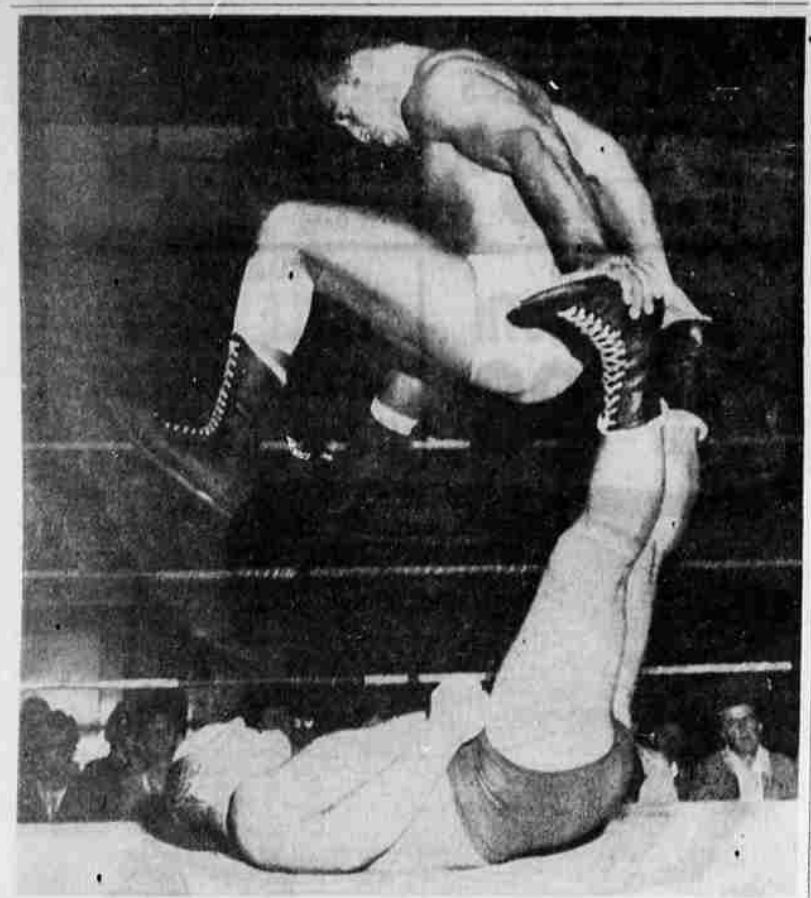

Whitewolf Defeats Savage In Wrestling Main Event

Billy Whitewolf, the Oklahoman Indian, made his 1963 professional wrestling debut here a winning one Wednesday night when he applied his famous Indian Death Lock on Wild Bill Savage to win the main event at Klamath Auditorium.

Whitewolf, who was popular when here last year, retained his popularity against "bad boy" Savage and showed that he is stronger and faster than last year. He has just returned from a Hawaii engagement.

Haru Sasaki pulled a surprise upset win over Nick Kozak in the semifinal and Buck Davidson and Cowboy Bob Boyer fought to a 20-minute draw in the first scrap of the card.

Savage won the first fall in seven minutes with a series of choke holds and finally applied a Boston Crab hold for the submission and the first fall win. Whitewolf came back to make short work of Savage in the second fall when he applied a few neatly placed judo chops to the neck and then nailed Savage with a reverse body press and a spread eagle.

Then came the final fall and Whitewolf, after getting into an earlier bad position when Savage applied the crab again, reversed the crab into the Indian Death Lock and Savage submitted. Davidson, refereeing, had to untangle their legs.

Sasaki, subbing for Kurt von Poppenheim, got Kozak in the first with a version of the flying mare for a pin in 12 minutes. Kozak rallied in the second with a reverse body stretch and pin. He had just taken a series of judo chops to the throat when he reversed the play for the win.

He had Sasaki going in the third with a series of throws into the turn buckles when Sasaki stuck his knee up and into Kozak's stomach and then pinned him.

Davidson and Boyer fought for 20 minutes with Davidson having the upper hand over the young Texan most of the way. But Buck couldn't apply the pin. It went as a draw.

