KPCA Man Changes Job

Kermit B. Peterson, assistant secretary of the Klamath Production Credit Association, will become credit and operations analyst at the Spokane headquarters of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank effective immediately.

Peterson has been with KPCA here for the past four years, having come here in October, 1958, from The Dalles. Prior to that he was with the Mid Columbia PCA for 11 years.

His family will remain here until their residence at 4255 Laverne is disposed of, and then will join him in Spokane.

Mrs. Lindley Dies Feb. 3 At Age 91

Mrs. Katherine (Katie) Ulrich Lindley, 91, prominent Klamath Falls matron for many years, died Sunday, Feb. 3, at Klamath Valley Hospital. She had been in failing health for the last five months but until then had been active in family affairs. She drove her own car until her last illness.

She was the widow of the late George R. Lindley, who was engaged in the banking business in Medford and Klamath Falls for 40 years. Mr. Lindley died Sept. 4, 1946, at the family home on Lindley Heights.

She was born in Godfrey, Ill., Nov. 13, 1871, the daughter of John A. Ulrich and Johanna Rabel Von Hapsburg-Fronsborg Ulrich. She was married to George Rob-

ert Lindley June 1, 1893, in Godfrey, Ill., and the couple came west on their honeymoon to make a home in Medford.

They moved to Klamath Falls with their family in 1923 where Mr. Lindley was associated with the American National Bank, and later with the Oregon Bank and Trust Co.

Mrs. Lindley, affectionately known by her many friends as "Mama Katie" was active for many years in club, civic and church work in this city. She was president of the Women's Library Club from 1927-1929; was a member of the board of directors of the American Red Cross Klamath Falls Chapter, member of the Klamath Falls Garden Club, the First Methodist Church and Order of the Eastern Star.

Following the death of her husband, she made her home with her daughters, living with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George H. Myers, 711 Pacific Terrace at the time of her last illness.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. May Myers, Mrs. Josephine Matt, Klamath Falls, Mrs. Katherine Robertson and Mrs. Gertrude Cleve, Scottsdale, Ariz.; a granddaughter, Billie Lindley Cleve of Scottsdale, Ariz.; great-granddaughter, Katherine Lindley Myers and great-grandson, James Richard Myers of Tulelake, Calif.

Funeral services will be at 11 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 6, at O'Hair's Memorial Chapel. Grave-side services and interment will be in the Oddfellows Cemetery in Medford later in the day.

Plane Crash Victim Dies

HILL AFB, Utah (UPI) — A C-119 twin-engine aircraft transport plane crashed shortly after takeoff this morning, killing one of 20 persons aboard.

Maj. Gen. Don Coupland, commander of the Ogden Air Materiel Area, was among the 19 injured. The craft pancaked to earth about four miles southeast of the main Hill Air Force Base runway.

Shortly after takeoff from Hill about 7 a.m. for Norton AFB, Calif., the pilot declared an emergency and apparently feathered one propeller. It was believed he was attempting to return to the field when he saw the plane could not make it, switched off all power and pancaked into a small gulch.

Propellers ticked the edge of the forest camp road and the craft pancaked into a clump of thick brush. Debris was scattered more than 100 yards before the plane came to rest on the left side of its fuselage.

Woman's Body Found In Woods

DALLAS, Ore. (UPI) — The body of Mrs. Mary Black, 28, Dallas, who disappeared Thursday afternoon, was found in a wooded area about five miles southeast of here Sunday.

Polk County Sheriff Virgil Taylor said there was no evidence of foul play. He said the woman apparently died Thursday night from exposure.

Klamath Falls police received a report that the two-foot square window at the United Fund Office was broken between 3:15 and 4:50 a.m. Saturday.

The hole was made either by a small pellet or BB fired from the sidewalk. Shivers of the window were found inside, but there were no pieces on the sidewalk.

Fossilized Camel Bone Displayed At Museum

An Indian artifact and a bone of a camel which roamed Klamath County during the Pliocene age (about 12 million years ago) were two of 11 exhibits loaned or donated to the county museum during January. Curator Mrs. Lloyd Seely said Monday.

One of five items loaned to the museum was a sea shell of the miocene period which had been used as a hide-scraping tool by Indians.
