap-murderers or prisoners who kill peace officers. It would not apply to prisoners now on death row at San Quentin.

Brown said he agreed to the exceptions because they remove the most common objections to total abolition, which he favors, and added: "It is better that we move one step away from the barbaric practice of capital punishment than not move at all."

The bill was certain to face strong opposition from minority Republicans in the assembly and from at least part of the state Senate, which stopped Brown's last all-out try for repeal of the death penalty.

But Brown presented his case in an eight-page printed pamphlet reviewing both the state's recent history of executions and his own convictions on the subject.

"You know where I stand," he said. "I oppose capital punishment because it weakens the very society it means to protect; because it shames the public conscience and denies the entire rehabilitative concept of modern penology."

The governor compared California, where 28 persons were put to death in the gas chamber in 1960 and 1961, to New York, where there were eight executions.

He said that in 1961, there were 609 homicides in California but only 106 defendants were found guilty of first degree murder and only 29 were given the sentence of death.

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Waldo Lake Appeals Spark New Policy In High Mountain Area Management

EUGENE (Special) — A train of legal action involving the Waldo Lake area began almost two years ago came to an end Tuesday, Jan. 29, as appealing outdoor clubs received a reply from Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to a second appeal of certain management decisions for the area which they filed last July. In his reply, Freeman granted two of the appellants' requests and denied a third.

The secretary promised that landscape management areas would be set up around 11 scenic features, including eight lake groupings, two rocky points, and one access road, as the outdoor groups asked, and he provided detailed answers in a nine-page response, as the appellants asked, to questions left unanswered in objections contained in the first appeal, filed in March of 1961.

In giving his answers, the secretary contended that logging can be done within landscape management areas without being unsightly, that logging can be done without soil erosion affecting the lake's clarity, and that no formal reservation of the northwest small lakes area is necessary as the designation of recreation as the key value in the area adequately protects it.

The secretary denied the appellants' request that all portions of landscape management areas be managed to maintain a near-natural scenic appearance, saying that this appearance will not be completely preserved since some logging will be allowed.

In commenting on the results of the appeals, the outdoor clubs' agent, J. Michael McCloskey of Eugene, said he felt two achievements of historic importance has
