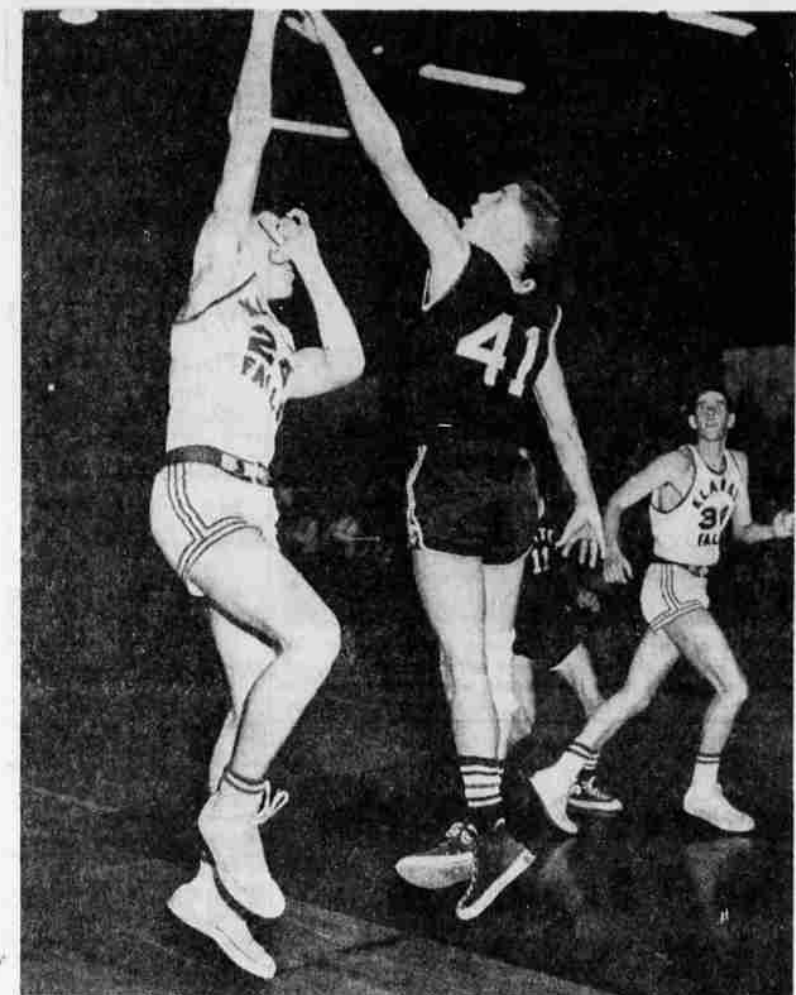
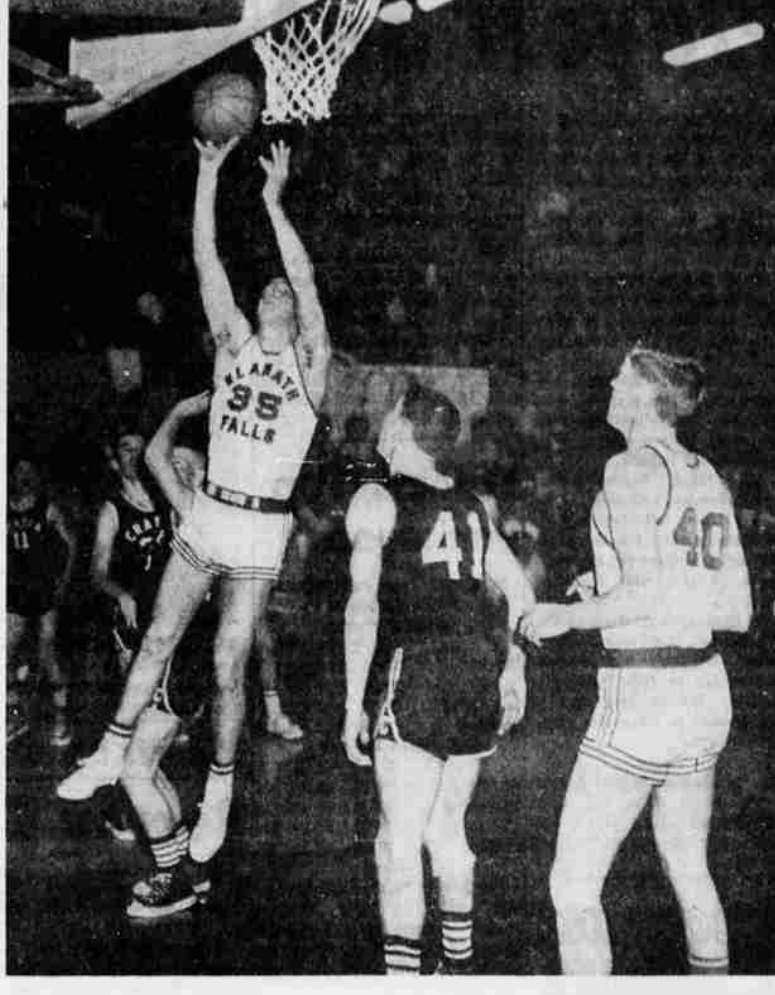

