

'Happy' Addition Makes NYU Tough

A "happy" addition has been made to the New York University basketball team, and as a result the once-powerful Violets—an admittedly far from national honors this season.

Optimism was a mild word for the confident feeling at NYU at the start of the campaign. But school officials then inflicted greater damage on the team than any opponent could have done by declaring four members of the starting squad ineligible because of scholastic reasons.

The most serious loss was that of Harold "Happy" Hairston, the highest-scoring sophomore in the school's history who was expected to team with Barry Kramer to provide the Violets with one of the most potent one-two scoring punches in collegiate ranks.

But Happy was back in the lineup Thursday night as anyone in Madison Square Garden could testify, and the 6-7 junior scored 34 points to lead NYU to a 108-82 rout over Furman. Kramer, another junior who is second in the nation in scoring, added 32 points.

In other major contests, Notre Dame downed Boston College, 74-66; North Carolina beat Maryland, 82-60; Providence defeated De Paul, 77-59; and North Texas State upset Tulsa, 65-60.

The resurgent Violets were never in trouble as they raced to a 57-35 halftime lead and eventually matched the second-highest scoring total in school history. Furman's best weapon was Jerry Smith, who tossed in 21 points.

Despite the early-season shake-

Stanford Remains Team To Defeat Johnson Wins Contest To Gain Corvallis Trip

There is only one game separating first place Stanford and fourth place California as the Big Six basketball conference tries to untangle itself this weekend.

The Cards are 3-1 and the Bears 2-2. Sandwiched in between are UCLA and Washington, both 4-3. Stanford, still the team to beat, hosts Southern California (1-5) and the Bruins in a key weekend test that could decide whether the Indians are to win their first conference title in 21 years.

Meanwhile, California journeys north to take on Washington twice.

The north-south motif is also carried forward in the West Coast Athletic Conference, but the northern teams hold most of the trump cards in this loop.

Tonight, Pepperdine (6-3) is at San Jose (2-2) while Loyola (1-4) plays USP (3-0). Saturday's round of musical chairs sends Pepperdine to USP and Loyola to St. Mary's (3-0).

Santa Clara, leading the loop with a 4-0 mark, hosts USC in an interesting non-conference test Saturday. The Bruins, who seem to be jelling into quite a power, lost their season's opener at USC in a close game.

Oregon State, king of the non-affiliated clubs, plays two at Portland, while the two pretenders to the Beavers' crown, Idaho and Seattle, host Oregon and Montana State respectively tonight.

Seattle Thursday named freshman coach Clair Markey to take the varsity squad through the rest of the season in place of Vince Cazzetta.

Cazzetta, who piled up a 90-37 record at Seattle, quit effective the end of the year but was ousted on the spot by school officials.

Another conference lead is at stake when San Francisco State (4-0) goes north to face Humboldt (2-3) tonight and Chico State (4-1) Saturday in Far West Conference clashes.

In Thursday night's only contest, Montana State defeated Gonzaga 70-63 at Bozeman. Jim Dixon led 16 for the losers and Kermit Young 15 for the victors.

Kingsley Has Benefit Machen Gets New Manager

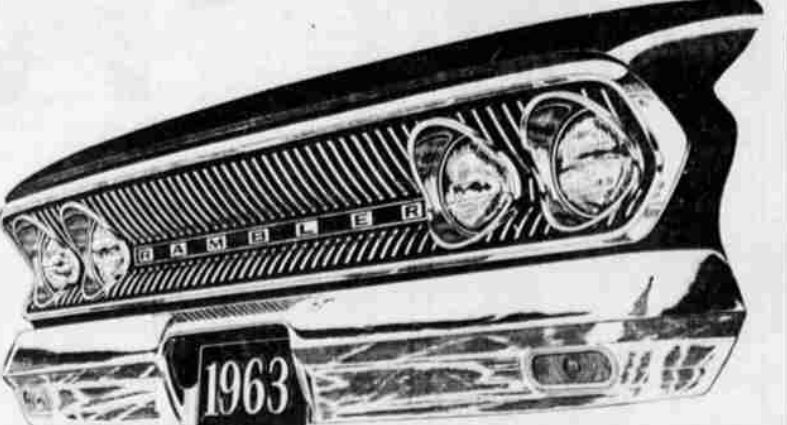

Seattle Names Markey After Firing Cazzetta

SEATTLE (UPI)—Clair Markey, a former 3-8 guard, takes over the tall job tonight of interim head coach of a Seattle University basketball team dedicated to "Win for Vin."

Markey, 26, former frosh coach, took over Thursday for Vince Cazzetta, popular head coach who resigned over differences in policy with Eddie O'Brien, athletic director.

Markey, a whirlwind defensive player during his four years at Seattle University, makes his coaching bow tonight against Montana State University here.

Seattle is shooting for a tournament bid on the strength of a 14-4 record but Markey steps into a pressure-packed situation since the Chiefs found the going tough in downing MSU earlier in the season.

"I took the job because of Cazzetta, the players and the school," Markey said. "I will call on Cazzetta for advice during these last eight games or more if we get into a tournament."

Cazzetta told Markey to "take it and set the same goal we've been striving for."

Cazzetta, who in his 4 1/2 years as head coach of the Chiefs ran up a 90-37 won-lost mark, was asked by the student body to speak in the student union building Thursday.

"I wouldn't trade my seven years here for a million dollars," Cazzetta said. "I appreciate all that you have done in the past... all the little things... the smiles and the hellos."

Markey played freshman ball at Seattle U. under Bill Fenton and saw varsity service under Al Brightman, John Castellani and Cazzetta.

Texans Talking Of Move

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—Lamar Hunt, millionaire owner of the Dallas Texans, discussed with city officials today the possibility of moving his American Football League champions to Kansas City.

Hunt, whose team has failed to draw profitable attendance in its three years at Dallas, said he would make definite comment on his plans tonight.

"Nothing will be decided until we are satisfied that a move would be good from a business standpoint," said Jack Steadman, general manager of the Texans who accompanied Hunt here.

The Texans and the National Football League's Dallas Cowboys have been rivals for attendance during their identical three-year careers in the professional football ranks. Neither team has been a financial success at the gate.

There have been reports in Dallas that Hunt and Clint Murchison Jr., principal owner of the Cowboys, have decided between themselves that "one of the clubs must move elsewhere."

If the Texans were transferred here, they would play in the Municipal Stadium—home of the Kansas City Athletics baseball team. The stadium is owned by the city and leased to the American League club.

The Texans, who finished second in the American Football League's Western Division during the first two years of the league's operation, won the league title last season by defeating the two-time champion Houston Oilers, 20-17.
