

# Moore Leads Ducks Past WSU, 83-70

EUGENE (UPI) — Center Glenn Moore scored 26 points—his best effort of the season—as the Oregon Ducks defeated Washington State 83-70 Friday night. It was Oregon's fourth straight basketball win over the Cougars. The teams play again here tonight.

Moore, a 6-7 senior, hit 10 of 16 field goal attempts. Forwards Jim Johnson and Steve Jones tallied 23 and 18 points, respectively, for the Ducks.

Oregon was ahead at halftime 42-30. The Ducks led by 19 points at one time in the second half on their way to their ninth win of the season in 21 games.

Washington State center Ted Werner scored 16 points.

# SF Seals Pressing Portland

Edmonton's Sid Finney broke a 2-2 tie with 34 seconds remaining at Edmonton to put the Flyers ahead, 3-2. Ray Kinawichuk added another goal after the Buckaroos pulled Don Head out of the nets.

Portland's Gordy Fashoway scored his 54th goal in professional hockey, surpassing the National Hockey League total of Maurice "the Rocket" Richard. Only Detroit's Gordie Howe, with 53, has scored more.

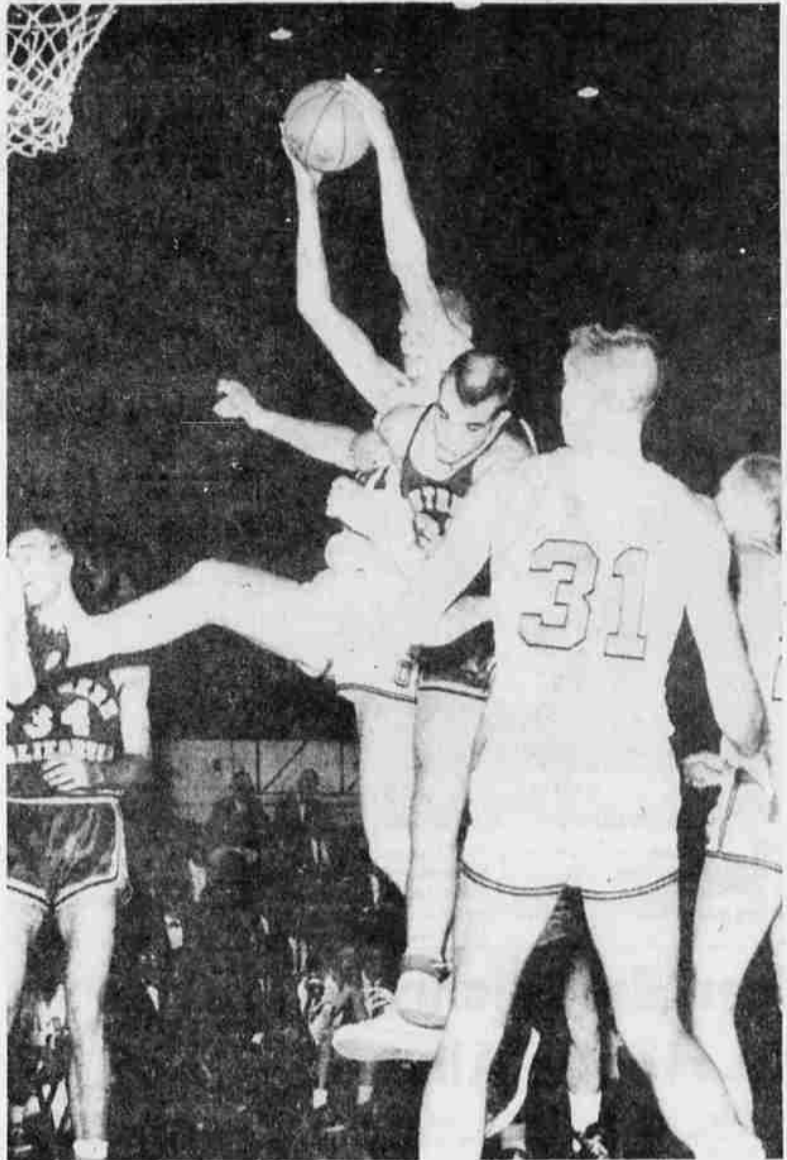
The Angels have a prospective first baseman in Charlie Dees, Texas League batting champion last season.

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Seven-foot Mel Counts scored 19 points and collected 15 rebounds and playmaker Terry Baker tallied 15 to lead Oregon State to a surprising 76-49 basketball win over Southern California Friday night.

# Russian Cracks Jumping Record

NEW YORK (UPI)—Russia's Igor Ter-Ovanesyan eclipsed the accepted world indoor record for the broad jump with a leap of 26 feet, 6 1/2 inches Saturday night to defeat America's Ralph Boston in the national AAU indoor track championships at Madison Square Garden.

The Soviet star's jump topped the listed mark of 26'6 1/2" held by Boston, although it did not better his own mark of 26'10" set on Feb. 1 which is awaiting official recognition as the world indoor record.

Olympic champion Boston, who had been bothered by a sore leg in recent days, could do no better than 25'9 1/2" in suffering only the second loss of his career in face-to-face meetings with Ter-Ovanesyan.

# State Indicates Strong Olympic Site Support

SALEM (UPI)—The state indicated strong possible support Friday for Portland's campaign to get the 1968 Olympic Games.

Gov. Mark Hatfield urged financing by the 1963 legislature and House Speaker Clarence Barton suggested a 2-cent gasoline tax.

The indication of strong state support came as a surprise to members of a committee from Metropolitan Future Unlimited who called on the governor.

"We need a bill that will set forth financing, as far as the state is concerned, from this legislature," Hatfield said.

Barton followed the governor's proposal with the suggestion for a 2-cent gasoline tax, to last two years, as a possible way of financing the planned Olympic Games site north of Portland at Delta Park and the Centennial grounds.

"This should raise, say, \$20 million, and it would give our guests a chance to help pay for it," Barton said.

"If you want a bill, we'll introduce a bill," Barton said.

Paul V. McKee, chairman of Pacific Light and Power Company and of the Futures Unlimited group, said the delegation was "not yet prepared" to ask the state for financial help.

"This is a bridge we do not yet have to cross," McKee explained.

Rep. Edward Whelan, D-Portland, asked if the gasoline bill could be passed on a contingency basis. Barton said he was not certain. It was understood no gasoline tax or other Olympic financing plan would be passed unless Portland definitely got the 1968 games.
