Russians Warn U.S. Of War III

to burn up the aggressors in the first hour of attack."

He also charged that American submarines were menacing Soviet ships in the Caribbean.

Malinovsky added that the Soviet Union "will wipe out civil and military objects of the United States and annihilate countries which have U.S. weapons in the event of an attack on Russia."

"The defense minister claimed that Russia would reply with a salvo of three times as many rockets as those the United States might launch against the Soviet Union."

His audience of 6,000 Soviet dignitaries, marshals and government leaders listened attentively in the new Kremlin Palace of Congresses.

Premier Nikita Khrushchev, clad in the full dress uniform of his World War II rank of lieutenant general for the first time in more than a year and a half, paid strict and sober attention to the speech.

"Malinovsky repeated Soviet claims that it possessed a 'global rocket' that could pierce any enemy defenses and said ever-increasing numbers of these were being supplied to the Soviet armed forces."

"These rockets, he said, would 'irresistibly reach their targets and deliver their lethal cargo.'"

The defense minister claimed that Soviet might had been a constant factor in holding back alleged imperialist aggression, particularly in Cuba.

His main theme was to boast of Soviet might, including the claim of an intercontinental missile with a 100-megaton thermonuclear warhead "capable of fully destroying all military and industrial targets in an area of several thousand square kilometers."

Then he spoke of Cuba and the Caribbean.
Malinovsky recalled the Cuban crisis of last fall when, he said, "The threat of thermonuclear war had been warded off."

"But this should not make us complacent or dull our vigilance," he said, adding that "U.S. imperialist circles" certainly had not laid down their arms.

"More than that, they have embarked upon new provocations," he said. "They dispatch submarines against our peaceful merchantmen which cut all kinds of dangerous capers, cut across their course, which might prove extremely dangerous."

"These encroachments violate the basic standards of international law and the freedom of navigation on the high seas."

"These actions are fraught with grave consequences which nobody can foresee. The responsibility for this will rest with the United States, and it alone."

Blaisdell said when he questioned Hintz, Hintz told him he did not know whether to commend or fire him. A member of the guard for 15 years, Blaisdell said his silence was motivated in part by respect for orders and "a certain type of loyalty."

"Had I known he was crooked, my loyalty would have ceased," he said.
Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton told the committee of several statutes that might have bearing on the general situation. They included offenses ranging from misdemeanor to felony.

Thornton said Gov. Mark Hatfield so far has refused to give him the authority he needs to act on his own in the case.

Thornton also said it was difficult to make claim to bonding firms until a final liability figure to the federal government for misuse of federal funds is established. A fiscal officer estimated earlier the state liability might reach \$40,000.

The Appling report included these items:
—A requisition for one Tongue Point log at \$198, signed by Maj. W.H. Mosher for Lt. Col. William M. Adams. Appling said a copy of the document examined at Seattle "apparently had been altered to show 398 logs at a value of \$13,063 and bore the signature 'Anderson.'"

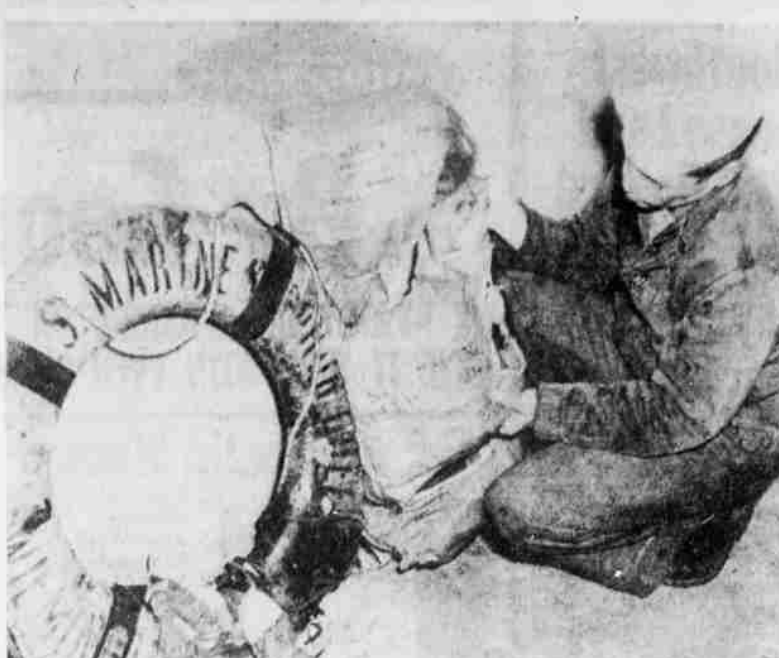
Appling said the logs were sold to the Lynwood Lumber Co. of Clackamas for \$2,712 and the proceeds purportedly put into the unauthorized fund.
—Appling said Anderson said he created the fund on instructions from Hintz, carried on property sales and expenditures on instructions from Hintz, and turned over \$4,000 in cash to Hintz.

—Appling said money totaling \$3,820 from 1957 to 1961 was drawn purportedly for Camp Riley summer camp food rations and used for other purposes. He said in 1961 a check for \$708 was issued on instructions from Blaisdell and cashed by Capt. Donald L. Schur who, after paying for some purchases, gave the balance to Heiser, who said he paid some bills and gave the rest to Hintz.

—A voucher was drawn to the Parker Construction Co. of Portland for extension of the known distance range at Wittycombe. Appling said, but the work actually performed was blacktopping in the camp.