Giants Will Have Highest Payroll

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — The penalty for success is going to cost the San Francisco Giants a gold-digger's fortune this year.

There is talk in the spring training camps that before every body is signed, the National League champions will have the highest payroll in the history of baseball—with the possible exception of the New York Yankees.

The infield is going to cost the Giants about \$100,000; the outfield better than \$200,000; the "big four" pitching staff will go over \$100,000. And the catching about \$50,000.

That adds up to \$450,000 without all the reserves, relief pitchers, pinch-hitters, etc., who will bring the total well past the \$600,000 mark. This is exclusive of manager Alvin Dark, who also is in the high income bracket.

Four Holdouts
Still not signed are Jack Sanford, Mutt Alou, Juan Marichal, and Orlando Cepeda.

Willie Mays is to receive \$100,000 for the 1963 campaign. Sanford, after his 24-7 record, looks like a holdout for the second straight year. This time he reportedly is asking \$30,000. Juan Marichal (18-11) wants at least \$20,000. And it is believed Mutt Alou wants at least \$15,000, although he rode the bench most of the campaign.

The infield will cost something like this: First baseman Orlando Cepeda, \$45,000; second baseman Chuck Hiller, \$15,000; third baseman Jim Davenport, \$20,000; shortstop Jose Pagan, \$18,000.

In the outfield with Mays at \$100,000 will be Felipe Alou, \$22,000; Willie McCovey, \$18,000; to share duties with Harvey Kuenn, who, as a two-time American League batting champion, commands around \$35,000.

Young Tom Haller, the catcher, probably will get around \$12,000 to \$15,000.

Players' Dividend
The "big four" pitching staff, composed of Sanford, Marichal, Billy Pierce and Billy O'Dell, won 77 games among them—the most wins captured by any four-man crew in baseball in 1962. In addition to the Sanford and Marichal demands, both Pierce and O'Dell are in the \$23,000 to \$30,000 bracket.

The two men obtained from the Baltimore Orioles, Billy Hoelt (\$18,000) and young Jack Fisher (about \$12,000) add to the financial burden.

Of course the Giants can afford it. They hit the jackpot in the playoffs and World Series and declared a big dividend for the stockholders.