Tom Miles, who was the only Pelican to win a match last Wednesday against the Japanese National All-Stars, pinned John Kraus in the 136-pound event in 3:07. Ron Hitchcock pinned Bob Berry in a quick 2:51 in the 157-pound scrap. The last two pins came in the 191 and 275-pound divisions. Bob Ewing pinned Leo Huff in 3:10 and Kent Puckett pinned Tony Vassallo in 4:46.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — Oregon's Ducks found out how tough California was Saturday night.

The powerful Golden Bears — rated among the best on the Pacific Coast — rebounded from a 60-55 upset loss to Oregon Friday night to post a 79-58 basketball victory over the Ducks.

It was their 11th win in 16 starts. The loss left the visitors with a 6-9 record.

California, rolling up a 32-29 halftime lead, used 16 players. Dick Smith scored 22 points to pace the Golden Bears. Don Lauer added 18 for the winners.

Tension starts to build a little more this week for seventh-ranked Stanford in the Big Six basketball race while the University of San Francisco, St. Mary's and Pepperdine all get a chance to make their move in the West Coast Athletic Conference.

Stanford, its lead over UCLA cut to a half-game after Friday's defeat by Washington, faces the Bruins on Saturday night after meeting Southern California on Friday.

USF, 3-0 and St. Mary's 2-0 each have weekend games against Pepperdine and Loyola who are on a two-team invasion of the Bay Area. Santa Clara, which paces the WCAC with a 4-0 mark does not play any league games but has an outside contest Saturday against Southern California.

Oregon State and Seattle, regarded as the best independents in the Northwest, seem to have easy weekends in view. The Beavers play feeble Portland twice while Seattle faces Montana State and the University of the Pacific. Idaho (12-1) faces Oregon in two games Friday and Saturday.

A roundup on Saturday's principal action:

UCLA, the pre-season choice to keep its conference title, made it two straight over Southern California by drubbing the Trojans, 86-72. Once again it was wonderful Walt Hazzard who paced the Bruins, matching the 27-point explosion he had triggered on Friday. USC guard Gary Holman held Hazzard scoreless for the first 13 minutes of play when the Bruin guard broke loose.

That was the only Big Six game of the night but California looked sharp in downing Oregon, 79-58, after a diving, full court press put the Beavers off to an 8-0 lead. Dick Smith scored 22 points for Cal which avenged Friday's loss to the Ducks.

Stanford, a last second loser to Washington on Friday, postponed its game at Washington State because of icy roads.

Conley, a doubtful starter because of his finger trouble, proved a pleasant surprise Sunday by scoring 11 points as the New York Knicks also pulled a surprise by licking the Los Angeles Lakers, 122-95.

Along with Conley, newly acquired Bob Nordmann also scored 11 points and grabbed 10 rebounds to help the Knicks upset the National Basketball Association's Western Division leaders, Turn Gola led the winners with 23 points as well as holding Elgin Baylor to 21.

Terry Dischinger, making his bid for rookie of the year honors, pumped in 23 points to lead the Chicago Zephyrs to a 110-108 triumph over the San Francisco Warriors. Dischinger scored five of his points in the last two minutes to clinch the Zephyrs' win. Will Chamberlain was high man for the Warriors with 34 points.

