

Spring Date For Test Ban Talked By Kennedy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy says it should be apparent by springtime whether Russia is willing to agree to a nuclear test ban.

But the President told newsmen Thursday it would be an error to try to set a deadline for progress in the negotiations.

At his news conference Kennedy touched on a wide range of subjects, from the New York newspaper strike to the attack on a U.S. shrimp boat by Cuban fighter planes.

Kennedy said he "would hope that we would have progress by April 1st" toward a test ban treaty.

He said "by springtime we should know whether the Soviet Union is willing to make those arrangements" necessary for a test ban. But Kennedy added, "I wouldn't put down the date and say by this date we will know finally."

The issue is so critical, Kennedy said, that "we are going to keep at it if not by April 1st, beyond April 1st."

"I think people who attack the effort should keep in mind always that the alternative is the spread of these weapons to governments which may be irresponsible or which by accident may initiate a general nuclear conflagration."

Kennedy, at his news conference, said:

—He had ordered the Defense Department to move against any Cuban ship or plane attacking any American vessel or aircraft.

—The New York newspaper strike has "passed the point of public toleration." He sharply criticized union leader Bertram Powers and suggested both sides should submit their differences to "independent determination of some kind."

—The United States would not "accept with equanimity" the continued presence of Russian troops in Cuba.

—He thinks "we are going to get a tax cut" this year because "those who oppose it would have to take the responsibility for any deterioration in the economy" that might occur if the tax proposal was defeated.

—Congress should enact his medical care program this year to meet "our responsibilities as a free nation."

—He is opposed to the 35-hour week even if it is negotiated by collective bargaining.

—Most of the public opinion polls taken abroad of U.S. prestige can and will be released. But there are some which involve "personalities and policies of other countries" and their release might cause "diplomatic embarrassment."

Rusk's Position Secure Despite News Stories

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk appeared today to be quite secure in his job, despite continuing newspaper speculation that his position is not too strong.

White House sources said President Kennedy was very satisfied with Rusk's performance and had no intention of making any change. The President himself told a news conference only two weeks ago that he and Rusk were "in very close communion."

There has been some speculation that Rusk might be out of favor because he "oversold" the idea that the French President Charles de Gaulle would not carry his differences with Britain and the United States to the point that he has. But officials said Rusk's job still appeared secure.

Rusk has been criticized by some commentators for not injecting himself more forcibly into national security affairs. He has been considered by some as being too reticent in pushing himself to the front.

Cold Thins Mardi Gras

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Cold winds thinned down the Mardi Gras "funworshippers" along the streets and boulevards of New Orleans Thursday night but thousands upon thousands of people still turned out to greet Momus, the god of mirth.

Momus led his 15 floats along historic St. Charles Avenue, Canal and Royal Streets in 40-degree weather to the theme of "Momus Goes to the Movies."

Floated depicted scenes from "Gone With the Wind," "Lost Horizons," "The Ten Commandments," "The Wizard of Oz" and other milestones in motion picture entertainment.

A cold front moved in a few hours before the parade and speeded up the pace. The warmest people in the procession were the torch carriers, who cavorted with more than the usual vigor because a stiff wind was blowing flames into their faces.

The parade of Momus marked about the halfway point in carnival festivities, which begin this weekend to build faster and faster toward the madness of Mardi Gras.

Students Join Move On Theatre

BALTIMORE (UPI) — Several hundred student demonstrators just released from jail today planned to join others in integrating a previously all-white movie theater.

The management of the Northwood Theater gave in to demands for integration in a move to halt the nightly mass demonstrations at the theater.

The demonstrations had resulted in the arrest of more than 400 students from Morgan State College, an all-Negro institution, and other schools in the Baltimore area.

Mayer Philip Goodman announced in front of city hall Thursday that the theater management agreed to admit Negroes provided the demonstrations were halted immediately.

The students agreed and integration of the theater was to be effected this afternoon.

Earlier Thursday 10 members of the House of Delegates called on Gov. J. Millard Tawes to investigate the "excessive and punitive" bail set for the demonstrators arrested on charges of trespassing and disorderly conduct.

Bail was as high as \$600 for many of the students. Later, state's attorney William O'Donnell met with Criminal Court Judge Reuben Oppenheimer and the judge reduced the maximum bail to \$200.

'Pops' Concert Set At Pelican Court

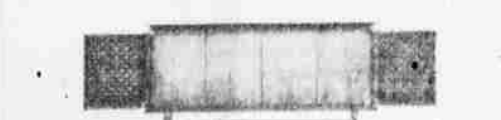
