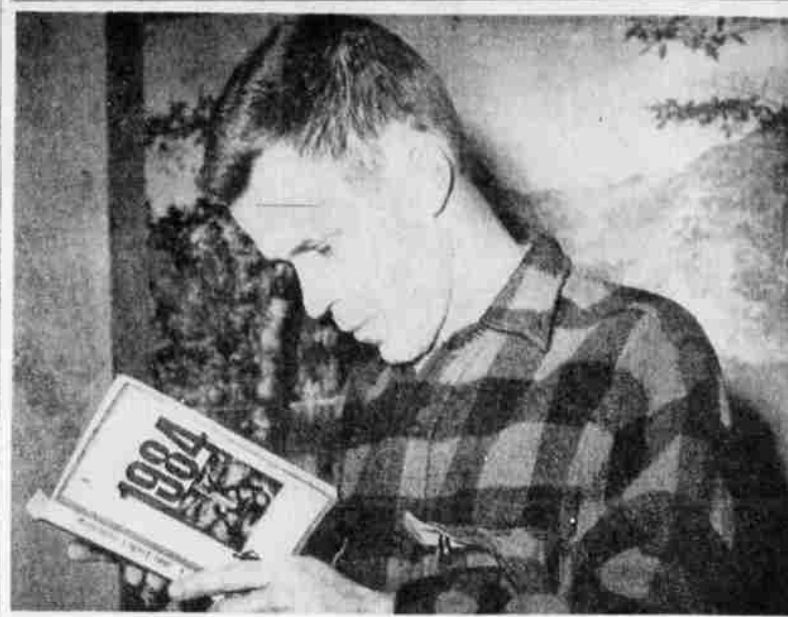

Study Of Oregon's Fiscal Program Reveals Buildup Of School Funds

Editors note: The legislature's own fiscal officer has made an independent study of the governor's proposed budget. Its recommendations include some sharp innovations in Oregon's fiscal policies. First in a series of three.

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon is in the position of a man who asks for a raise to support his family while salting away part of his original earnings in a savings account. The people of Oregon are, says it will cost \$404.1 million in

taxpayers' money to keep state services going for the next biennium.

He has asked for a raise—in taxes—of at least \$49 million.

Meanwhile, earnings from school grant lands that Oregon received a century ago are piling up in a special fund—the Common School Fund administered by the State Land Board.

Much of the revenue is coming from timber sales from the school lands. After the revenues go into the Common School Fund, they are reinvested, mainly in bonds and loans.

Under the present constitution and laws, only the interest from these bonds and loans is given to local school districts.

Change Said Needed
Legislative Fiscal Officer Kenneth Bragg says the legislature should think about changing all this.

In a report just issued, the legislature's own fiscal watchdog has questioned the venerable fund. To Bragg, it is a debatable practice for the state to borrow money on one side while saving its earnings on another side.

Bragg says it would be timely for Oregon to think about amending its laws and its constitution to make the earnings from the state lands available now at a time when they are needed.

The fund is now worth \$18.5 million. Timber sales will build it up by \$2.6 million in the 1963-65 biennium. Cash from timber sales is expected to be worth \$3 million by the 1969-71 biennium.

On the other hand, interest from all the reinvested money in the fund will be worth just \$1.2 million in the next biennium. If the fund keeps building up, it will amount to \$1.8 million by 1969-71.

Interests from the fund now are providing local districts with about \$1 per census school child. Bragg's proposals would more than triple that amount.

Bragg suggests two changes.

Law Change
One is a change in the law. It would make it possible for the \$2.6 to \$3 million in biennial earnings from timber sales to go directly to the school districts, in-

stead of going into the fund.

That change would triple the amount the school districts are now getting, while leaving the fund at its present size. The fund would continue to produce \$1.2 in interest that also would go to the districts.

The second is a change in the constitution. It would let the legislature dive into the fund itself, giving the local school districts a \$15 million chunk in 1963-67. Under this plan, interest from the fund gradually would diminish as the fund was depleted.

Bragg's plan would ease the financial pinch that Oregon is now feeling a little. It would provide a greater source of money for school districts in the decade ahead.

Not until the 1970's or later would earnings from the lands amount to less than the potential interest from the fund if the earnings were plowed back in.

Two basic concepts have bearing on Bragg's suggestion. One is the open question of whether Oregon wants to build up a common school fund as an investment for the future.