A 24-point performance by Sam Jones, who scored 11 of them in the final quarter, paced the Boston Celtics to a 127-123 win over the Detroit Pistons.

ST PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI) — The American League oldtimers, playing under the newest rule in the books, beat the National League 5-0 Saturday in the eighth annual March of Dimes baseball contest.

The oldtimers, sprinkled with a few present players, staged the first baseball game to use the new expanded strike zone.

A crowd of 3,500 fans watched the two teams battle for seven innings under a cloudless sky.

Ref Blows Whistle On Hero's Acclaim

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Disappointment filled Dave Roman's soft voice as he explained how a hero's ride wound up a nightmare Saturday night.

Roman was hoisted high on the shoulders of hundreds of Pitt students seconds after he had thrown in a 40-foot jump shot which appeared to have given the Panthers an uphill 69-68 win over West Virginia.

Clyde Hadley, a reserve guard, came up with a hot hand from outside to give San Diego State its win over Pepperdine, Bob Warlick had 12 points in a lost cause. Ollie Johnson paced USF's win with 14 points and 20 rebounds.

A 37-point spurge by Gus Johnson not only set a new gymnasium record at Moscow but helped Idaho brush past Idaho State, 90-37. The Vandals were rebounding from Friday's 66-37 upset at the hands of Washington State.

It took 10 minutes to settle the dispute and clear the shocked crowd of 5,222 from the floor.

One Second Remains
One second remained on the clock and the Panthers (12-4) had a slim chance but Jinks' desperation shot failed and West Virginia (14-3) had a 68-67 win in one of the most dramatic games played here in years.

It was a heartbreaking loss for the Panthers and their fans but it was especially bitter for Roman who brought the Panthers back into the game after they had been behind by 16 points early in the second half.

The 5-9 junior guard from Johnston scored 20 points, with 18 coming in the second half whenever Pitt seemed to need a key play.

Thanks to Roman, Pitt forged ahead with 2:32 left when Paul Krieger made a layup. Roman's foul tied it 66-66 seconds later.

With 44 seconds remaining, Krieger's foul put Pitt ahead 67-66. Tom Lowry hit a push shot which turned out to be the winning basket for the Mountaineers and West Virginia was leading 68-67 with five seconds left.

Call Time Out
The Panthers immediately called time out to set up their strategy.

When play resumed, Roman got the ball and fired from 40 feet. It went through cleanly but the timeout had been called, nullifying the basket.

Pitt Coach Bob Timmons explained after the game that "we were going to call it because we had to get one shot." He said the officials definitely made the correct call.

The real loss, however, turned out to be Roman, a quiet boy who earned a hero's crown from the fans despite the loss.

"I wish I wouldn't have taken the shot," he said Sunday. "It was a great thrill when they put me on their shoulders and now it's such a disappointment."

"I figured I'd better shoot because if something happened and we didn't call time out we'd just be left holding the ball. I didn't hear the referee's whistle at all. There was too much noise."

With that, Roman excused himself to get some rest.

"I didn't sleep too well last night," he said sadly.

Track Stars Turn Tourist

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Soviet track and field ace Valeriy Brumel, Igor Ter-Ovanesyan and Valeriy Bulishev arrived Sunday with their coach and made plans to see Disneyland, Hollywood and "the usual things" before taking on more competition Saturday.

The trio, fresh from victories in New York Friday night, will compete in the Los Angeles Times indoor games.

They arrived with heavy coats slung over their arms on a day which was the hottest Feb. 3 ever recorded at International Airport — 91 degrees. It was their first trip to Los Angeles.

After a brief rest in their Sheraton-West rooms they went through some exercises.

Soviet Olympic coach Gabriel Korobkov, asked what sights they planned to take in, replied, "Disneyland, Hollywood, the other things you have here."

Ter-Ovanesyan's last performance was the best indoor broad jump ever — 26 ft. 10 in. Brumel high-jumped 7-foot-2 in New York and Bulishev won the 800-yard-run in 1:30.8.
