Current snow storms may well bring to the mind of a young Klamath Falls girl three days when she and fellow travelers were snowbound in Zurich, Switzerland.

She is Virginia Borden, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest L. Borden, this city. The occasion was the latter part of a tour taken by the Belles and Beaux of Harding College in Searcy, Ark.

The Belles and Beaux, a group of 20 talented performers, were chosen by audition from the school's a cappella chorus. The groups then competed with 150 similar school groups to become one of 29 units to be sent abroad by the USO to entertain U.S. troops.

The Belles and Beaux, who made a similar tour of the Orient two years ago, is a versatile group of artists. Their programs were of a variety of material, with patriotic songs, popular selections, Broadway hits and novelty acts. One section of every program consisted of selected sacred songs.

They presented 49 regular performances, of which three or four were in hospitals and the rest in service clubs or auditoriums. These were at Army posts in such places as Hanau, Bad Kreuznach, Kaiserslautern and Permasens in Germany and Nancy, Toul and Trois-Fontaines in France.

The ninth week of their overseas stay was free for members of the group to use as they desired. Virginia and a group toured Italy, Austria and Switzerland. In these countries they gave several performances under the sponsorship of the Church of Christ and local music clubs.

In Florence they sang in the Palazzo Vecchio with the mayor of the city among the audience. Another appearance was before the International Lions Club.

It was on the return motor trip to Paris that the young travelers were caught snowbound in Zurich and after three days loaded themselves and a small rented car aboard a train for the remainder of the trip to France. An important part of their experiences was picking up Christmas messages to be delivered later by phone to families of 150 soldiers living all over America. This the young people did after returning to the states Dec. 24, two months after their departure by plane from McGuire Air Force Base.

Virginia Borden was graduated from Harding College last May with a BS degree in mathematics. She previously had attended Magic Valley Christian College in Albion, Idaho, for two years.

She was the tennis champion at Harding and was a member and president her senior year of Kappa Kappa Kappa Social Club.

The attractive young woman proved herself an able actress in the Belles and Beaux program in addition to playing clarinet and singing alto parts in solos and ensembles.

At present her future plans are indefinite and she is at the home of her parents in Klamath Falls.
