MONMOUTH (Special) — The Oregon Tech Owls, shooting for the best league record ever recorded by an Oregon Collegiate Conference club, struck with lightning-like precision here Friday

night and stormed past the second place Oregon College of Education Wolves, 98-84.

C.K. Yang Vaults To Mark

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — UCLA decathlete great C.K. Yang of Formosa, using the fiber glass pole like a sling shot, broke the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) outdoor pole vault record Saturday with a vault of 15 feet-10 inches.

The victory was the first for the season over the Wolves and it handed the NAIA Tournament-bound Wolves their first loss of the season on their own home court. That home court is what helped them to second place and into the NAIA Tournament. The Owls are ineligible to compete in post season tournaments because they aren't classified as a four-year school.

Yang's vault came on his first try at the height and eclipsed the old mark of 15-10 1/2 set by George Davies, then of Oklahoma State in 1961. Davies also used the fiber glass pole which thus far has not been accepted for international record competition.

There was another record broken during the game. Sam Smith scored the nets for 30 points to set a new OCC league scoring record for one season. The 30 points gave him 323 points in the 14 games thus far and snapped the old record of last year which Smith held of 320. And he still had another game to play Saturday night to further that record.

Yang, a member of the 16-foot pole vaulting fraternity, had banner day at the nine annual USC-UCLA Relay Carnival. The decathlon star, second only to former UCLA teammate Rafe Johnson in the 1960 Olympics, competed in six events and also won the broad jump with a leap of 23 feet-1 1/2 inches. He placed second in the javelin, fourth in the high jump, fifth in the discus and sixth in the shot put.

The Owls hit a fantastic 42 of 79 shots for a brilliant .532 average from the floor, almost as good as they hit from the charity line with only 14 of 23 for .609 percent. The Wolves, called aptly the "mighty midgets" because of their small size, hit on 36 of 84 fielders for a so-so .429 average.

Smith connected on 13 of 24 field shots and Anderson meshed 10 of 17. Nash, nine of 14 and Zitek seven of 14. Toby Wolf and Darrell Brandt led the Wolves with 22 points each while Bob Marr was the only other in doubles with 18 points.

In all, six meet records were broken in the 13-event program. One mark was tied—the 120-yard high hurdles—when Bob Pierce of USC skinned the barriers in 14 seconds flat.

This was the first time in four games the Owls have failed to pass the 100-point margin. They have hit over 100 points in the last three outings and just missed the total Friday night.

Other new records included Yang, in the broad jump; UCLA's distance medley relay team, timed in 10:01.2; USC's crack 440-yard relay team, 4:13 seconds; the Trojan's 800-yard relay quartet, 1:26.1; and Troy's 2-mile relay team, clocked in 7:41.6.

Another mild and pleasant surprise was the way that John Stille advanced at 130. He had a qualification match and pinned Ashland's Russ Johnston. He won the first round match with a 4-0 decision over Clint Gibson and then stopped Flood of Grants Pass with a 4-0 licks.

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The Mexican fighter has fought some good ones including Dillo Nunez, whom Hernandez beat. And Nunez kayped Phil Moyer. Carothers has a draw to his credit with Horn, the only blemish on the undefeated record of Horn. So, judging from this comparison, it should be a whale of a battle.

Carothers has had less fights. He has 20 pro fights under his belt and has lost only one and drawn one for an 18-1 record. He grew up in this area around Grants Pass and is in the best shape of his life. He looks ready to go and really wants a win over Hernandez to vault him up the ladder in the fist world.

The semitinal bout will be a six-round match between Eddie First Rider of Leathbridge, Canada, and a top fighter from Portland, Jerry Hamilton. First Rider is a Canadian Indian with an undefeated 19-0 record although he has been idle recently. He fights like a buzzsaw and never stops punching. Hamilton has chalked up a 7-2 mark.

The third bout of the evening could be the best. It pits welterweight Cecil Mott of Los Angeles going against cagey Frank Proctor of Portland. Mott is one of the fast rising young stars. He has had 17 fights, losing only one and drawing one. He was a brilliant Golden Glover and turned pro and has been doing well since. He is being groomed for a possible shot at former champion Joe Brown.

Proctor is a cutie with a lot of ring savvy and a style which causes frustration among his opponents. This is figured to be a real Pier-Six scrap.

Klamath's own Jim Baker will be in the second bout of the evening in a four-round match with Derry Thompson of Portland. Both boys will come into the fight at about 146 pounds. This will be Thompson's first pro fight while Baker has a 5-3 mark while fighting when he can get the chance.

The opening match also should be a good one. It pits Ernie Esterbrook (called the Blond Bomber) against Rabbit Chambers of Phoenix, Ariz. Esterbrook is a former Glover and has a 7-1 record in a 6-3 mark for Chambers. Esterbrook is a very heavy hitter for his featherweight stature of 124 pounds.

This will be the second appearance for Hernandez in Oregon. His first was the close loss to Horn. He is going all out to gain a victory here. He is anxious to make a hit with the fans of Oregon, especially here, because he said that he would like to stay in this area and fight because he likes the country.

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
