

Frog Pond Leases Awarded To 62 Successful Bidders

A total of 308 bids were received and opened Jan. 29 by the Project Office of the Bureau of Reclamation for the leasing of 62 units of public land in the Frog Pond Lease Area of the Klamath Reclamation Project. These leases cover use of units of land averaging about 100 acres each, for agricultural and grazing purposes.

Councilman Faces Jail

TACOMA (UPI)—Former Longview city councilman Anthony Fernandez drew an 11-year, 11-month prison sentence here Friday after his Dec. 28 conviction on seven out of eight counts of interstate fraud and one count of conspiracy.

Fernandez' attorney immediately served notice of appeal, and Federal Court Judge William East set the appeal bond at \$100,000.

Fernandez earlier posted a \$50,000 bond on bankruptcy fraud charges which are still pending in Federal Court.

Raymond Dual of Kelso and Earl Dalgleish of Haines, Ore., who were convicted at the same time as Fernandez on similar charges, were sentenced to 27 months, with all but three months suspended.

In the same connection, Carl Pratt, Portland, Ore., received a 36-month sentence on one count and was placed on probation for two other counts.

Dual and Dalgleish served notice of appeal and their appeal bond was set at \$5,000.

Jacoby On Bridge

SALEM (UPI)—Grouping of 15 state agencies in a commerce department is sought in a bill expected to be introduced in the Oregon Legislature Monday.

Sponsors are Republican House Minority Leader F. F. Montgomery of Eugene; GOP Senate Minority Leader Anthony Yturri of Ontario; Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland; and Rep. Edward Whelan, D-Portland.

The proposal is one of two reorganization plans stressed by Gov. Mark Hatfield this session. The other is a department of natural resources.

The commerce department would take in state agencies on planning and developed corporations, banking, real estate, insurance, travel information, and the capital guide. It also would include agencies that regulate and license architects, landscape architects, collection agencies, auctioneers, river pilots, and watchmakers.

The director would be appointed by the governor.

A similar department was approved by the Senate in 1961, but eventually died along with the rest of the governor's overall reorganization plan.

SISKIYOU SCHOOLS TEST Teaching By Telephone

A new idea of using the telephone for teaching foreign languages is being tried out in the Siskiyou County Schools.

In the summer of 1962, Paul Fisher, county superintendent of schools, sent assistant superintendent Bob Dais to Columbia University to attend a three-week workshop in rural school administration. During the course of this workshop, a new use of the telephone was tried. A speakerphone was installed in the classroom by American Telephone and Telegraph that enabled the class to talk with Orville Freeman, Secretary of Agriculture, in Washington, D.C. Similar phone calls were made throughout the workshop and the method seemed to be successful.

Upon returning to Siskiyou County, Dais conceived the idea of using this media of communication in the classrooms. It was his idea that a foreign language could be taught to the rural schools through the speakerphone using a master teacher. With the approval of the county superintendent of schools and money approved by the county board of education, Dais presented his idea to representatives of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The equipment marketed was not suitable and modifications had to be made. After many months of trial and error, the equipment was installed. The Board of Trustees of the McCloud Union School District allowed the county office

to use their foreign language instructor, John Peracchino, to work on this pilot project.

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Grenada School agreed to have their eighth grade children participate in the experiment. Beginning Jan. 7, 1963, the first telephone call was placed by Peracchino from McCloud, a distance of 50 miles from Grenada. The first Italian lesson by telephone began.

The Grenada eighth grade class receives instruction three days a week by telephone and on the other two days supplement the project within the classroom with the use of tapes and records.

The equipment consists of nine microphones with two children to a microphone and one speaker that is installed in the front of the room so the class may hear the instructor and each child may talk to the instructor through the individual microphones on their desks. Peracchino has assigned Italian names to each student and all conversation is in Italian.

It is hoped through this pilot project rural schools will be able to meet the foreign language requirement, that becomes effective 1965, by using a master teacher in a central place to teach individual schools each day.

The installation cost was \$200 and the rental for the speakerphones is \$39 per month. Toll charges will be about \$25 to \$30 per month. Should this experiment prove successful, it will be necessary to establish a special educational telephone rate.

Arab Study Scheduled
Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, Southern Oregon College president, has been chosen by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, as one of seven outstanding educators to visit the United Arab Republic in April to study and inspect its system of education.

According to H. Kenneth Barker, spokesman for the AACTE, the major emphases during the month-long tour will be placed upon the study in depth of UAR teacher training programs and the vital role of teacher education on the international scene.

Dr. Stevenson's candidacy for the honor was based upon his long-time interest in attracting foreign students to attend SOC's many activities and accomplishments in education, and his proven endorsement of the objective of the AACTE in furthering the advancement of teacher education in member teacher-training institutions.

Funds for the tour of the UAR will be provided by the Department of State, consisting of reciprocal monies deposited to the credit of the U.S. in Egypt.

MISUSE OF FUNDS DENIED By Printer President
COLORADO SPRINGS (UPI)—The president of the International Typographical Union denied today charges that the union had unconstitutionally appropriated \$700,000 from ITU funds.

"There has been no misappropriation of any of the assets, money, securities, or tangibles of either the Union Printers Home (in Colorado Springs) or the International Typographical Union," Brown said.

John Conley, a retired union official said at Dallas, Tex., Friday that the money had been taken unconstitutionally, with \$500,000 taken from a fund for maintaining the printers home and going to Union-School Realty Co., which he said has no connection with the ITU.

"All transactions of the Union Printers Home and ITU and the corporations associated with them have been in strict moral and legal compliance with all the laws of the ITU and the UPH, as well as the state and the federal governments," Brown said.

"Every penny collected by the UPH for the ITU is properly receipted, accounted for and audited by a reputable CPA firm and also by a board of auditors elected by the union," Brown said.

"The Union-School Realty Co., referred to is the ITU training center in Colorado Springs. In Indianapolis, the Union Realty Company held the property. Transfer from an Indianapolis company to a Colorado Springs company was legal in all respects."