This is a policy matter for the legislature to decide. But Bragg says another basic concept has washed away in recent years.

Originally, the land was the capital, and timber cutting depleted it. Therefore, the money from the timber was put into the fund to keep the basic working capital at the same level.

This is no longer the situation, says Bragg. Now, timber is being cut on a sustained yield basis, so that the resource no longer is being depleted.

Thus, even if the fund were spent the earnings from the school grant lands, under new land management practices, could be expected to continue.

THE WELL CHILD Aspirin Poisoning Result Of Slip-ups

Aspirin is the most common cause of poisoning in children, and Dr. Roger Meyer has tried to determine the reason.

He was able in one year to find 128 cases of aspirin poisoning in children between 1 and 5 years of age in a large American city. More than half of these children had easily removed the "child-proof" protective cap that has been devised to prevent such accidents.

In many instances the child was imitating "what mommy does when she doesn't feel good." Some of the children were either playing doctor or having a "tea party" and the aspirin tablets were shared with brothers or playmates. Seventy-two of them took the pills in the hour just preceding their bedtime, a time when the child was beginning to get hungry and the mother was too busy preparing the meal to notice what was happening.

It was found that 43 of the children were recovering from an illness and were just beginning to get their appetites back. In many instances a visitor or telephone call had distracted the mother's attention from her child. In some cases the child had been left alone or left with a baby sitter.

Often the mother had taken an aspirin and had forgotten to put the bottle back in a safe place. Several mothers had failed to appreciate their child's ability to climb up to the medicine cabinet or bureau drawer. In some cases, even when the mother discovered that the child had taken an unknown number of pills, she was not aware of the danger and had failed to call a doctor.

Of the 128 children, 127 had been given aspirin at one time or another, often for the slightest indisposition. Frequently the mother, in order to get the child to accept the tablet, had referred to it as candy rather than as medicine. Because of the pleasant flavors now used in most brands of children's aspirin the tots made heroic efforts to get at the bottle. Children who had been poi-

soned by aspirin, when offered the tablets at a later date showed no reluctance to accept them.

Thus it can be seen that accidental aspirin poisoning is not, strictly speaking, an accident, but rather the result of a slip-up of some kind. The child who is poisoned with aspirin may vomit, become dizzy, perspire profusely, become mentally confused, go into a coma and may even die.

Do not fall into the trap of thinking that aspirin is a harmless drug. Do not be fooled by the presence of the "safety cap" on the bottle. Do not leave aspirin tablets or any kind of tablets that contain aspirin as one of several ingredients where a child can get at them. If you believe that, in spite of all precautions, your child has taken an unknown number of tablets call your doctor at once.

New Light Installation Defended By Councilman

Some persons have expressed criticism over the installation of eight traffic lights at the intersection of Pine and Eleventh streets.

There are two traffic lights for each lane of traffic.

Councilman Walter Fleet, contacted on this matter, agreed that it seemed to be a wasteful practice, but, he said, "The State Highway Commission now requires installations in this manner."

He also explained that the city council has little to say about the matter. "The highway commission designed the lights, and even let the contracts," Fleet explained.

However, he did add that the cost of the present type lights was considerably less than the other type. "I don't know why," Fleet said, "but these lights cost about \$5,000 while the other type installation runs about \$7,000."

The lights were installed at this intersection after it developed that traffic at the Main and Eleventh signals was backing up past Pine Street at certain times of the day, and traffic congestion dictated the move.

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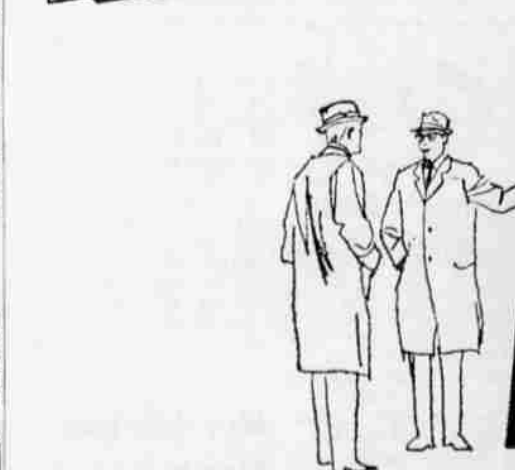