—A "fictitious" lawn mower bid was obtained from Grover's Nite Service, Inc., Anton J. Halter, president, of Brooks. A warrant was issued to pay Halter for the mower. Halter said he cashed the warrant and gave the money to Anderson, who said he gave it to Hintz.

—Appling said "Halter permitted his name to be used in conjunction with the submission of a falsified claim for rations purportedly consumed during the 1961 rifle team matches."

Quota Urged On Canadian Log Import

WASHINGTON (UPI) — West

ern congressmen made a bipartisan appeal to President Kennedy Thursday to impose an emergency quota on lumber imports from Canada.

Both Democrats and Republicans joined in introducing resolutions calling for a quota of 6 percent of the average quarterly domestic consumption of softwood lumber during the past three years.

Rep. Harold T. Johnson, D-Calif., a leader in the move, told the house he wished the United States to "enjoy the best of relations with our neighbors to the north."

"However, I cannot bring myself to believe that it is necessary to sacrifice American fourth largest industry in terms of employment in order to do this," he said.

Rep. Walter Horan, R-Wash., complained that the Tariff Commission has found Canadian imports were not doing "serious injury to the domestic industry."

At the same time, however, he said, the industry was suffering from declining employment, the idling of facilities and falling profits.

"The problems confronting our lumber producers cannot be resolved through mere words of encouragement and patent promises by our executive agencies," Horan said.

Johnson also introduced bills which would require imported lumber to show the country of origin and require U.S. grading of imported lumber used in Federal Housing Administration construction.

He suggested instead that Feb. 14, Oregon Statehood Day, be established as a legal state holiday.

"It was estimated... that at least \$100,000 in productive time was lost each day of these holidays," Hatfield said.

He pointed out that public schools and the department of higher education do not suspend operations on these days.

"It simply does not make good business sense," Hatfield said.

"By no stretch of the imagination should it be a sop in lieu of salary."

SALEM (UPI) — Mayor Robert Veatch of Klamath Falls today was named by Gov. Mark Hatfield to the Board of Aeronautics.

Veatch, a C-47 pilot in World War II, replaced former Medford Mayor John W. Snider, who resigned.

Medicare Postponed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress

today postponed a quiet pigeon-hole President Kennedy's new medicare program which would boost Social Security taxes above \$200 a year for every worker earning \$100 a week or more.

The controversial plan will not be pulled out for many months. The House Ways & Means Committee may dust the legislation off for public hearings next summer. But the showdown vote probably will be put off until next year.

The program, outlined by Kennedy in a special message Thursday, would raise Social Security and railroad retirement taxes to finance hospitalization and nursing home benefits for 15 million persons 65 and older, starting Jan. 1, 1965.

The same benefits would be provided for 2.5 million other elderly persons not covered by Social Security and railroad retirement. Their coverage would be paid for by the U.S. Treasury.

Work Urged On Holidays

SALEM (UPI) — In a special

message to the legislature today, Gov. Mark Hatfield paid homage to Presidents Lincoln and Washington—then urged their birthdays no longer be observed as state holidays so the state could save \$100,000 a holiday.

Hatfield repeated a message to the 1963 session asking that the two birthdays, and primary and general election days, no longer be considered state holidays.

He suggested instead that Feb. 14, Oregon Statehood Day, be established as a legal state holiday.

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Trial Stalls As Witness Fails Court

The first degree murder trial

of Jerry Richard Haines, 24, charged with the gun slaying of his eight-month pregnant wife, Christine, last Dec. 17 was recessed until 10 a.m. Feb. 25, when state's witness Beverly David, 24, failed to appear as a witness at 11:45 a.m. Thursday.

Judge David R. Vandenberg in calling the recess indicated this was an unusually long delay in a murder trial and again warned the jurors to be especially careful not to discuss the case during the three-day interruption in proceedings.

The Klamath County sheriff's office said that when they issued a subpoena to Miss David prior to Feb. 21 she indicated that she would be present to appear as a witness.

When Miss David failed to appear Thursday morning she was located in Fort Klamath by Alvie Youngblood, deputy sheriff at Chiloquin. At Klamath Falls, Miss David assured the district attorney's office that she would be present at the trial Monday morning.

State Police patrolman Andrew Sloan testified Thursday that a short time after the shooting, while Haines was in a squad car with Sloan, the suspect said he had been having a long time dispute with his wife. The patrolman indicated that Haines said his wife had been taunting him that the child she was bearing was not his.

In other testimony, another state police patrolman, W. K. Shears, was asked to identify pictures that the state police took at the scene of the shooting.

The defense attorney objected to several of the pictures being introduced into evidence on the grounds that some were not relevant and others were purely cumulative.

Judge Vandenberg withheld ruling on the objections, but added that he felt "we're using pictures too much here."

League president Frank Weaver explained the move by repeating "that the five basic functions of government, fire protection, police protection, sanitation, streets and education should have primary call on taxpayer dollars over less essential needs."

A letter received from District Attorney Dale Crabtree regarding the legality of the sector district election was considered inadequate and a request was sent to the secretary of state for further clarification.

Richard Arnett reported on Senate Bill 129 on zoning and termed it, "one of the most shocking bills I have ever read. It purports to take the rights of maintenance, use, construction, alteration or transfer from the property owner, also the right to vote is minimized, or truly negated."

A report was also given on vector bill 1282.
