Maury Wills Signs Pact With Bums

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Each base that Maury Wills stole on his way in an all-time major league record and the National League Most Valuable Player award last season will be worth more than \$400 to the fleet shortstop in 1963.

Wills, who established a major league mark of 104 thefts in 1962 while leading the league in steals for the third straight year, signed a \$48,000 contract Friday.

It was a huge of some \$15,000 over his 1962 contract, and enabled him to equal Don Drysdale's salary as the highest paid player on the current Dodger club.

Dodgers vice president and general manager E. J. (Buzz) Bavasi met with Wills as soon as the little infielder returned from a trip to the Midwest. And in a few minutes Wills had signed his 1963 pact.
