Young Keglers Win 195 Trophies

Junior editions of bowlers took over the lanes at Lucky Lanes Saturday and Sunday for the first annual Oregon State Junior Bowling Association Regional Tournament.

When the firing was completed, 845 youngsters had taken their shots at the pins and compiled some effective scores.

Top team honors were scattered with the Holiday Bantams from Klamath Falls winning the Bantam Boys event while the Lucky Lanes club won the Senior Boys event.

A Tulelake team, "Strike Outs," captured the Bantam Girls event while Hart's Jewelers of Grants Pass won the Junior Girls and Andy's Play Girls of Medford took the Senior Girls crown. Striking Honkers of Lakeview captured the Junior Boys event.

Medford entries swept the Bantam doubles field with Christine Bryan and Cheryl Christianson winning the girls doubles while Eddie Davis and Shannon Vinson teamed to capture the boys.

Grants Pass' entry of Lela Klein and Kathy Priddle won the junior girls doubles and the Klamath Falls entry of Jim Gibson and Denny Nelson captured the junior boys bracket.

Local entries swept the senior division with Reda Jack and Cheryl Jack winning the senior girls and Mike Crawley and Gary Shearer pulled down top honors in the senior boys.

In the singles events, Karen Stern, Klamath Falls, won the bantam girls, the bantam boys, A. Grants Pass girl, Judy Duke, won the junior girls event, and Dennis Bonner, Lakeview, the junior boys.

In the senior bracket, Loretta Whipple and Regina Holland, both of Medford, tied for top honors, each with a 568, while Duane Singleton rolled a 633 for top senior boys honors.

A total of 195 trophies were awarded in what was termed a "most successful tournament."

Outstanding State Star Banquet Set

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon's outstanding athlete of 1962 will be selected tonight, but the logical choice, Oregon State's Terry Baker, is not in the running.

Baker won the Bill Hayward Trophy, emblematic of the honor, in 1961. The rules say a winner is ineligible to repeat.

Selection will be made at the 15th annual Hayward Banquet of Champions at the University of Portland. The event is sponsored by the Oregon Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association.

Army football coach Paul Dietzel will be the principal speaker. Other highlights include presentation of the Oregon Man of the Year in Sports Award, the Rollie Trout Amateur Baseball Award, the George Bertz Memorial Golf Award and several merit awards.

Baker will not go away empty-handed. The Beaver quarterback is scheduled to receive the Voit Award as the outstanding senior football player on the West Coast last season.

Beavers, Ducks Collide For First Weekend Pair

 Oregon State's Beavers and the Oregon Ducks looked ahead today to their first basketball meetings of the season following a disappointing weekend.

The Beavers — who own a 13-5 record — and the Ducks — who sport a 7-11 mark — meet at Corvallis next Friday night and tangle at Eugene next Saturday night.

Sophomore Frank Peters and 7-foot Mel Counts teamed to lead Oregon State to a 66-51 revenge basketball win over Portland (ore 7,717 persons at Corvallis Saturday night. The Beavers dropped a 67-58 decision to the underdog Pilots Friday night.

Peters, a fiery 6-2 forward, scored 20 points and Counts, a junior center, tallied 17. Each collected nine rebounds. Terry Baker, the Beavers' playmaking guard, missed the two games with a toe infection.

Big Gus Johnson scored 28 points and pulled down 31 rebounds to lead Idaho to an 80-70 victory over Oregon before 3,800 persons at Moscow Saturday night. The Vandals trimmed the Ducks 79-61 Friday night.

Idaho's Chuck White and Oregon's Jim Johnson each collected 25 points. Steve Jones and Elliott Gleason scored 16 apiece for the Ducks, who suffered their fourth loss of the season to the Vandals.

Ashland Belts Hapless Pelicans; Crater Takes Over League Lead

ASHLAND (Special) — The Klamath Union Pelicans had probably their worst game of the season Saturday night and fell victim to the improving Ashland Grizzlies, 50-41, in a 11 e second loss in as many nights.

The loss, coupled with the last minute win Friday night by Crater over the Pels, dropped the defending champions into second spot in the league with a 6-4 record. Crater is back on top with a 6-3 mark. Grants Pass, defending state champion, is third with a 5-4 record and last crushing Medford is now 5-5 in fourth. Ashland holds down the cellar for the Southern Oregon League with a 2-8 record.

This was the second win for the Grizzlies in conference play this season and the second league win in the past four years and 60 games.

"We played our poorest game of the season. We had a real bad one against Bend but this one was as bad and we lost this one," a dejected Al Keck said. "We didn't have anyone who could hit. It was just one of those nights when no one could hit and it seemed to be catching. I tried some players to try to get a fire started but nothing helped." The mentor explained.

"They outlasted us I think and especially on the boards. I think we've lost every game when we've been out rebounded. We didn't have our good hustle and drive. We could have beaten them with a half decent game," he related.

"We hit only 31 of 41 shots during the night," he said. (That figures up to a terrible 28.8 per cent.) That's the worst we've shot all season by a lot. I don't think Ashland shot much better either. We were really hurt at the foul line, too," he explained.

"We hit only 19 of 37 from there and could have won the game from the line if we had hit decently from there," he voiced.

 Bouncing back from Friday's loss to Southern California, Stanford defeated UCLA and Walt Hazard, 86-78. Hazard scored 27 points for the third straight time but this couldn't offset the sharp-shooting Indians who hit at a 55 per cent rate from the floor in the first half. Tom Dose had 23 points for the winners while coach Johnny Wooden of the Bruins drew a pair of technical fouls.

Far Western Conference

San Francisco State's undefeated Gators can their mark to 6-0 in the Far Western Conference with a 83-59 win over Chico State. Mike Carson led the winners to 28 points. In another league tilt, Humboldt State College downed Alameda State 60-44, after an 11-point spurge decimated the losers' well-planned defenses.

SETS WORLD MARKS

SYDNEY (UPI) — Satoko Tanaka, a 24-year-old Japanese swimmer, set two world records Sunday in a swimming meet at the Sydney Olympic pool. Miss Tanaka won the 220-yard backstroke in 2:29.6 for one record and then beat her own record of 2:31.6 for the 200 meters.

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
