College Entrance Qualifications Explained To Junior 4-H Leaders

ALTURAS—Forty young junior leaders of the 4-H clubs of Modoc County met at the Niles Hotel Tuesday afternoon to hear Dr. Sumner Morris, manager of the counseling services, University of California at Davis, speak to them on qualifications for college entrance.

Dr. Morris told the young people of programs offered in junior colleges, state colleges, and universities, qualifications for entrance, and expense involved per year for schooling.

He stressed that any child with the "interest and motivation" can go to college now. He pointed out that a high school diploma, regardless of grades, will enable a student to enter a junior college. "Though high school grades may be low," he said, "a student can go to a junior college and build up his scholastic record until he is eligible for a university."

He told that the university admits only the upper 12 1/2 per cent scholastically from high school graduating classes and is aimed primarily at professional training with four years or more of study. The student, to enter the university, must have a college preparatory course with a B average in the college preparatory subjects . . . namely one year of history, three years of English, two years of math, one year of lab science, two years of foreign language, and one extra year of either math, language, or science course.

Two years of junior college of 56 units with a B average will also make a student eligible for the university, or a high school B average with two years of the junior college with a C average.

Kennedy's Cuban Action Praised, Supported By Vinson

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman Carl Vinson of the House Armed Services Committee Saturday renewed support to President Kennedy's handling of the Cuban crisis.

"I am confident that the administration is taking all necessary steps to bring about the removal of Soviet troops in Cuba," said the veteran Georgia Democrat who has received regular reports on Cuban developments.

Vinson spoke out in the wake of an outpouring of Republican attacks on Kennedy's handling of the Cuban problem but of foreign affairs generally.

Climaxing a week of such attacks by Republicans in Lincoln Day speeches over the country, the House Republican Campaign Committee said Friday that it feared the United States "may be heading toward unilateral disarmament."

The committee, in its weekly newsletter, cited the recent withdrawal of 15,000 men from the 400,000-man U.S. military force in Europe as well as what it called "fears and suspicions" that Kennedy may have made concessions not yet disclosed as the price for last fall's Russian missile backdown in Cuba.

Vinson previously had praised Kennedy's handling of the October crisis, in which Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev removed missiles and bombers which Kennedy had pronounced a threat to peace.

Lately, renewed controversy has centered on continued presence in Cuba of Russian troops, whose number has been in dispute. The Pentagon estimates the total at 17,000, down about 5,000 from an earlier peak. Sen. Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., has put the figure at 30,000 to 40,000.

Whatever the number, Republicans generally have voiced dissatisfaction at lack of action by this country to get them removed.

One-Sentence Estimate
Vinson offered his one-sentence estimate of the situation in response to a reporter's inquiry about the continuing flood of complaints, not only from Republicans but from some Democrats. He declined further comment.

Sources close to Vinson pictured him, however, as concerned by the attacks, satisfied with official Defense Department estimates on the extent of the Communist military threat in Cuba, and willing to leave the next step to the President. Vinson is said to believe that if the matter is properly handled the eventual downfall of communism in Cuba can be engineered without U. S. military action.

Vinson's views were believed to be somewhat at variance with those of his Senate counterpart, Sen. Richard B. Russell, also a Georgia Democrat. Russell has said the administration erred last October in not mounting a military invasion of Cuba.