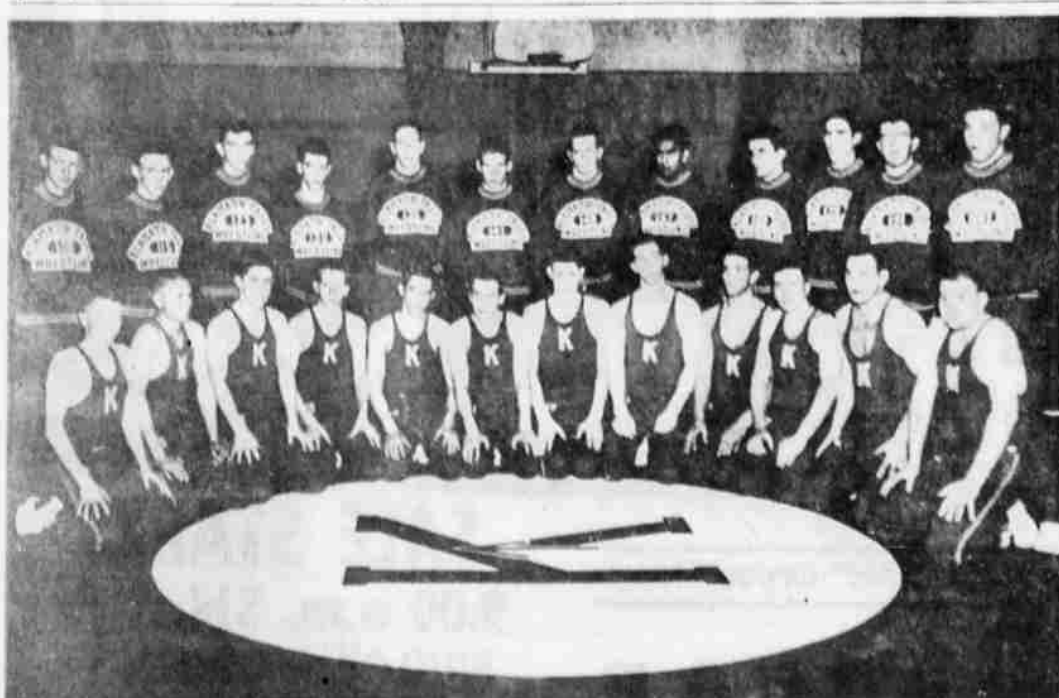

Wittenberg Tops Small College Cage Poll Again

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wittenberg, having wound up the regular season with an 18-1 record, led the United Press International small college basketball ratings again today and now must beat some backyard rivals to prove its claim to the national championship.

With two weeks remaining before the final ballot of the season, Wittenberg was comfortably on top for the sixth straight week. Evansville moved up one notch to third, and Fresno State made its way back to the top 10.

Wittenberg defeated Otterbein and Mount Union, two Ohio Conference rivals, last week to close out the regular campaign with a string of 13 straight victories.

Tonight coach Eldon Miller's Tigers meet Otterbein again in the start of the Ohio Conference's 16-team post-season tournament. This tournament is played in two sections, with the first two teams in each group qualifying for the finals at Columbus, Ohio, March 1 and 2.

Wittenberg's toughest threat in this tournament appears to be Akron, which moved up one place in the UPI ratings this week to the No. 6 spot.

Twenty-six members of the 35-man UPI small college rating board made Wittenberg their first place choice. Grambling, with a 21-2 record through last weekend, clung to the runner-up spot, although it did not receive a single first-place vote.

Evansville, with an 18-3 record, was the top choice of three coaches, moving up one place to No. 3 as Southeast Missouri fell back to No. 4. Tennessee State held

The Panthers will be heavy favorites to down the Bobcats of Bly. Bonanza is the pick over Main's Mustangs and Merrill is favored to chop down the Grizzlies of Gilchrist.

Main and Bly are fighting to stay out of the cellar, but it looks as if they may end up having a playoff to see which team goes to the tourney. The cellar team of the league is dropped from the league tournament because two other schools are put into the tournament, Paisley and Butte Falls. Both will be underdogs in their final two games.

Eagles, Cougars In Crucial Game

The Rogue League champions, Henley's Hornets, close out the season Friday night by going to Medford to battle the dangerous St. Mary's Crusaders while Lakeview, all hopes shattered for a second place finish, takes on Sacred Heart at Lakeview.

But the big game in the league which will be watched with much interest will be the Eagle Point-Illinois Valley clash at Illinois Valley Friday night. Those two teams are battling for second place and a playoff spot in the tournament with the Hornets.

Eagle Point is second with a 9-3 record and Illinois Valley is third with a 7-4 record. A victory by Illinois would give the Cougars an 8-4 record with a game remaining in which to tie the Eagles and a playoff would be in order to decide the playoff spot. But the Eagles are "in" if they win the Friday battle.

Henley, the state's top ranked quintet in Class A-2, will not have an easy time remaining unbeaten

for the season. They face a St. Mary's team which has come on with a rush in the late stages of the season and they were the ones which killed Lakeview's hopes last weekend with a 73-69 win. The Crusaders are dangerous and the Hornets will have to play a top game to remain undefeated. They have a 13-0 league record and a 19-0 season mark.

The Hornets and the league continue to be led by Henley's big 6-7 Kent Gooding. Gooding places all scorers in the league with 281 points in 12 of the 13 games for a fine 23.4 average, although it dropped from a 25.0 average from last week. He played only a short time and hit only five points against Sacred Heart before coming back with 22 markers Saturday night against Lakeview.

Charles Pomeroy of Eagle Point is the second leading scorer with a 20.2 average on 243 points in 12 games also. The Eagle star has designs on catching Gooding in this department. Lakeview's Larry Samples moved back into third place with a pair of fine games last weekend. He has 224 points for an average of 17.2. Darryl Gellert, IV's brilliant guard, fell from third to fourth with 203 points and an 18.5 mean.

