Credit Card Case Slated

Judge David R. Vandenberg denied a motion to dismiss an indictment charging Leonard Mackey, 37, with forgery involving a service station credit card. It developed in circuit court Friday.

Mackey's attorney argued for the dismissal on the grounds that the defendant had been indicted more than 60 days after the alleged crime had been committed.

After denying the motion, Judge Vandenberg set for a Wednesday, Feb. 6, as the time he would receive an entry of plea from the defendant.

Meanwhile, in the other circuit court, Judge Donald A. W. Fisher deferred the passing of sentence upon Robert Leon Chocktoot, 39, who had pleaded guilty to burglary not in a dwelling, until 10 a.m. Friday, Feb. 8.

Chocktoot was arrested by Klamath Falls police while he was burglarizing the Unique Market, 129 South Ninth Street, last Jan. 3.

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Farm Bills Introduced

SALEM (UPI)—Bills to firm up farm bargaining power and to relieve the tax squeeze on farms near cities were introduced Friday in the Oregon House.

One bill would require purchasers of farm products to negotiate with farmer associations.

The other would provide for farm-use zoning of land as long as it is used exclusively for agricultural purposes.

The farmer thus would benefit from lower farm-use taxes on land holding potential higher value for subdivision or business use.

A recapture clause provides for payment of higher back taxes if the land is sold or put to non-farm use.

The farm - use zoning bill was sponsored by Rep. Gerald Detering, R-Harrisburg, and eight other House members.

The farmers bargaining bill, introduced by Rep. Cornelius Bateson, D-Salem, and eight other House members, is aimed at making it easier for farmers to group together in seeking higher prices for their goods.

It would do this by prohibiting dealers from refusing to discuss prices with a producer negotiating association.

It would apply to groups dealing in all farm products except grains, seeds and timber. An association would include at least one-fourth of the producers of a given commodity in a given area.

A similar bill passed the House late in the 1961 session, but failed to get much Senate attention.

Alex Smith Accepts Job

Alex E. Smith, supervisor of the Winema Forest, will chair the employee-executive division of the Intercommunity Hospital fund drive.

Smith, born in South Dakota, has been a resident here for the past several years when he was transferred here to supervise the setting up and administration of the new Winema National Forest.

He has a B.S. degree in forestry from the University of Washington. A member of Rotary and the YMCA, Smith has served on the Boy Scout Committee in both Portland and Klamath Falls. He also served on the board of directors of the Camp Fire Girls in Wenatchee, Wash., and is currently on the United Fund board of directors here.

A veteran of World War II with service in the Navy, Smith has had 22 years experience with U.S. Forest Service in Oregon and Washington.

The division he heads will solicit contributions under the unit account plan from government and public service employees.

A group of 22 volunteers is being recruited for this phase of the drive which is expected to contact about 100 different companies.

Building Bond Sale Supported

SALEM (UPI)—The House Tax Committee recommended Friday that Oregon's higher education system be allowed to sell another \$10 million in construction bonds.

The money would build seven dormitories and a dining hall, all self-liquidating projects.

The Board of Higher Education has asked to raise its bonding limit from \$34 to \$62 million. The remaining \$10 million will be considered later.

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DENTAL BILL DESIGNED TO CLOSE REPAIR LABS

Senate Bill No. 50, what does it mean to the denture wearing public? Are you willing to submit to the demands of a professional organization which claims the right, such as has been claimed by totalitarian governments to dictate what you may do or not do with your own dental plates and to prohibit you from having them repaired, how and by whom you please?

Who owns your dentures? Bought and paid for with your money and the sweat of your brow, they are definitely personal property. You own them. You can do with them as you please. It is every man's right to do as he pleases with his own dental plates in order that he may eat his meals.

If you live in the state of Oregon and the Oregon dentists have their way, you are likely to learn that you do not have any vested interest in your dentures other than the privilege of paying for them. You are likely to learn that even after your dentures have been taken out of your mouth, they are handover to the dental technician, subject to the dictatorial control of the dentists' professional association, empowered by law to make you obtain the permission of a dentist — at a price — in order to have the slightest repair made in them.

If a tooth comes out of one of your plates, can you take it or send it to a dental technician and have it done in a matter of an hour or so, or even while you wait at a cost of six dollars or less? Senate Bill No. 50 provides that you must first go to a dentist and obtain from him a prescription to have that tooth put back. In practically the same technicality, you would have to take out your dentures before you could get your dentures back.

If you are permitted to put into effect laws requiring every denture owner to obtain a prescription before he can have the slightest repair of his dentures, the simplest repair of a denture is unnecessary hardship on the residents of Oregon, and the dentists are in a position to legislate trying to do just that.

This is more than a situation in which a dentist has arisen between dentists and denture wearers. This is a situation in which the public, the legal owners of their dentures, is involved. No person in his right mind will believe that a prescription written by a dentist who may never see the dentures in question will enable the technician to do a better job of replacing a lost tooth than he would have done without a prescription. The only difference to an unbiased observer, is the additional cost pocketed by the dentist. He may have said for his own dentures, they are his property. There is no constitutional right granted to him to make his profession a monopoly. There is no justification in an argument that he may ever have been reduced by a blacksmith or by a dentist to a helpless condition, as his semiprofession claim to be, who are once there, should be reduced to the status of laborers, peons and slaves, and be kept in that status by the law.

The point at issue is that the public should not be victimized by the demand of a profession to be kept in a position of helplessness, or to make more money, certainly not to the extent of reaching into a man's mouth and extracting his complete food intake and giving it to the dentist.

Mother Gets Probation For Child Stealing

A 34-year-old Roseburg woman who stole her own child is probably grateful today that the penalty for the crime she committed is a stiff one.

Joan Wood, convicted by a Klamath County jury of child stealing, was placed on five years' probation by Judge David R. Vandenberg in circuit court Friday.

The request for leniency followed a similar plea by Mrs. Wood's attorney, who argued that the charge of child stealing was the same as kidnapping and was intended to punish people who stole the children of other persons.

Kidnaping in Oregon is punishable by a term in prison up to 25 years or life.

The attorney stated during his plea that the sentence prescribed under the statutes was too severe for the indiscretion committed by Mrs. Wood.

The defendant was convicted of taking her 8-year-old daughter, Glenda Lou Wood, from a Klamath Falls woman who had been designated as the child's legal guardian by the Klamath County Welfare Department. Mrs. Wood took her daughter to Roseburg where the child was traced when she attempted to enroll in school.

The defense attorney stated his investigations indicated that the Wood case marked the first time that a natural mother had been convicted of stealing her own child.

Judge Vandenberg later remarked in court that a prison sentence of 25 years appeared to be too harsh considering the circumstances of the crime. The judge then received the recommendation for leniency from the district attorney and set the terms of the probation, which included, among other specifications, that Mrs. Wood was to remain in Douglas or Klamath County during the five-year period.

Bakery Owner Dies At Home

EUGENE (UPI)—Basil T. Williams, 67, owner of Williams Bakery here, died at his home late Thursday of an apparent heart attack.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. Monday at St. Mary's Episcopal Church here. Williams played football at the University of Oregon and later was an assistant coach.

Survivors include the widow and a son, Thomas.