Then comes Henley's hustling Mike Beymer, just two points shy of the 200 mark. He has 198 for a 15.2 average and running mate Earl Allbritton, the other Henley forward, moved from ninth to seventh with 173 points and a 13.3 average. Lakeview players flank Allbritton. Dan Leahy is sixth with 194 and a 14.9 average and Dennis Warren is tied for eighth with 165 and a 12.7 mean.

Sacred Heart's only real threat, junior Pete Krok, is 11th with 152 points and a 13.6 average for 11 games. Lakeview's Fred Williams has been the big climber in the league the past two weeks and has moved from 24th position to 13th with 141 points and a 16.8 average. Henley's LeVoy Young holds down 22nd spot with 112 points and an 8.6 average.

Cougars Meeting Huskies

Washington, which takes a break from the Big Six basketball wars this weekend, takes on Washington State tonight in the only major contest.

Although the Cougars are tentatively in the Big Six, their games do not count in the standings. Washington is 6-4 in the conference but must play its last two on the road.

Wednesday night's only battle saw Whittier move into a half-game lead in the SCAC with a 74-57 defeat of Pomona. Steve Hayes hit 25 for the Poets, now 8-1. Occidental is 7-1.

Meanwhile, the lineup was announced Wednesday for the Far West regional NCAA tournament.

The first round will take place March 11 at Eugene, Ore. Utah State (19-5) will meet the Western Athletic Conference champion, probably Arizona State (20-2), independent powers Oregon State (14-6) and Seattle (17-4) will go to it in the second clash.

The two survivors move on to Provo, Utah. There the Big Six champion will face the winner of the first game.

The West Coast athletic conference title holder plays the winner of the Seattle-Oregon State clash in the nightcap.

The Big Six title is still wide open. Stanford (15-3) in the league and 14-6 for the year hosts UCLA (13-3 and 15-3) Friday. The Bruins are at California Saturday, Washington (16-4 and 9-1) stands by and hopes the Bruins win Friday and lose Saturday.

Willie Mays Gets \$100,000 Contract

Willie Mays has a \$100,000 contract today to prove that San Francisco Giant club owner Horace Stoneham made good on an eight-year-old promise.

"Stick with the Giants, Willie," Stoneham told Mays back in the winter of 1954, "and you'll earn as much as any baseball player in history."

Mays saw that promise become a reality Wednesday when he signed a 1963 contract for \$100,000 — "perhaps a little more" — and thereby joined Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams and Stan Musial as the only players in history who have earned a straight six-figure salary for one year.

Good Years Left
"Willie should have three or four more good years," said manager Alvin Dark, who held a press conference after the announcement of Mays' signing. "He's 31 now and a ball player really doesn't mature until he is around 28. Willie will play in every game if he can make it."

In his 12th season as a Giant last year, Mays batted .304, hit 49 homers and drove in 104 runs. He tied in September and collapsed on the bench during a game in Cincinnati on Sept. 12. But he made a major contribu-

tion in the closing days of the race when the Giants outlasted the collapsing Dodgers and won the National League pennant.

World Series pitching hero Ralph Terry also received his reward Wednesday when he signed with the New York Yankees for about \$55,000. Terry, called by Yankee pitching coach Johnny Sain "the best right-hander in the American League," had a 23-12 record last season and then won two games, including the decisive 1-0 seventh game, in the World Series.

Boats Good Record
Terry compiled a 16-3 record in 1961 and 20 stands 29-15 for the last two seasons. Yankee signers Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris are technically unsigned but General Manager Roy Hamey says both have agreed to terms verbally and will be in the Yankees' Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., training camp by next Wednesday.

Ray Herbert, a 20-game winner in 1962, and pitcher Gary Peters signed with the Chicago White Sox, leaving only Jim Landis, Floyd Robinson and Juan Pizarro unsatisfied.

Roger Craig, who had a 10-24 record last season, agreed to a "compromise" raise and signed with the New York Mets for an estimated \$27,500. Craig is understood to have brought a salary of about \$21,000 with him from the Dodgers and is much in demand in the trading marts.

The Owl basketball team, winners of the league title for the third time in succession, and the Owl wrestling team, which also had a very successful season, will be given awards for various honors.
